Pfizer Vaccines Available for 16+

Currently, Pfizer is the only vaccine that is approved for anyone 16 and up. Appointments are easier than ever to schedule. Some locations even allow walk-ins.

- A parent or guardian must accompany minors.

Talking to Parents and Students About the Benefits of Vaccines

The COVID-19 vaccine is safe, effective and the best tool in our toolkit to prevent and reduce severity of infections. Vaccines will also help maintain in-person learning, sports and other school-related activities. When you're fully vaccinated you can:

- Visit with other fully vaccinated friends and family indoors without wearing masks or distancing.
- Visit with unvaccinated people indoors from a single household who are at low risk for severe COVID-19 disease without wearing masks or distancing.
- Participate in most outdoor activities and recreation without a mask.
- Travel with no need to test before or after, or quarantine.
- Skip testing/routine screening and quarantine following a known exposure, if asymptomatic.
