




Portrait Of A Youth Who Has Run Away or is Experiencing Homelessness

There is no one profile, rich or poor, rural or urban, two parent or one parent household.











About 4.2 million young people ages 13 to 25 experience homelessness every year



National Stats:



1 in 10 young people ages 18 to 25 and 1 in 30 youth ages 13 to 17 will experience homelessness in a given year.



150,000 youth experienced homelessness on a single night in January 2024



10% increase in unaccompanied youth from 2023 to 2024




24% / 27% youth exchanged sex for money / place to stay


NRS Overview and Purpose

Home Free Program – How it Works

- 1. Youth or advocate contacts NRS (1-800-RUNAWAY or 1800RUNAWAY.org also must speak to the youth directly).
- 2. NRS conducts eligibility screening and safety planning.
- 3. Conference call with youth and receiving adult confirms arrangements.
- 4. Free Greyhound ticket issued.
- 5. NRS follows up to confirm safe arrival.





Home Free Program - Why it Matters



Removes the financial barrier to reunification.



Supports safe travel from crisis to stability.



Builds connections with caring adults and services.



Prevents further victimization or unsafe street exposure.





Home Free Program - Impact

- Last fiscal year a total of 543 tickets were issues nationwide
- Real Life Examples:

• Ticket Issued: January 25, 2025

A 21-year-old male reported being asked to leave his father's home and was temporarily residing in a hotel due to his sexual orientation. NRS staff identified his mother as a positive support and facilitated mediation between the youth and his mother. Through this process, the youth was able to secure a safe and stable living arrangement at his mother's home, confirm his safe arrival, and reengage with essential services.

• Ticket Issued: March 14, 2025

A 21-year-old transgender youth contacted NRS after being forced to leave their mother's home upon disclosing their gender identity. At the time, the youth was residing in a homeless shelter. NRS staff worked collaboratively with the youth to identify a stepbrother as a supportive and affirming family member. The youth was successfully reunited with their stepbrother and confirmed a long-term, stable living arrangement.

Empowering Youth through Life Skills & Runaway Prevention

Free, evidence-based, interactive curriculum designed to help youth build life skills and understand alternatives to running away.

What is it?

For ages 10-20, adaptable for schools, after-school programs, youth groups.

Available in English and Spanish.







Let's Talk Runaway Prevention Curriculum – Why it Matters

Many youth face family, peer, or identity challenges and feel limited in resources.

Equips youth with communication and decision-making skills to reduce unsafe runaway behavior.

Early prevention offers alternatives to crisis.







Let's Talk Runaway Prevention Curriculum - Structure

14–16 flexible modules: use individually or as a complete series.

Each includes facilitator guide, worksheets, and assessments.

User-friendly and adaptable to many environments.

Ideal group size: 10-15 youth; ~45 min per module. Works in schools, shelters, after-school, and community programs.

No strict prerequisites for facilitators.





Youth HOPE Month – What is it and why does it matter?

November is designated as Youth HOPE Month — a campaign to shine a light on youth homelessness, outreach, prevention and education.

The name "HOPE" stands for Homelessness • Outreach • Prevention • Education.

Each year an estimated 4.2 million youth ages 13-25 experience some form of homelessness in the United States.

Youth homelessness is rarely just a matter of "running away": causes are often complex such as family conflict, abuse, discrimination, poverty, foster-care gaps, and housing instability.

Youth who experience homelessness or housing instability are at higher risk of physical health issues, mental-health challenges, exploitation, trauma, and poorer long-term outcomes.





Youth HOPE Month – How To Get Involved & Take Action



Organizations and individuals can register as Youth HOPE Month Partners, use toolkits and campaign materials to raise awareness.



Use social media and local events: for example, Wear Green Day (in recent years it's been held November 13) to show support and visibility.



Host community activities: outreach walks, resource fairs, light projections, educational webinars, volunteer drives.



Connect youth and families to resources: hotlines (e.g., 1-800-RUNAWAY), local shelters/outreach programs, educational supports and housing assistance.






Top Five Issues Identified








Top 5 Given Resources
