Barriers to Work: People with Criminal Records

Approximately 77 million Americans, or 1 in 3 adults, have a criminal record. Having a criminal record can make it difficult, or even impossible, for an individual to work in a given field, especially one that requires an occupational license. In 2014, employment barriers faced by people with felony convictions including occupational licensing and other challenges, such as lower levels of education and job skills were associated with a reduction in the overall employment rate.

The Bureau of Justice Statistics reports that the U.S. disability rate is significantly higher among individuals who have been incarcerated. With over 600,000 people released from state and federal prisons each year, it is critical that AJC staff understand how they can help returning citizens with disabilities find and retain
