

The School Reopening Ventilation and Energy Efficiency Verification and Repair Program (SRVEVR) will provide funding to local educational agencies for the reasonable costs of HVAC assessment, general maintenance and adjustment, filter replacement, and carbon dioxide monitor installation as well as certain repairs, replacements and other improvements to HVAC systems. SRVEVR will prioritize investments in facilities in underserved communities and those near freeways or industrial facilities.

The School Noncompliant Plumbing Fixture and Appliance Program (SNPFA) will provide grants to local educational agencies and state agencies to replace noncompliant plumbing fixtures and appliances that fail to meet water efficiency standards again prioritizing funding for underserved communities.

****New! U.S. Department of Agriculture: Farmers Market Promotion Program (FMPP)**

Deadline: TBD – Should be released Spring 2021

Amount: FMPP Capacity Building projects range from \$50,000 to \$250,000. Community Development Training and Technical Assistance projects range from \$100,000 to \$500,000.

Match: Yes – 25%

Eligibility: Agricultural businesses and cooperatives, Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) networks and associations, Food Councils, Economic development corporations, Local governments, Nonprofit and public benefit corporations, Producer networks or associations, Regional farmers' market authorities, Tribal governments

The Farmers Market Promotion Program (FMPP) funds projects that develop, coordinate and expand direct producer-to-consumer markets to help increase access to and availability of locally and regionally produced agricultural products by developing, coordinating, expanding, and providing outreach, training, and technical assistance to domestic farmers markets, roadside stands, community-supported agriculture programs, agritourism activities, online sales or other direct producer-to-consumer (including direct producer-to-retail, direct producer-to-restaurant and direct producer-to-institutional marketing) market opportunities.

****New! CalTrans: Active Transportation Program (ATP) Grant Statewide Cycle 6**

Deadline: TBD – Should be released late Spring 2022

Amount: Minimum funding request is \$250,000 (Non-infrastructure projects, Safe Routes to Schools projects, Recreational Trails projects, and Planning projects are exempt from this and may apply for smaller amounts).

Match: None required

Eligibility: cities, counties, county transportation commissions, regional transportation planning agencies, MPOs, school districts, and transit districts

The Active Transportation Program was created to encourage increased use of active modes of transportation, such as biking and walking. Funding from the Active Transportation Program may be used to

fund the development of community wide bike, pedestrian, safe routes to schools, or active transportation plans in predominantly disadvantaged communities. The goals of the Active Transportation Program are to:

- Increase the proportion of trips accomplished by biking and walking or Increase the safety and mobility of non-motorized users.
- Advance the active transportation efforts of regional agencies to achieve greenhouse gas reduction
- Enhance public health, including reduction of childhood obesity using programs including, but not limited to, projects eligible for Safe Routes to School Program funding.
- Ensure that disadvantaged communities fully share in the benefits of the program.
- Provide a broad spectrum of projects to benefit many types of active transportation users.

The Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) administers a program to provide opportunities for the diversion of tires from landfill disposal, prevent illegal tire dumping, and promote markets for recycled-content products. The Tire-Derived Product Grant (TDP) Program is a reimbursement grant designed to use TDPs for repurposing projects such as pathways, landscaping, mats, playground surfacing, curb stops, and ramps.

U.S. Department of Health and Human Services: Expanding the Opioids System Model to more comprehensively incorporate fentanyl, stimulants use, polysubstance use and associated outcomes.

Funding Opportunity Number: FOR-FD-20-029

In 2018, OPSA launched an effort to develop of a quantitative system-dynamic model of the opioid crisis to help FDA a) understanding the complexity of the interconnected mechanisms of the crisis, and b) assess potential impacts (intended and unintended) of possible policy actions to address the crisis. In Sept 2019, OPSA awarded a 1-year cooperative agreement (Harvard/Mass General; FDA's RFA-FD-19-026) to

complete an initial version of the model ready for policy analysis, and in Aug 2020, OPSA awarded a 1-year cooperative agreement (Harvard/Mass General; FDA's RFA-FD-20-031) to account for societal outcomes beyond overdose as well as cost-effectiveness of potential policies. The current proposal will expand the FDA's model to more comprehensively incorporate fentanyl, stimulants and polysubstance use and their interactive effects on opioids use, misuse, addiction, use disorder treatment, and associated outcomes. The main focus of this project would be on modeling the growing number of opioid overdose deaths involving people who are primarily stimulant or polysubstance users, as an important emerging aspect of the opioid crisis. The research will also include quantification of the effects of harm reduction approaches (e.g., naloxone distribution to opioid users, increasing treatment availability for Opioid Use Disorder [OUD]) on overdoses involving fentanyl and other polysubstance use. Additionally, the research will identify and incorporate aspects of mental health that are feasible for inclusion into the model.

