During this global crisis we focus on keeping our family, our friends, our community and ourselves safe, healthy and alive. Sometimes it feels as though the walls of my home have shrunk my world considerably. Working from home, cooking and listening to the daily daylong briefings has kept my focus away from the other social topics that are just as important.

Which brings me to the issues I've temporarily laid aside since "shelter-in-place/safer-at-home".

As you may recall and lest we forget, the Zonta International USA Caucus' top issues this past biennium have been to ensure the rights of women (ERA), protect sexual assault survivors on college campuses, renewal of VAWA, protecting Title IX, campaigning against human trafficking, CEDAW and ending child marriage laws.

Let's focus on child marriage laws and the Zonta International USA Caucus' ("USA Caucus") billboard campaign. Zonta International reported last year that "worldwide, almost 650 million women alive today were married before their 18th birthday.... if the current trends continue, the number of girls and women married as children will reach nearly 1 billion by 2030." (emphasis added). Delaware, New Jersey, American Samoa and the U.S. Virgin Islands have banned underage marriages *without exceptions*. So, that leaves only three territories and 48 states for us to work on. To that end, on April 10th Zonta USA Caucus launched the *Stop Child Marriages PSA Campaign*. The USA Caucus has spearheaded a national multimedia billboard campaign together with UNICEF and *Unchained at Last*. The groundwork for the campaign is very easy: (1) *uniting* the US Zonta Districts and their clubs to support ZI's mission to end child marriage at the State level and National level. In order to unite behind this campaign, there must be (2) *education and awareness* of child marriage taking place here in the US. Now that we're united behind the mission and are educated about the issue we need to (3) *act* to circulate this information to our communities and to our elected representatives. We do this by (4) *partnering* with likeminded organizations to get our message across.

The USA Caucus campaign toolkits have been made available at www.Zontausa.org/StopChildMarriagetoolkit. The USA Caucus is also providing the artwork. This is a campaign for U.S. clubs and districts to focus on Ending Child Marriage in the United States. You will be provided the tools to work with local billboard and digital signage companies. You will be provided the ABCs on billboards, who to contact and even a script to help you in the discussion with the billboard owners. The goal is to have "**Child Marriage is Happening Here**" billboards placed in every state capitol and Zonta city by 2021, and have the campaign go viral (Twitter, Facebook and Instagram).

If like me, you have baked and cooked enough to keep you busy during this pandemic, I encourage you to put down the whisk, measuring spoons or crochet needle and take a look at www.zontausa.org and stopchildmarriages.org, familiarize yourselves with the billboard campaign and with the help of Zoom/WebEx etc., meet with fellow club and/or area members and start plotting the courses of action you will take. If one billboard can start a discussion that may lead to change, then it is well worth the effort!


Step 1: Post a picture in your Instagram story and show what you are doing at home. This can be anything: cooking, watching a movie, reading etc.



Zonta Club of Leilehua Supports Aloha Diaper Bank

The Zonta Club of Leilehua collected disposable diapers for Aloha Diaper Bank at a recent "Done in a Day" project. Moms On A Mission Hawai'i established the Aloha Diaper Bank in 2018, after learning that 1 in 3 families are unable to afford diapers for their babies and that most subsidized assistance programs do not cover the cost of diapers.

The mission of Aloha Diaper Bank is to raise awareness of diaper need in Hawai'i and generate donations of dollars and diapers, so that all babies in Hawai'i remain clean, dry and healthy. Aloha Diaper Bank works with families of low income and those in crisis. It is a member of the National Diaper Bank Network.

Foundation Update

As we approach the end of our Centennial Anniversary biennium, we wanted to provide an update on fundraising for the Zonta International Foundation and the Endowment. Here's a summary up to the end of March:

The Zonta International Foundation is still well short of its goal to raise \$5,000,000 in this biennium. Contributions so far are just under \$4,000,000. We know many clubs make their annual gift to the Foundation toward the end of the fiscal year so we hope the budget will ultimately be met.

District 9 Zontians are among the most generous in the world. Our combined (club and individual) contributions per member are the second highest among all the districts.

We have the capacity to do more. Just 19% of our individual members have made a gift to the Foundation in this biennium. This compares to 34% by the end of March in the previous biennium. These are obviously difficult times for many. But if you can make a personal gift to the Foundation to help us meet our biennial goal, please do.

Clubs are encouraged to donate one third of their annual fundraising to the Zonta International Foundation. If your club hasn't yet, please do by May 31. If we all pitch in we will meet our \$5,000,000 goal.

With the unfortunate cancellation of our convention this year, we will miss the opportunity to come together and appreciate the extraordinary work of our Foundation and the projects that we fund through our community fundraising and personal gifts. Zonta e-Club of Silicon Valley and the Zonta Club of Berkeley

Did you know that eighty-eight percent of nurses in California are women? Zonta e-Club of Silicon Valley and the Zonta Club of Berkeley have found a way to help these brave women as

they serve others on the front lines of the COVID19 pandemic.

Our idea came from a teleconference brainstorming session on March 29. Our e-Club of Silicon Valley was lucky in that our LunaFest was held on March 7 before "shelter in place" orders were announced. However, many clubs in our Area 2 and throughout California had to cancel their planned events at short notice.

