American Indian Heritage Month

In 1976 Congress authorized a week in October as Native American Awareness Week in celebration of American Indians. In 1990, President George Bush designated November as "National American Indian Heritage Month," to celebrate the history, arts, and traditions of the American Indian and Alaska Native peoples.

In 2014, the State of Washington designed the fourth Friday in November as **Native American Heritage Day**, a state and school legal holiday, as under state law, states offices and schools are already closed the day after Thanksgiving (fourth Thursday of the month).

The Inland Northwest and the Great War: A Centennial Commemoration of world War I

November 11, 2018 marks the 100th anniversary of Armistice Day, which ended World War I. While the war was a global conflict, it impacted communities across the United States, including Spokane. Thousands of residents played an important part in the war effort at home and abroad, and it affected daily life for everyone in the Inland Northwest. The exhibit features artifacts and photographs from the MAC’s collection as well as special programs to mark the centennial of The Armistice.

Salish Indigenous Language Revitalization

Salish is an indigenous language of the Pacific Northwest. There are 23 dialects of Salish that can be found in Washington, Northern Idaho, Montana, Oregon, and British Columbia. In the Spokane region, there are five Southern Interior Salish Languages: Spokane, Kalispel, Okanogan, Moses-Columbia, and Coeur d'Alene. All of these languages are considered to be endangered and tribes are working diligently to revitalize these languages. When a language dies, the world loses thousands of years of knowledge, wisdom, values, and worldview. This program gives you a glimpse of the state of the Southern Interior Salish languages, morphology (root meanings), the importance of the language, what barriers we face in language revitalization, and what tribes are actively doing to save the language.

The Oregon Treaty and the Indigenous Columbia Plateau

Dr. Laurie Arnold, Director of Native American Studies at Gonzaga University, will discuss the Oregon Treaty, which established the United States/Canadian border at the 49th parallel. In the decades prior to the treaty, the U.S. and Great Britain jointly occupied what is currently the Pacific Northwest and British Columbia. The treaty settled imperial questions but it disrupted Indigenous homelands, dividing ancestral Indigenous territories and separating families. Nearly 175 years after the boundary was established, reminders of co-occupancy abound. The Colville Confederated Tribes of Washington State have successfully fought for recognition of ancestral subsistence rights in British Columbia, and the U.S. and Canada are renegotiating the Columbia River Treaty.

Nov. 1 All Saints’ Day - Christian
A day for honoring saints, known and unknown.

Independence Day – Antigua & Barbuda
Gained independence from Great Britain on November 1, 1981.

Nov. 2 All Souls Day - Christian
Catholic Christians’ day of prayers of intercession for the dead. Prayers of the faithful are seen as helping to cleanse the souls of the departed.

Dia de los Muertos (Day of the Dead) - Mexico
Celebrated in parts of the U.S. and Central America. Families build altars in their homes surrounded with flowers, food and burning candles.

Dia de Finades – Portugal & Brazil

This holiday is celebrated by people visiting the deceased. They bring hearts and crowns made of flowers to the graves.

Take Our Kids to Work – Canada

Parents encouraged to take their daughters (and/or sons) to work on this day, and to use this opportunity to educate their children on the nature of employment.

Nov. 3 Bunka No Hi (Culture Day) - Japan

A national holiday dedicated to the love of freedom and promotion of Japanese culture.

Independence Day – Panama

Honors Panama's independence from Columbia in 1903.

Independence Day – Dominica

On this day in 1978, Dominica gained independence from Britain as it became a member of the Commonwealth. It is celebrated as a national holiday for three days.

Nov. 4 Qudrat (13th month) – Baha'i

The first day of the thirteenth Baha'i month. The English translation of Qudrat (Arabic) is Power.

Daylight Savings Time Ends – USA

Nov. 5 Guy Fawkes Day – UK

This is also known as Bonfire Night. Guy Fawkes was a leader of a group of Catholic men who were plotting to blow up the King and Parliament but were arrested in time. The English and Irish burn bonfires topped by a figure known as the guy. West Indians from the Bahamas and Barbados celebrate it as well.

Constitution Day – Dominican Republic

Marks the approval of the constitution in 1966.

