## Statement of Faith

I believe in God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit: eternally existent as one substance in three persons. I believe in God the Father Almighty, who created the heavens and the earth and all that is in them, who sustains them by his power, and who called creation good. The same God who created beasts and animals chose to create humanity in God's image in order that they might image God in the world. But humanity in its willfulness disobeyed God's command and was mercifully removed from God's presence in Eden so that they might not eat of the tree of life and dwell eternally in sin. Despite our sin, God did not forsake us. God continued to speak to the people of Israel, to guide and direct them through the law and the prophets.

God spoke fully in the person of Jesus Christ, His Son, the Word of God. Through the indwelling of the Holy Spirit, the virgin Mary conceived and bore Jesus: fully God and fully human. Jesus Christ lived a sinless life, died a criminal's death on the cross, was buried, and on the third day, Jesus rose from the dead and later ascended to the right hand of God where he dwells eternally—having defeated sin and death, offering salvation to all who place their faith in him. In the resurrection, God vindicated the death of Jesus Christ and redeemed the once-broken relationship between God and humanity. And salvation is not incumbent upon human works, good deeds, or right living. Salvation is a gift of God's grace to us in Christ which we receive by faith and faith alone. The Holy Spirit engenders faith lest faith become a work of our own. It is the Holy Spirit, the giver of life, the Spirit of the living God, who fosters the faith within us that justifies us before God in Christ, and it is the Holy Spirit who draws us closer in obedience and faithfulness toward the life God has for us, namely our sanctification.

The same Holy Spirit who justifies and sanctifies also equips the Church for ministry in the world in and through and for Christ. The Church consists of both local gatherings of believers and the universal body of Christ in this world. The mission of the Church is kerygmatic—proclaiming the gospel of salvation in Christ alone. The proclamation of the gospel occurs in the life of the church through the preaching of the Word and the administration of the two sacraments which Christ gave the Church: baptism and communion. These sacraments are God-given signs whereby the church remembers, enacts, and experiences anew God's extraordinary gift of grace to us in Christ. These signs point to the love and grace of God toward us as we remember the sovereign, sacrificial love of God toward us in baptism and communion.

Scripture, God's Word written, speaks to us the story of God's redemption of the world in Christ by the power of the Holy Spirit. Scripture is authoritative in all matters of faith and faithful living declaring God's will for us as God's people. Scripture originates not from human minds, but as inspiration from the Spirit who guided and directed the processes of writing, compiling, and uniting the books of the Old and New Testaments from ancient times to become for us the Bible. I believe Scripture is to be interpreted with care and attention to literary style and its ancient

origins, though that does not discount its decisive and unequivocal claim that it is Christ and Christ alone who offers salvation to the world. The Church forsakes being the Church when it attempts to arbitrate which portions of God's Word are still 'relevant' today and thereby dismisses the entirety of God's Word afforded to us in Scripture. The Church ought to continue mining God's Word for fresh expressions of the gospel to proclaim redemption in Christ. Scripture is for me the authoritative Word of God over my life and faith, and I continue to turn to God's evergreen promise of salvation in Christ declared in God's Word.



Dear John Knox Church,

For almost two years now, I've had the privilege of serving as the Director of Youth and Young Adult Ministries at our church. And as many of you know, during this time I've also been in the ordination process of our denomination. After interviewing with the Associate Pastor Nominating Committee and accepting their offer to be called as a pastor, we've come to this vote.

I will admit that Grace and I are overjoyed at the idea of my staying on staff at John Knox and being entrusted to serve as a pastor to this congregation.
