

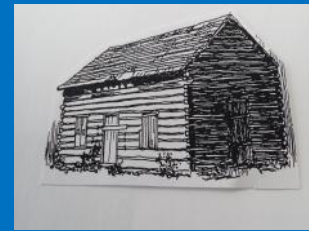

Year of Prayer at Nazareth



June Prayer Focus: Gratitude and Answered Prayers

GRATITUDE helps us recognize God's presence even in difficult moments and situations. It ushers us into the presence of God and helps us feel closer to him. Gratitude helps us align our perspective with God's perspective.

We are told in very simple terms in 1 Thessalonians 5 to:

16) Rejoice always

17) Pray continually

18) Give thanks in all circumstances

The Bible does not command us to **feel** thankful in all circumstances; instead it says to **give thanks** in all circumstances. When you begin to praise God in a difficult situation, even though you don't feel it, your perspective changes.

Gratitude is defined as a "feeling of appreciation for a kindness, a gift or favor received." It affects those around you. Gratitude is contagious and spreads like wildfire. But so is **INGRATITUDE**. Defined as "a disgraceful, dishonorable lack of thankfulness for kindness, gifts, or favors received," it is the opposite of gratitude and creates a sense of entitlement. We think we're not receiving what we deserve so we complain. Grumbling, mumbling, and murmuring are easy traps to fall into. Someone grumbles or complains, and the next thing you know, you're grumbling and complaining. It spreads to everyone around us and is rampant in our culture today. Ingratitude is a casual despising of the sovereignty of God. When we grumble and complain, we're actually saying we don't like how God is doing things and we think we could do it better.

Not only does gratitude affect those around you, but it can make others want to be around you. So how do you become a contagious carrier of gratitude?

It comes with prayer and with practice. Here are some ideas:

When the steak is tough, thank God that you can afford a steak.

When the bed is hard, thank God that you have a bed and a roof over your head.

When the gas is expensive, thank God you have a car.

When the service is slow, thank God that you can go out to eat or make a purchase.

When your plans are rained out, thank God for the rain that is so badly needed.

Philippians 4:8-9 tells us to focus on the best, not the worst; the beautiful, not the ugly; and things to praise, not things to curse. **Practice** being content whatever your circumstances are.

Practice by seeing how many times you can thank God each day. You will become aware of the multitude of his blessings. Thankfulness awakens you to God's presence which can overshadow your problems. You can keep a gratitude journal. You can thank God at the end of the day for all the good that has happened to you.

In the Prayer Room, you will find an "**Answered Prayer Jar.**" We invite you to place a marble in the glass jar for each answered prayer you receive. As the jar fills up over this year, it serves as a tangible reminder of God's power and faithfulness.

And don't forget the "**Unspoken Prayers**" on the cross in the Prayer Room for those prayer concerns that you may not feel comfortable sharing during prayer times at church or in the published prayer lists. Know that they are confidential and will not be removed or read by anyone but the prayer-er. This is a way that our church family can visualize all the unspoken concerns and pray for them. At the end of the year, they will be removed and we start afresh.

Year of Prayer cont. (Mental Health Awareness)



In Reflection of Mental Health Awareness.....

My son, Aaron Mathew Caldwell, was diagnosed with chronic paranoid schizophrenia when he was twenty years old, and that was thirty-two years ago. As a single parent and a caregiver, Aaron and I have had experiences of his manic depressive behavior, which at times, are frightening! Aaron has gone through an assortment of meds, such as Paxil, Zyprexa, and Zoloft, none of which produced a cure but only made him "manageable" for the convenience of others.

Aaron's mind is consumed and preoccupied by negative voices which are constantly condemning him to the point that it becomes unbearable. Aaron is always saying that there is nothing wrong with him; but, his symptoms tell a different story. When he stops taking his medication he becomes psychotic, which results in him being hospitalized. Over the years, Aaron has been a patient at several hospitals. He has been at Patrick B. Harris Psychiatric Hospital in Anderson for the past four years, this being the sixth time at that particular institution.

I have had Aaron, alone, since he was eleven years old and being a single father who was trying to work and provide a home and a life has not been easy; but, it is nothing compared to what Aaron has experienced and I have often said that I would trade places with him in a heartbeat if he could have some quality of life as a normal young man. My hope and prayer is that one day Aaron will be free from the voices that torment him so and that he can find love and peace of mind.

I love my son!

HISTORY

Richard Pearis

Richard Pearis was a native Virginian who came to South Carolina quite wealthy. He was from Westmoreland County, where George Washington lived, and had a colorful life; but, his exploits would hardly qualify him as a hero. Seeing that he could make money as a trader with the Indians by using a little diplomacy, he married a Cherokee woman, Pratchly Moytoy, and had a child with her named George. The Chief, her father, awarded Richard 12 acres in what later became Greenville County. It was illegal for him to own property in Indian territory, so it was given to Richard's son, George Pearis, who was half Cherokee. He built a mill on the Reedy River, near the falls, and this became the origins of the City of Greenville.



Richard was heavily influenced by William Drayton who encouraged him to gain the support of the Indians for the Patriot cause but when his brother-in-law, Robert Cunningham, was arrested for opposing Drayton, Richard Pearis switched sides. He then encouraged the Cherokee to join them on their attacks.

In December of 1775 during the "Snow Campaign," Pearis was captured by Col. Richardson and sent to prison in Charlestown. While in prison, Pearis' plantation, "Great Plains," that was being used as a place for trade with the Cherokee and a safe place to recruit Loyalists, was burned to the ground. Upon release, Pearis appealed and was given compensation for his loss. He became a Loyalist Captain, an active recruiter and made his camp on the Reedy River, where he was captured once again. This time, he made his escape to Florida. The area of his plantation eventually became the City of Greenville and notably later passed into the hands of industrialist Vardry McBee, who influenced rapid growth of that city.

Pearis himself was not completely forgotten. Many do not know that "Paris Mountain" was first named for him. Over the years it was corrupted to the shorter and more famous name. After the Revolutionary War, Pearis, like so many Loyalists, made their way to the Bahamas, where he died in Nassau in November, 1794.

Flags Fly Again at Nazareth



Each year at Nazareth, we take time to identify and honor the many military veterans that are buried here in our graveyard. In the month of April the cemetery trustees and other friends of the cemetery place flags at each veteran's grave. Depending on the conflict or the era when they served, different flag designs are placed. Revolutionary War veterans have 13 star "Betsey Ross flags. War of 1812 veterans have Gadsden "Don't Tread on Me" flags, Civil War veterans have First National Flags (7 stars with 3 stripes). Veterans of later wars have our modern 50 star flags on all their graves.

This year seven members helped, and the work went quickly over about 3 hours. There are about 265 graves to locate and mark each year, and we were blessed with good weather. Two of our volunteers, Carroll Caldwell and Bill Berry have numerous family members and veterans buried at Nazareth. Each of their families were some of the earliest settlers and fought for our independence and the Confederate cause early in our church's history.

Take a walk through all the sections. Each has names of people who you may have known or heard tales of their lives and their contributions to the life of the church. The flags will be displayed through the 4th of July as part of our nation's 250th anniversary celebration.