Nov. 6 International Day for Preventing the Exploitation of the Environment - UN

On November 5, 2001, the UN General Assembly declared November 6th of each year as the International Day for Preventing the Exploitation of the Environment in War and Armed Conflict. The United Nations attaches great importance to ensuring that action on the environment is part of conflict prevention, peacekeeping and peacebuilding strategies - because there can be no durable peace if the natural resources that sustain livelihoods and ecosystems are destroyed.

Election Day - USA

Nov. 7 Diwali (Deepavali) – Hinduism

The festival of lights is dedicated to the goddess Kali in Bengal and to Lakshmi, the goddess of wealth in the rest of India.

Nov. 9 Independence Day – Cambodia

Celebrates independence from France in 1953.

Nov. 11 Veterans Day – USA

First proclaimed as Armistice Day in 1919 to commemorate the termination of WWI on November 11, 1918. Now honors all who served in the military.

- Nov. 11** **Remembrance Day – Canada, Australia, UK**
 This day commemorates the soldiers killed in WWI and WWII and in remembrance for all who have given their lives for freedom and in service of their country.
- Armistice Day – France**
 This day commemorates the signing of the armistice between the Allies and Germany at Compiègne, France, which ended hostilities on the Western Front of World War I.
- Nov. 13** **International World Kindness Day - International**
 The spark for World Kindness Day was lit at the Second Conference of the World Kindness Movement in November 1997 in Japan. Starting as random acts of kindness, the movement now has members in over 17 countries including the US and Canada. They are committed to building a global organization dedicated to inspire and promote kindness.
- Nov. 14** **World Diabetes Day – UN**
 Diabetes awareness campaign.
- Nov. 15** **Shichi-Go-San (Seven-Five-Three Festival) - Japan**
 Prayers are offered for children’s growth. The ages of three and five for boys and three and seven for girls are celebrated. Children dress up in their gala dresses and go with their parents to a Shinto shrine to pay a visit to the tutelary deity. Children are given thousand-year candy which is red and white (auspicious colors) with crane and turtle illustrations (symbols of long life).
- Independence Day - Palestine**
 A Palestinian Declaration of Independence was written by poet Mahmoud Darwish and then declared by PLO leader Yasser Arafat on 15 November, 1988,
- Republic Day – Brazil**
 Commemorates the 1889 proclamation that disposed Emperor Dom Pedro II and instituted a republic.
- Nov. 16** **International Day of Tolerance – UN**
 A day to advance human welfare, freedom, and progress everywhere, as well as to encourage tolerance, respect, dialogue, and cooperation among different cultures.
- Nov 17** **Lokashah Jayanti – Jain**
 This day commemorates the birth of a famous 15th century reformer, Lonka Saha, who opposed temple worship and use of Images.
- Nov. 18** **Independence Day – Latvia**
 Commemorates independence of the Republic of Latvia from German and Russian occupation on November 18, 1918.
- Fete de l’ Independence (Independence Day) –Morocco**
 Commemorates independence from France in 1956.
- Nov. 19** **Discovery Day – Puerto Rico**
 Celebrates the day Christopher Columbus encountered Puerto Rico on his second voyage to the New World in 1493.

