Liturgy

Tradition, Interpretation, and Change - Developments in the Liturgical Traditions of Ashkenaz

We tend to think of the prayers that we recite daily and on Shabbat as always having been there, at least since the Talmudic period. It is true that the basic structure, and even much of the wording, of the Shabbat and weekday services was fixed by the end of the tenth century.

However, the liturgy of the Jews of Ashkenaz was never static. It has continued to evolve until our own time. Prayers were added, even as the continued recitation of ancient prayers was challenged as the conditions of Jewish life changed. In his forthcoming book, *Tradition, Interpretation, and Change*, Rabbi Berger argues that the way in which a prayer or practice was understood often had a profound effect on the determination as to whether and when it was to be recited, as well as on the prayer's specific wording.

Over the course of this year, we will study some of our most familiar prayers, such as Aleinu, the Mourner's Kaddish, the prayers recited when we take out and return the Torah, as well as some that are less well known. When examining these prayers and liturgical practices, we will ask: Why do we recite this prayer or perform this ritual? What function does this prayer serve? What is the anticipated, or hoped for effect of its recitation? We will see how our siddur was influenced by such factors as new cultural currents and technological advances (such as the invention of the printing press), by the migration of German Jews to Eastern Europe and Spanish exiles into Northern Europe, as well as commonly-held beliefs in demons and in an afterlife.

Biblical Literature

In this class, we will study the written text of Rabbi Shapiro's answer to this question as a way to better understand the complex process through which questions of halakha are answered.

Jewish History

Behind the Masks and Under the Capes: The Jewishness of Superheroes

Even if you have never read a comic book or watched an action film, you are sure to enjoy our critical examination of this popular genre.

The History and Mystery of the Basel Talmud

Bringing Nazi War Criminals to Justice: An Examination of the Nuremberg and Eichman Trials

In this class, we will study how Nazi war criminals were brought to justice following the war by focusing on their capture, interrogation and prosecution.
