1. Why are you seeking the position of Rice Lake City Council member?

I am running for city council on the platform of positive, sensible, progression. 3. What will be your top 3 priorities for the City of Rice Lake this year?

We need to make our city more attractive through responsible, positive, progression. We need to remove unnecessary politics that prohibit new business and existing businesses from expanding. We need to make our community more vibrant by adding activities and amenities, while maintaining all of the great traditions our community enjoys. 4. Do you think our main street/downtown is healthy and successful? If not, what would you do to change that?

First off, hats off to our Main Street Association Director DeAnna Westphal. She has done more for downtown in her first year than I have seen in my lifetime as a resident of this city.

I think our downtown has the right foundation, some great businesses and great people, but it lacks a lot of characteristics we all would like to see. Our downtown needs a complete revitalization to make it more attractive to outsiders, new businesses and our own citizens. I will support every effort to see our main street become a destination and the heart of our community once again. I would like to see the city do everything they can in order to see the revitalization happen by potential borrowing, grant writing, etc. In addition, I would like to place more emphasis on incorporating our beautiful Lake Shore Drive into our downtown. So few communities have the waterfront we enjoy. This area is under utilized and could be a key tool in attracting more tourism and business.

5. If elected, what three steps would you take to put our city on a firmer financial footing?

First off, I think it is necessary to do a city wide audit of all departments. In doing so, I truly believe we will find inefficiencies that could potentially have a large impact on the city's expenditures and budget.

Second, changes that are implemented need to be structural. Structural changes equal continual cost savings year after year. No more balancing budgets by making cuts then circling back around and re-implementing what was cut. Also, we need to be sure to allow the private sector to operate without competition. No more trying to make revenue by stepping on the private sector's toes. This type of policy can cause a loss of revenue and causes animosity between the city and private sector. The mission of this city is to "provide services to its citizens, which are necessary to promote and protect their health, safety, and quality of life needs, which are not deemed to be feasible or viable for the private sector to provide", and we should stand by this mission. Moreover, we need to stop balancing budgets by passing the cost onto the taxpayers. For example, the implementation of the wheel tax is just one policy I do not support. My goal is to repeal this tax during my next term.

Third, and to me, the most important is ROI. Return on Investment. If we are going to spend a dollar on something, beyond what is already budgeted and expected by the taxpayers, it better return that dollar or more. Some good examples are the Moon Lake Estates development, the new City Center next to Marketplace, the Village Square development, etc. All of the taxpayer dollars that were spent have and will continue to

grow the city's tax base. These investments created more jobs in our city and more destinations for others to come and spend money within our city.

6. If you received a \$1 million grant to use for the city any way you wanted, what would you do with it and why?

Downtown...start the revitalization process. I think we can all agree that downtowns are truly the heart of a city. Vibrant downtowns attract citizens and outsiders alike. We all know when we visit another city, it is usually to go visit their downtown. Stillwater, Hayward, Eau Claire to Nashville, Miami and LA are all examples of this.