- Nov. 19** **World Toilet Day – UN**
No laughing matter! A day to raise awareness and inspire action to tackle the global sanitation crisis. 2.4 billion people of the world's 7 billion do not have access to clean water and sanitation, and they struggle to stay well.
- Nov. 20** **Transgender Day of Remembrance – LGBT**
Begun in 1999, vigils, services and a variety of other events held to mark this day set aside to memorialize those killed due to anti-transgender hatred or prejudice.
- Universal Children's Day – UN**
Observed since 1954, a day to honor the needs of children and to make those needs known to governments. Observed on different days in over 120 countries.
- National Sovereignty Day - Argentina**
Commemorates the Battle of Vuelta de Obligado, when a small Argentine army stood against an British and French navy on November 20, 1845. Although the battle itself ended with an Argentine defeat, the losses of Britain and France in the whole military campaign were so high that both countries were forced to the bargaining table and signed a treaty with Juan Manuel de Rosas.
- Nov. 21** **World Television Day – UN**
In 1996, the UN General Assembly proclaimed this day "in recognition of the increasing impact television has on decision-making by alerting world attention to conflicts and threats to peace and security and its potential role in sharpening the focus on other major issues".
- Nov. 22** **Independence Day – Lebanon**
Celebrates the declaration of independence from France in 1943.
- Thanksgiving Day – USA**
Early American settlers gave thanks for good harvests by decorating their churches with fruits and vegetables and celebrated dinner with venison and waterfowl.
- Nov. 23** **Native American Heritage Day - USA**
"The Native American Heritage Day Resolution 2009" by the U.S. Senate designated the Friday after Thanksgiving as a day of heritage for Native Americans.
- Qawl (14th month) – Baha'i**
- Kinro Kansha No Hi - Japan**
The Japanese labor Thanksgiving Day when people express gratitude to each other for their labors throughout the year.
- Nov. 24** **Martyrdom of Guru Tegh Bahadur - Sikh**
This day commemorates his martyrdom (1621-75). He was the ninth of the Ten Gurus and executed in Delhi by the Mughal emperor. He died for the Sikh faith and also for religious liberty.
- Nov. 25** **St. Catherine's Day – Canada, France**
The patron saint of virgins and philosophers lived in Alexandria in the 4th century AD and was martyred after being tortured on a spiked wheel. At one time match-making balls were held on this day.
- National Day – Bosnia**
Marks the 1943 declaration of statehood within the federation of Yugoslavia.

- Nov. 25 International Day for Elimination of Violence Against Women – UN**
 The Secretary General's Campaign “Unite to End Violence Against Women” has proclaimed the 25th of each month as Orange Day. Among other actions, the Orange Day invites us to wear something orange to highlight its calls for the eradication of violence against women without reservation, equivocation or delay.
- Nov. 26 Day of Covenant – Baha’i**
 The eldest son and appointed successor of Baha’u’llah, Abdu’l-Baha, referred to this day as the Centre of the Covenant, which was established to safeguard the unity of the community.
- Nov. 28 Ascension of Abdu’l-Baha – Baha’i**
 After years of serving his father and safeguarding the unity of the faith, Abdu’l-Baha passed away in Haifa, Israel in 1921.
- Independence Day – Albania**
 Celebrates both the declaration of independence from the Ottoman Empire in 1912 and the country’s liberation from the Nazis in 1945.
- National day – Panama**
 Celebrates independence from Spain in 1821.
- Nov. 29 International Day of Solidarity with Palestinian People - UN**
- Nov. 30 St. Andrew’s Day – Scotland**
 This day commemorates the life of the patron saint of Scotland.
- Independence Day – Barbados**
 Barbados achieved independence from the British in 1966. The British had controlled Barbados as a colony since 1627.

Small bronze version of the “Bearing” sculpture:

Purpose: In 2011, the Bearing Sculpture Project was founded in order to seek funding for the construction and the physical placement of the life-size sculpture. The Bearing Sculpture Project will be free to the public and made available to the community and the visitors of Spokane, Washington. The location is at Sunset Park by the Centennial Trail, the very west end of Kendall Yards. The deadline of placing the life-size version in Sunset Park is May 2021. The elongated Sunset Park is be the edge of Kendall Yards and the west cliff, embraced by the Centennial Trail (north-south).

History: The small bronze version of the sculpture was funded by the Puffin Foundation, non-profit organization and following Puffin’s philosophy, namely that art belongs to all, the Bearing board is fundraising to donate the life-size bronze to the City of Spokane. The purpose is to engage people with an art image which is relevant to many people in our country: The healing of all who have seen armed conflicts.

The Project

The Bearing sculpture by Ildikó Kalapács will be cast life-sized and at the Sunset Park in Spokane. Bearing will be a gift to the community from the donors of the Bearing Public Art Fund.

The Message

Bearing celebrates the strength of women across the world. This sculpture depicts a woman carrying a man to represent the burden that war places on the human spirit. Dispossessed women carry the weight of family and spousal responsibilities, bearing the physical and emotional load of the aftermath of war.
