After the Blast: Mount St. Helens 40 Years Later

On May 18, 1980, the world watched in awe as Mount St. Helens erupted, killing 57 people and causing hundreds of square miles of destruction. Everyone thought it would take ages for life to return to the mountain, but scientists who visited soon after were stunned to find plants sprouting up through the ash and animals skittering around downed trees.

Ecologists have since spent decades studying life's resilience in the face of seemingly total devastation. Through their work, the eruption of Mount St. Helens has become known as the greatest natural experiment in Pacific Northwest history. In this talk, Eric Wagner takes you on a journey through the blast zone. He explores not just the surprising ways plants and animals survived the eruption, but also the complex roles that people have played, all while showing how fascinating Mount St. Helens still is 40 years after the blast.

Eric Wagner (he/him) is a writer and biologist. He holds a PhD in biology from the University of Washington, where he studied penguins. He is the author of three books, including *After the Blast: The Ecological Recovery of Mount St. Helens*. Wagner lives in Seattle.

American Democracy's Indigenous Roots and Future

History books teach us that the Founding Fathers birthed American democracy, but do not reveal the Indigenous sources of inspiration that guided their vision. The Haudenosaunee Confederacy's Great Law of Peace—uniting six Nations in an alliance that predates the American Constitution by centuries—served as a powerful example to men such as Benjamin Franklin, who benefited from the political guidance of Haudenosaunee leaders. Franklin directly cited the Law's influence on the Constitution.

But even Franklin did not comprehend the political and spiritual power held by the clan mothers of these matriarchal societies, who were instrumental to building and maintaining a peaceful union. Join storyteller Fern Renville as she shares stories both mythic and personal that reframe and highlight the history, present, and future of Indigenous female power and leadership in America. Such stories include the Seneca story of The Peacemaker and the Dakota story of White Buffalo Calf Woman.

Fern Naomi Renville (she/her) is a Sisseton Wahpeton Dakota, Omaha, and Seneca-Cayuga storyteller, theatre director, and playwright. She is the great-granddaughter of Melinda Cayuga, a Seneca matriarch who exemplified the loving strength of the clan mothers. Renville lives in Washougal.

August 2022 International/National Diversity/Cultural Celebrations

August 1 Lugnasadh – Wicca

Its name is taken from the Celtic God Lugh or Samildanach, which means "he of many gifts." It celebrates the ancient festival of the first harvesting of grain.

August 1 Confederation Day | Swiss National Day - Switzerland

Founding of the Swiss Confederation in 1291. The date refers to a historic alliance concluded in 1291 by the three cantons of Uri, Schwyz, and Unterwalden. This alliance was to become the focal point around which the Switzerland of today was built over the next 500 years.

Civic Holiday – Canada

Commonly referred to as the August long weekend. It is probably the busiest day on highways as tens of thousands of families go camping, to cottages etc. on this weekend. It is known by many names in different provinces and municipalities. August 2 Ilinden (National Day) – Macedonia

Commemorates the Macedonians revolt against the Ottoman army in August 2, 1903, on liinden, or St. Elijah's Day.

August 5 Emancipation Day – Turks & Caicos Islands

Commemorates the abolition of slavery in the British Empire. The law abolishing slavery was passed on August 1, 1834, but Turks and Caicos now celebrates Emancipation Day on the first Monday of August in order to create a long weekend.

August 6 Hiroshima Day – Japan, USA, Canada

This solemn day commemorates the day the United States dropped the first atomic bomb in Hiroshima, Japan in 1945. People from different backgrounds unite on the day to declare their commitment to never letting another nuclear bib be used against humans again.

Independence Day - Jamaica

The Colony of Jamaica gained independence from the United Kingdom on this date.

Independence Day - Bolivia

Bolivia celebrates its independence from Spain on this date. Simon Bolivar led Bolivia to independence in 1825 after more than 15 years of struggle.

August 7 Tish' 'B'Av - Jewish

Jews mourn the destruction of the First and Second Temples in Jerusalem in 586 B.C.E. and 70 C.E. It is a day of mourning and fasting.

August 8 Ashura – Islam

The tenth day of the first Islamic month (Muharram). For Shi'ite Muslims, this day mourns the martyrdom of Hazrat Imam Husain, the grandsons of Prophet Muhammad. Devout Shi'a commemorate this day of sadness with retelling the story of the battle fought in Kerbala.

August 8-17 Fravardeghan - Zoroastrian

Fravardeghan lasts 10 days in preparation for Now Ruz for those who follow the Shenshai calendar. Ancestors are memorized during this time.

August 9 National Day – Singapore

Marks the day of independence from Malaysia in 1965.

