

California Department of Education: Inclusive Early Education Expansion Program

RFA: Late Summer to Early Winter 2018

Deadline: TBD

Amount: TBD

Match: Grant recipients must provide a \$1 local match for every \$3 state grant dollars received

Eligibility: School districts, child care and preschool providers

One-time grant - The initiative is intended to increase the availability of mainstream child care and preschool opportunities for children with disabilities from birth through age 5. Grant recipients must provide a \$1 local match for every \$3 state grant dollars received. Additionally, recipients must serve children in high-need communities. The grant proposal is one of many proposals included in the Governor's budget intended to address poor outcomes for students with disabilities. The one-time grant, open to school districts and other child care and preschool providers, could be used for a variety of purposes, including training, facility renovations, and equipment. Grant recipients would be required to demonstrate how the funding helped increase access to subsidized care for children with disabilities.

California Department of Education: Federal Emergency Grants for Schools Impacted by Wildfires

Deadline: Local Education Agency (LEA) must have submitted assessment by March 30, 2018. Local school district deadline has not yet been announced.

Under the K-12 Restart program, the Department is authorized to award funds to State educational agencies (SEAs) with students and schools impacted by the 2017 California wildfires. These SEAs, in turn, will provide assistance or services to local educational agencies (LEAs), including charter schools and private schools, to help defray expenses related to restarting school operations and restoring the normal learning environment for students and families affected by the hurricanes and wildfires.

California Department of Education: 2018-19 Agricultural Career Technical Education Incentive Grant

Deadline: TBD

Amount: The funding amount approved for each Agricultural Career Technical Education Incentive Grant will be based on the application submitted and the availability of funding. The first payment (75 percent) will be released approximately October 15, 2018. The second payment, final 25 percent plus/minus any adjustments and any specialized grant allocations, will be released approximately April 15, 2019. Failure to meet any Quality Criteria could result in the loss of 10 percent of the approved grant. In addition, failure to submit the Program Enrollment Report, Final Expenditure Report, or Future Farmers of America (FFA) Membership Roster by October 15, 2018 will result in a loss of 10 percent of the approved grant.

California Energy Commission: Alternative and Renewable Fuel and Vehicle Technology Program; Outreach, Education, and Collaborative Planning for California's Central Valley

Deadline: November 15, 2018

Amount: Up to \$1 million

Eligibility: Public and private entities in California's Central Valley (Fresno, Kern, Madera, Mariposa, Merced, San Benito, San Joaquin, Stanislaus, Tulare and Tuolumne Counties)

The California Energy Commission's (Energy Commission's) Alternative and Renewable Fuel and Vehicle Technology Program (ARFVTP) announces the availability of up to \$1,000,000 in grant funds to develop new outreach, education, and collaborative planning activities that will accelerate the adoption of alternative fuels and advanced technologies in California's Central Valley. The purpose of this solicitation is to assist the Central Valley in accelerating the adoption of alternative fuel vehicles and advanced vehicle technologies, with the ultimate goal of addressing greenhouse gas emissions, air quality emission challenges, and equity issues.

SCAG Sustainable Communities (SBI) Planning

Deadline: November 15, 2018

Amount: \$500,000 (active transportation plans); \$250,000 (community-wide & area plans, regional corridor plans and safety strategic plans)

Match: There are no match requirements for active transportation projects proposed through the SCP. However, the scoring criteria include points for Partnership and Leveraging to assess the extent to which there is a local commitment to the project.

The Southern California Association of Governments is accepting applications for the 2018 Sustainable Communities Program. For many years, SCAG has provided technical assistance and resources at no cost to local jurisdictions that support local planning and implementation of the Regional Transportation Plan/Sustainable Communities Strategy (RTP/SCS) under the banner of the Compass Blueprint Program and later the Sustainability Planning Grant program. The program recognizes sustainable solutions to local growth challenges and has resulted in local plans that promote sustainability through the integration of transportation and land use.

