

EMERGENCY BUSINESS ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

- 17 businesses received grants, ranging from \$11,200 to \$50,000.
- The CARES Act directed \$350,000 to the city for the program, while Kenton County added \$275,000.

EMERGENCY RENT & MORTGAGE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

- The program gave 43 businesses a total of \$81,452.

SMALL BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT CENTER (SBDC) - COVINGTON

- New Business Coach Lisa Brann met 1-on-1 with business owners to help them navigate the pandemic, including federal resource availability.

COVINGTON TO DEVELOP IRS SITE

Covington purchased the vacant IRS building and the 23-acre site and plans are full-steam ahead for this once-in-a-generation opportunity along the Ohio River. The vision of the development includes a restored street grid, a levee park, a community plaza for festivals and a mixture of buildings containing offices, retail shops and places to live.

COVTECH PROJECT: MODERN WORKSPACE FOR FORWARD THINKING BUSINESSES

Technology service companies Blair Tech and ReGadget are remaking two former big box stores in a Latonia shopping center, bringing more than 100 combined jobs and a \$7 million investment into a 200,000 square-foot building that previously was home to Value City and Burlington Coat Factory. Blair Tech is the number one Microsoft refurbisher in the world, while ReGadget provides computers and educational software to schools.

DBL LAW HEADS TO MONARCH BUILDING

DBL Law, one of Greater Cincinnati's largest law firms, will be moving its headquarters to the historic Monarch Building in Covington. The \$11.3 million project will result in a 30,000 square-foot building for DBL that brings 76 employees to the Roebling Point Business District.

2020 DEVELOPMENTS

REPUBLIC BANK BUILDING

The \$4.8 million renovation will transform the office building into a multi-tenant upgrade featuring an elevator, historic façade enhancements and a rooftop bar.

FIRST FINANCIAL BANK


The long-time lender of many recent revitalization projects will be opening NKY headquarters.

PICKLE FACTORY

The \$1.9 million renovation of a vacant, former "Pickle Factory" will transform the first floor into Wenzel Whiskey, a bourbon blending experience, and upper floors into Airbnb units.

HOTEL COVINGTON EXPANSION

The \$22.5 million project will bring to Covington 100 new jobs, a new bourbon experience, 60 VIP suites and 10,000 square feet of leasable commercial office space.