August 9 International Day of the World's Indigenous People – UN

2022 Theme: "Decade of Indigenous Languages 2022 – 2032." The Declaration is the most comprehensive international instrument on the rights of indigenous peoples. For more information visit https://www.un.org/en/observances/indigenous-day.

August 10 Independence Day – Ecuador

Gained independence on May 24, 1822 from Spain with the defeat of Spanish at the Battle of Pichincha.

August 11 Raksha Bandhan – Hindu

According to legend, God Indra was warring with demons. His wife tied a silk charm around his wrist to protect him and he was able to defeat his enemies. Hindu girls now tie a threaded amulet or "rakhi" on their brothers for protection against evil.

August 12 International Youth Day -UN

2022 theme, Intergenerational solidarity: Creating a World for All Ages, is to amplify the message that action is needed across all generations to achieve the SDGs and leave no one behind. The 2022 International Youth Day will also raise awareness on certain barriers to intergenerational solidarity, notably ageism, which impacts young and old persons, while having detrimental effects on society as a whole.

This theme builds on the momentum from two side events organized by UNDESA and partners earlier this year on 1) ageism in health and employment and 2) ageism in politics on the margins of the 60th Commission for Social Development and the 11th edition of the ECOSOC Youth Forum, respectively. August 14 Independence Day – Pakistan

On this day in 1947, Pakistan became the world's first Islamic republic when it gained independence from British rule.

August 15 Assumption - Christian

This refers to Mary's death and ascent to heaven and is celebrated by Catholic and Orthodox Churches.

National Liberation Day (Gwangbokjeol) - Korea

Commemorates the end of Japanese colonial rule at the end of World War II and the establishment of the Republic of Korea.

Independence Day - India

Commemorates the day in 1947 when India became an independent nation.

August 17 Independence Day – Indonesia

Celebrates the foundation of Indonesia as an independent nation. It is also referred to as Hari Merdeka.

August 18 Now-Ruz (Shenshai) – Zoroastrain

Now Ruz means "new day" and is celebrated by Zoroastrains who follow the Shenshai calendar and by all Ismaili Muslims around the world. The New Year celebrates the creation of fire on this day which Zarathustra received his revelation.

August 19 Independence Day – Afghanistan

Commemorates the Anglo-Afghan Treaty of 1919. The treaty granted a complete neutral relation between Afghanistan and Great Britain.

World Humanitarian Day - UN

An opportunity to celebrate the spirit that inspires humanitarian work around the globe.

Asma (9th month) - Baha'i

The first day of the ninth Baha'i month. The English translation of Asma (Arbic) is Names.

Janmashtami – Hindu

Celebrates the birth of Lord Krishna and his rescue from potential death by the demon Kasna. Lord Krishna was born in a prison, then carried by his father to another village where he was secretly exchanged with a cow herder's daughter for his safety.

August 23 International Day for Remembrance of the Slave Trade and its Abolition – UN

August 24 Birth of Prophet Zarathustra (Shenshai) – Zoroastrian

Zarathushtra (Zoroaster in Greek; Zarathosht in India and Persia) is the founder of the Zoroastrian religion, dating back to sometime between 1500 and 1000 BCE. He lived in Persia, modern day Iran. Zoroastrianism became the state religion of various Persian empires, until the 7th Century CE. When Arabs, followers of Islam, invaded Persia in 630 CE. a small number of Zoroastrians fled to India where most are concentrated today.

Independence Day – Ukraine

Independence Day is always celebrated on August 24th and marks Ukraine's declaration of independence from the U.S.S.R. in 1991.

August 25 Independence Day – Uruguay

On 25 August 1825, following a short period of rebellion, Uruguay declared its independence from Brazil and joined Argentina. A few years later, on August 27, 1828, Uruguay was recognized as an independent state by both Argentina and Brazil under the Treaty of Montevideo.

August 25- Paryushana-Parva – Jain

Sept 1 Celebrated for eight days, Paryushana-Parva is the holiest time of the year and is marked by fasting and worship of the 24 realized teachers of the Jain faith known as Tirthankaras or Jinas.

August 27- Independence Day – Moldova

Commemorates Moldova's declaration of independence from the Soviet Union in 1991.

Notting Hill Festival - UK, England

Held during the last weekend in August, this is a West Indian Street carnival with floats, bands and stalls. It began in 1964 with the focus of deterring racism toward Caribbean and other Black immigrants and bringing together the people of the Notting Hill area.

August 29 Summer Bank Holiday – UK

August 30 Victory Day – Turkey

Honors the warriors who died in the 1992 Battle of Dumlupinar, the world's oldest military band, plays, and celebrations include military parades and fireworks.

