

Afterschool Works IN OREGON



Having expanded learning opportunities in afterschool and summer helps students succeed, helps parents keep their jobs, and helps ensure businesses can hire the local workforce they need.

Students who participate in afterschool and summer learning programs attend school more often, do better in school and are more likely to graduate. These expanded learning opportunities keep young people safe and equip them with the skills they need to succeed in school and life. In Oregon, more than 90,000 children and teens are enrolled in an afterschool program.

Afterschool programs prepare students for college and the jobs of tomorrow

Afterschool and summer learning programs help young people develop the skills they need for a successful future. Students across Oregon are engaging in hands-on projects, working together to tackle real-world problems, and getting connected with community projects, internships, summer jobs and mentoring experiences.

For instance:

- Regular participation in afterschool programs has been shown to narrow the math achievement gap between students from low- and high-income families.
- Students who participate in elementary school-level afterschool STEM programs demonstrate stronger interest in STEM during middle school, while interest among non-participants is more likely to decline during the middle school years

When parents have afterschool choices, they have peace of mind:

- 64% of Oregon parents say that afterschool programs help working parents keep their jobs
- Nearly 9 in 10 Oregon parents support public funding for afterschool and summer learning programs

Among Oregon parents:

- 65% say their child's afterschool program offers learning opportunities in science, engineering and math.
- 80% say it's important for their child to have summer activities that help them learn
- 59% say afterschool programs help children gain workforce skills

Across Oregon, more than 220,000 kids are waiting for an available afterschool program and 44% of families want their kids enrolled in a summer learning program.
