Recommendations and Reminders

Please remind the white folks that it is okay for discussions to happen in all white groups, and they should. An important reminder regarding "diversity in racial discussions" - it is often safer for groups of historically marginalized individuals to be in small groups themselves. We have to exhibit extreme care when only 1 person of color or 1 LGBTQ+ person/youth is in small group. It should never be the work of those individuals to teach or support the learning of those in the majority.

Townhall Two will be Thursday, July 30th at 3:30 EST. It will have white youth and young adults on the panel.

Having two separate categories addresses time constraints and the reality that groups need to be able to say different things.

Each panel will open with a pre-recorded video of youth and young adults responding to the question 'Why do I fight for racial justice?'. Youth and young adults are invited to submit their videos...no longer than 30 seconds...to Trayce Potter (pottert@ucc.org), no later than June 30th. **PLEASE invite your youth and young adults to participate in this project.**