The goals of the 2018 Sustainable Communities Program are as follows:

- Provide needed planning resources to local jurisdictions for sustainability planning efforts;
- Develop local plans that support the implementation of the 2016 RTP/SCS; and

Deadline: November 19, 2018

Amount: Up to \$3 million for community-scale projects; Up to \$5 million for commercial-scale projects

Match: 50%

Eligibility: All public and private entities

This is a competitive grant solicitation. The California Energy Commission's (Energy Commission's) Alternative and Renewable Fuel and Vehicle Technology Program (ARFVTP) announces the availability of up to \$16,900,000 in grant funds for low carbon biofuel production projects at new and existing biofuel production facilities; existing biofuel production facilities must expand or modify facilities to increase production capacity.

The ARFVTP has an annual budget of approximately \$100 million and provides financial support for projects that:

- Reduce California's use and dependence on petroleum transportation fuels and increase the use of alternative and renewable fuels and advanced vehicle technologies.
- Produce sustainable alternative and renewable low-carbon fuels in California.
- Expand alternative fueling infrastructure and fueling stations.
- Improve the efficiency, performance and market viability of alternative light-, medium-, and heavy-duty vehicle technologies.
- Retrofit medium- and heavy-duty on-road and non-road vehicle fleets to alternative technologies or fuel use.
- Expand the alternative fueling infrastructure available to existing fleets, public transit, and transportation corridors.
- Establish workforce training programs and conduct public outreach on the benefits of alternative transportation fuels and vehicle technologies.

San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District: New Alternative Fuel Vehicle Purchase

Deadline: Not specified

Amount: \$20,000 per vehicle, up to \$100,000 per agency

Eligibility: Public agency such as cities, counties, special districts, public educational institutions

San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District: Statewide School Bus Retrofit Program

Deadline: Continuous until funding is exhausted

Amount: Up to \$20,000 per school bus

Match: Any costs not covered by the grant award

Eligibility: Any California public school district that directly provides transportation services, Joint Power Authority (JPA) that owns school buses, or private transportation agency that provides student transportation services under contract to public school districts are eligible to participate in this program. Private school districts are not eligible.

This program will provide incentive funds to retrofit 1991 and newer engine model year and vehicle model year school buses with an ARB verified Level-3 diesel emissions control strategy (retrofit).

California Department of Education: ASES Kids Code

Deadline: November 5, 2018

Amount: Allocation Formula: Enrollment up to 600 students—\$50,000.00 over three years; Enrollment 601–899 students—\$65,000.00 over three years; Enrollment 900+ students—\$80,000.00 over three years

Match: No

Eligibility: Local educational agencies. (1) Currently funded ASES grantee; (2) School must have verifiable Free and Reduced Price Meal data for 2016–17 through the California Longitudinal Pupil Achievement Data System to be considered in the funding determination.

California Department of Education: 21st Century Community Learning Centers (CCLC) and High School After School Safety and Enrichment for Teens (ASSETs)

Deadline: November 13, 2018

Amount: 21st CCLC \$50,000–\$112,500; ASSETs \$50,000–\$250,000

Match: No

Eligibility: Institutions of higher education, local educational agencies, nonprofit organizations, other organizations or agencies. Public or private entities are eligible to apply for 21st Century Community Learning Centers or ASSETs funds (20 United States Code §7173[a][3]) provided that they propose to serve Title I schools that have schoolwide programs, or a Title I school with at least 40 percent of the students eligible for Free or Reduced Price Meals and the school is 1) either in Program Improvement, or 2) been determined by the local educational agency to be in need of intervention and support, and all programs must serve the families of students at these schools.

Deadline: January 22, 2019

Amount: Maximum of \$122,850 for Elementary Schools. Maximum of \$163,800 for Middle Schools. \$8.19 per student proposed to be served, per day.

Match: Yes

Eligibility: Local educational agencies, other organizations or agencies. ASES programs at elementary and middle/junior high schools. Nonprofit organizations may apply, but the local educational agency or the public agency must agree to act as the fiscal agent of the grant.