So, what happened to all of those Luna Bars donated to LunaFest by manufacturer, Clif Bar & Company we wondered? Club President, Tracy Loftesness contacted Anja Hakoshima to ask whether those nutrition bars could be donated to Bay Area nurses and distributed to hospitals by our clubs. Without much personal time for meal breaks and the need to extend the wearable life of personal protective equipment (PPE), nurses could grab a Luna Bar as a meal replacement.

We were pleased to hear back that the staff at Clif Bar in Emeryville liked our idea and were willing to make it happen. At the time of writing on April 7, hospitals in our surrounding counties are caring for:

Alameda County: 575 cases, 13 deaths
Contra Costa County: 410 cases, 7 deaths
Marin County: 134 cases, 7 deaths
San Francisco County: 622 cases, 9 deaths
San Mateo County: 589 cases, 21 deaths
Santa Clara County: 1,207 cases, 39 deaths



We're hoping to receive our bulk shipments of six cartons of Luna protein bars by April 10. We plan distribute them in our respective counties and neighborhoods before the peak of the raging virus in the Bay Area. Many clubs have held Lunafest fundraisers for ten years or more. It is comforting to continue collaborating with and for women in difficult times. - - Deb Blackmore



Zonta Club of Newport Harbor

As all fundraising events have come to a screeching halt recently, the Zonta Club of Newport Harbor (Area 4) had to get a little creative. Their annual LUNAFEST fundraiser typically nets around \$20,000 through ticket sales, silent auction and opportunity drawings. Those funds are distributed in the form of awards to women filmmakers at Chapman University's film school as well as their new partnership with Girls on the Run (www.girlsontherun.org).

This year, due to the event cancellation, the club listed many of their silent auction items on an online platform called BiddingOwl.com. Items included a Hawaii condo stay, a Montana VRBO stay, tickets to a Gwen Stefani concert, spa packages, jewelry and numerous gift baskets.

According to club president Christi Matthews, the online auction was a success. "We made about \$4,000 which is quite good given the circumstances," Christi said.

Adding to the ticket sales, which most have donated in lieu of being refunded, the film students and the Girls on the Run program will still receive their much needed funding from the club this year.





Jane M. Klausman Women in Business Scholarship



Scholarship description

Women have made great strides in the pursuit of education, careers and leadership roles they were once denied. However, they still comprise a minority of leaders in the business world. According to a [December 2019 list from Catalyst](#), 21.2 percent of S&P 500 companies' board seats are occupied by women, and just 5.2 percent of the companies' CEOs are women.

Because Zonta International believes in gender equality, the Jane M. Klausman (JMK) Women in Business Scholarship program helps women pursue undergraduate and master's degrees in business management and overcome gender barriers from the classroom to the boardroom. The Jane M. Klausman Women in Business Scholarship was established in 1998 from a generous bequest by Jane M. Klausman, a member of the Zonta Club of Syracuse, New York, USA, and the 1990-1995 Zonta International Parliamentarian.

The program operates at the Zonta club, district/region and international levels. Zonta annually awards up to 32 scholarships of **US\$2,000 each at the district/region level** and **six international scholarships in the amount of US\$8,000 each**.

Since the program's inception, Zonta has awarded 602 Scholarships, totaling more than US\$1.4 million, to 460 women representing 57 countries.

Eligibility

Women of any age, pursuing a business program with major field of specialization in accounting, finance, business management, marketing, operations management, human resources management, international business, or entrepreneurship at an accredited university/college/institute, who demonstrate outstanding potential in the field and are living or studying in a Zonta district/region, are eligible. Online students are also eligible to apply if enrolled at an accredited university/college/institute.

Students must be enrolled in at least the second year of an undergraduate program through the final year of a Master's program at the time the application is submitted to the local Zonta club. **Applicants must be in school at the time the scholarship funds are disbursed** and **must not graduate before December 2020**. Previous International Jane M. Klausman Women in Business Scholarship recipients may not apply to renew the Scholarship for a second year.

Application process

The **application process must start with a Zonta club**. All application materials must be received at a Zonta club by the printed deadline. If you downloaded the application, you must contact a Zonta club for deadline information.

Deadline

Applications are posted in January. **Applications must be completed and presented to Zonta clubs according to the club's assigned deadline**. A club recipient is selected, and the application is presented **to the governor/regional representative by 15 August or deadline determined by the district**. The district/region recipient is selected, and the **application is presented to Zonta International Headquarters by 15 October**. International recipients will be contacted by their Zonta club leader in January.

Women in Technology Scholarship 2020 Scholarship Updates



Scholarship description

The world economy, industry and sciences are becoming increasingly digitized, and these developments are disrupting society and familiar social processes. Women, however, are still largely underrepresented in technology fields. To create a world in which men and women have equal opportunities, women need to have an active role in technology and technological developments. Zonta International is pleased to offer its ***new Zonta International Women in Technology Scholarship*** to encourage women to pursue education, career opportunities and leadership roles in technology.

Funding

For the launch of this pilot program, the Zonta International Foundation awarded **US\$108,000** in scholarships: **30 district/region scholarships of US\$2,000 each** and **six international scholarships of US\$8,000 each**.

Pilot Program

As a ***pilot*** program, the Women in Technology Scholarship was offered ***one time in 2019***. The future of the program will be decided at the Zonta International Convention in July 2020. ***If the Scholarship does continue, we anticipate that the next round of scholarships will be awarded in 2021.***