August 30 St. Rosa of Lima - Peru

Commemorates a Peruvian saint who lived in Lima. Her home is now a pilgrimage site, where every August 30th, people come to pray and throw coins, messages and icons into a water well near her home.

August 31 Independence Day – Trinidad and Tobago

Commemorates the day in 1962 when Trinidad and Tobago proclaimed independence from Britain.

Merdeka (Freedom) Day - Malaysia

Commemorates the independence of the Federation of Malaya from British colonial rule in 1957.

Ganesh Chaturthi - Hindu

It is an honor of one of Hindu's major deity, Ganesh, the elephant-headed god. He is known as the 'remover of all obstacles' and is invoked at the beginning of all new undertakings.

Young adults in U.S. are much more likely than 50 years ago to be living in a multigenerational household


As successive generations of young adults in the United States cope with rising student debt and housing costs, multigenerational living is increasingly providing a respite from the storm. A quarter of U.S. adults ages 25 to 34 resided in a multigenerational family household in 2021, up from 9% in 1971.

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Multigenerational living – that is, living in a household that includes two or more adult generations, typically consisting of those ages 25 and older – has increased among all age groups over the past five decades. But the increase has been fastest among adults ages 25 to 34. In 1971, similar shares of adults across age groups lived in a multigenerational household, but by 2021, young adults were far more likely than older Americans to have this type of living arrangement.

The growth in multigenerational living among 25- to 34-year-olds has been especially pronounced among those without a college degree. Multigenerational living has tripled among these young adults, compared with doubling among young adults with at least a bachelor's degree. In 1971, the prevalence of multigenerational living among young adults was similar regardless of educational attainment. By 2021, 31% of young adults who had not finished college were in a multigenerational arrangement – almost double the share of their peers who had completed at least a bachelor's degree (16%).


A <u>Pew Research Center survey</u> conducted last October found that financial issues are a major reason why adults live in multigenerational households. Young adults who have not completed at least a bachelor's degree tend to earn substantially less than those who have. Thus, financial pressures might at least partly explain why multigenerational living is more common for young adults with less education.

Living in home of parents is the most common arrangement

Since the Great Recession, much attention has been focused on the rising share of young adults who live in the home of one or both of their parents. That is, in fact, the most common arrangement for young adults in multigenerational households.

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
In 2021, 68% of 25- to 34-year-olds in a multigenerational home were living in the home of one or both of their parents. Still, 15% were living in their own home and had a parent or other older relative living with them. Another 14% of young adults in multigenerational households were living in a home headed by a family member other than their parent, such as a grandparent or sibling, or by an unmarried partner or a roommate (3%).

While the increase in multigenerational living among young adults since 1971 partly reflects the growing tendency of young adults to live in a parent's home, these other arrangements are also contributing to the growth in

multigenerational living. The share of young adults who live in a parent's home rose from 8% in 1971 to 17% in 2021, while the share in other multigenerational living arrangements rose from 1% to 8%.

Most young adults in multigenerational households live with a parent, many with a single parent

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
Regardless of whose home they lived in, most 25- to 34-year-olds living in a multigenerational household (86%) had a parent in the home in 2021. This included 47% who lived with two parents and 39% who lived with only one parent.

A 60% majority of young adults who were living in a parent's home in 2021 were living with two parents. In contrast, a 56% majority of those who had a parent or another older relative living in *their* home had only one parent living with them; 27% had two parents living in their home.

Living arrangements also vary by educational attainment. A majority of 25- to 34-year-olds who were living in a multigenerational household and had at least a bachelor's degree (57%) were living with two parents in 2021, compared with 48% of those with some college, 40% of those with a high school diploma and 35% of those who did not complete high school.

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Adults ages 25 to 34 who lived in multigenerational arrangements tended to be economically better off if they live with two parents than if they live with one or no parent. The median household income of young adults living with two parents was about \$113,000 in 2021, compared with less than \$75,000 for those living with one or no parent in their multigenerational household, after controlling for the size of the household. Similarly, young adults in multigenerational households with two parents (3%) were less likely than those with one parent (10%) or no parent in the household (14%) to be in poverty.

The financial advantages from living in a two-parent household may partly reflect that the young adults living in this arrangement are more likely to have completed at least a bachelor's degree than young adults living with one or no parent. Still, across most levels of educational attainment, young adults in multigenerational households with two parents are less likely than those with one or no parent to be living in poverty.

When it comes to financial contributions, the typical 25- to 34-year-old in a multigenerational household contributed 22% of the household's total income in 2021. In households headed by the young adult's parent, the young adult contributed 20% of the total income. In households headed by the young adult or the young adult's spouse, the median share of total household income contributed by the young adult was 37%.

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
