Here are a few reasons why you might want to consider making your next trip in the lesser-traveled seasons:

Cooler Weather

The air is a little crisper, and buying that classic Aran or cashmere sweater seems all the more appealing when you can wear it right away. The pubs will seem a little cozier – all the more tempting for an evening of chat with the locals by the fireside. And if you're venturing to a warmer destination, like Italy, the cooler weather is likely to keep you more invigorated for daytime sightseeing.

Night Lights

Sure the days are shorter, but the lights of winter have their own allure. In Iceland, for example, this is your chance to spot the elusive Aurora Borealis – never guaranteed, but one of the delights of the dark winter sky.