The After School Education and Safety (ASES) Program is the result of the 2002 voter-approved initiative, Proposition 49. These programs are created through partnerships between schools and local community resources to provide literacy, academic enrichment and safe, constructive alternatives for students in kindergarten through ninth grade. Funding is designed to: (1) maintain existing before and after school program funding; and (2) provide eligibility to all elementary and middle schools that submit quality

applications throughout California. The application is for new grantees as well as existing grant recipients who wish to increase funding.

 **California Department of Education: ASES Frontier Transportation Grant**

Deadline: January 22, 2019

Amount: Maximum of \$15,000 per site, per school year

Match: No

Eligibility: Local educational agencies, other organizations or agencies. (1) The ASES program operates at a school site located in a Frontier Area (EC Section 8484.65). (2) A school site located in an area that has a population density of less than 11 persons per square mile may apply for funding pursuant to EC Section 8483.7. (3) The ASES grantee is in Good Standing Status—attendance reports, expenditure reports, and the Annual outcome-based data for grantees has been submitted and have been found to be complete.

The threshold amount for the 2017–18 fiscal year for necessary small SELPAs is the lesser of \$76,964.93, or one percent of the SELPA's subtotal apportionment (sum of the base, COLA, and growth). Single placement costs applied towards the threshold for reimbursements from the extraordinary cost pool for nonpublic schools and licensed children's institutions will also be applied to this threshold.

US Department of Education: Project School Emergency Response to Violence (SERV) Program

Deadline: Continuous

Amount: Immediate Services grant: Up to \$50,000 for a period of six months; Extended Services grants: Up to \$250,000 for 18 months

Eligibility: Local education agencies (LEAs) and institutions of higher education (IHEs)

This program funds short-term and long-term education-related services for local educational agencies (LEAs) and institutions of higher education (IHEs) to help them recover from a violent or traumatic event in which the learning environment has been disrupted. LEAs and IHEs may apply for two types of assistance under Project SERV: Immediate Services grants and

Extended Services grants. Immediate Services grants are intended to provide short-term support shortly after a traumatic event. Immediate Services grants are intended to provide a limited amount of funds to meet acute needs and restore the learning environment. Extended Services grants are intended to address the long-term recovery efforts that may be needed following a traumatic event. Extended Services applications are considered unsolicited grant applications and undergo a rigorous internal review by the Office of Safe and Healthy Students and the Office of the General Counsel. After review by staff members, the application is peer reviewed by an outside panel before being considered for funding.

PRESCHOOL/PRE-K AND CHARTER SCHOOL FUNDING

In 1986, the federal government authorized grants to states to plan and implement a comprehensive, community-based interagency system of early intervention services (Part C) for infants and toddlers with disabilities and their families. State legislation enables California to participate in the Part C program and create a statewide mandate for local educational agencies (LEAs) to serve all infants and toddlers with solely low incidence disabilities. It also required changes in procedures and services for all infants served by LEAs.

****New! California Department of Education: Public Charter Schools Grant Program Expansion Grant**

2018-19 Round Two

Deadline: November 29, 2018

Amount: \$4 million for entire program; Allocation Formula: Funding levels for Expansion Sub-grants are determined by the type of charter school. Applicants must indicate if the charter school is a classroom based, non-classroom based, virtual or online charter school. Classroom and Non-classroom based charter schools may apply for a base grant of up to \$60,000. Classroom based charter schools only are eligible for additional funding based on the number of students included in the expansion. Additional funding will be calculated based on enrollment of students in specified expansion grade levels. Enrollment numbers must be verified on California Longitudinal Pupil Achievement Data System (CALPADS) certified for each school. Classroom based schools may receive an additional \$2,500 per pupil with a maximum of \$100,000. Virtual or on-line

charter schools, a subset of non-classroom based instruction, defined by California Code of Regulations 11963.5, are charter schools in which at least 80 percent of teaching and student learning occurs via the internet shall only be eligible for a maximum base award of \$30,000.
