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New PIAAC Prison Study Infographics Released

The Program for the International Assessment of Adult Competencies (PIAAC) is a "large-scale international household study that assesses the key cognitive and workplace skills that adults need to participate successfully in 21st-century society and the global economy." One component of this study focuses on incarcerated individuals' cognitive and workplace skills. Recently, two new [infographics](#) were released that use PIAAC data to present findings "related to the cognitive

skills and backgrounds of the U.S. prison population” and to compare the skills of U.S. incarcerated adults with the U.S. household population.

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MDRC Releases Update on Detroit Promise Program

Education and social policy research organization [MDRC](#) recently released an update on their partnership with the [Detroit Promise Program](#) designed to improve college access for more students. While the U.S. has made great strides in increasing access to higher education, college graduation rates remain low—with only a fifth of community college students graduating within three years. The Detroit Promise was created to improve students’ college experience, as well as to help more students persist and graduate. It is administered by the Detroit Regional Chamber and allows the city’s high school graduates to attend local colleges tuition-free. This community college scholarship program covers any difference between financial aid and tuition for up to three years at five area community colleges. The Detroit Regional Chamber partnered with MDRC to create the Detroit Promise Path, adding four proven student support services onto the existing scholarship. They are

1. campus coaches to help students navigate academic and personal issues;
2. monthly financial support, contingent on meeting with coaches;
3. enhanced summer engagement; and,
4. monitoring, by a management information system created by MDRC.

MDRC is currently evaluating the Detroit Promise Path, with [early findings](#) from the evaluation showing that the program is helping students enroll full-time and stay enrolled. A second cohort enrolled in fall 2017.

According to the DOL news release, ODEP created this year’s theme with input from a wide range of its partner organizations. Labor Secretary Alexander Acosta stated, “Smart employers know that including different perspectives in problem-solving situations leads to better solutions. Hiring employees with diverse abilities strengthens their business, increases competition, and drives innovation.”