The HHS Office of Minority Health is offering funding to support State and local collaborative teams in implementing a methodological framework and strategies for assessing and addressing structural racism in health policies, developed through a complementary policy academy initiative. In particular, awardees will: (1) Obtain governmental and public buy-in for engaging in this policy collaborative endeavor; (2) Create a multi-sector team (e.g., comprised of leadership from the governor's/mayor's office and health, behavioral health, child welfare, justice, education, commerce, community service and other agencies, and from community organizations); (3) Conduct a review of existing policies to identify the areas primed for a structural racism assessment; (4) Develop or revise a policy (or policies) to address structural racism and improve health outcomes; (5) Implement the new/revised policy and evaluate its impact on health outcomes for racial and ethnic minorities within their jurisdiction; and (6) Create and implement strategies to communicate, sustain and spread policies resulting in improved health outcomes for racial and ethnic minorities. BACKGROUND: Racial and ethnic minority populations experience a number of disparities which contribute to poor health outcomes. Structural racism, evidenced in residential segregation, inequitable allocation and quality of services and resources such as health care and education, disproportionate contact with the justice system, and lack of access to employment opportunities, plays a persistent and large role in historical disadvantage and supports the persistence of racial and ethnic health disparities.

Projects may be currently active or will start within three months after applying, with the main goals able to be completed in a three-month period. Exceptions will be made to time requirements due to restrictions caused by the virus. A coaching and verification call takes place with all grantees to discuss project plans and confirm identity.

Funding is intended to ensure children receive mental health services despite school closures due to Coronavirus (COVID-19). This program will support long-distance mental health services through telecommunication technologies. SBHSN is accepting applications to implement Telehealth mental health program services for children impacted by short and long-term school closures. Telehealth is the distribution of health-related services and information via electronic information and telecommunication technologies. It allows long-distance patient and clinician contact, care, advice, reminders, education, intervention, monitoring, and remote admissions. The purpose of this program is to promote a collaborative and integrated approach amongst the education and healthcare community to ensure students succeed academically, socially, and emotionally while confined to home learning mandates during the nation's current national emergency. Funding will initially support the coordination of behavioral health services utilizing Telehealth technology by licensed mental health professionals who will also coordinate academic-support activities in collaboration with school district designated program personnel. Once schools reopen, the funding will support the placement of a mental health professional on school campuses.

South Coast QAMD: Heavy-Duty Diesel Trucks Under the Proposition 1B - Goods Movement

Emission Reduction Program

Deadline: April 30, 2021

Amount: Varies by type of vehicle to be replaced

Eligibility: Any entity who plans to own and operate the Program-funded electrification infrastructure at a truck stop, rail yard or other freight facility, with agreement from the site owner, including any entity who plans to own and operate an electric charging station or hydrogen fueling unit.

California Volkswagen (VW) Mitigation Trust

Deadline: First come first served basis

Amount: Up to \$3,250,000

Match: Match funding from the applicant is encouraged and required for school bus purchases (at least 5 percent) and all non-government owned purchases (at least 25 percent)

Eligibility: Owners of transit buses, school buses and shuttle buses. Administered by San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District, but available statewide.

The Zero-Emission Transit, School and Shuttle Bus Project provides funding for new zero-emission replacement buses for owners of transit, school, and shuttle buses. This project mitigates excess NOx emissions, reduces pollution in disadvantaged and low-income communities, supports advanced technology vehicle and equipment deployments and accelerates the zero-emission transformation of the heavy-duty fleet. **(Zero-emission school bus bin is oversubscribed and no longer being accepted. Money for transit and shuttle buses is still available.)**

South Coast Air Quality Management District (AQMD): Electric Lawn and Garden Equipment

Deadline: Not stated

Amount: Discounted equipment. One equivalent operable gasoline- or diesel-powered piece of lawn and garden equipment must be scraped to qualify for incentive funding towards battery electric replacement equipment.

Eligibility: Local governments, school districts, nonprofit organizations

PROGRAM GOALS: Improve air quality by exchanging older, polluting gasoline- or diesel-powered commercial lawn and garden equipment for new zero emission, battery electric commercial grade equipment

for operation within South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) four county region. Special focus will be given to environmental justice (EJ) or disadvantaged communities.

San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District: Electric School Bus Incentive Program

Deadline: Continuous

Amount: Up to \$400,000

Match: Not specified

Eligibility: Must be in SJVAPCD eligible counties. The applicant must be the school bus owner that is a public school district, Joint Power Authorities (JPA), or private company that is contracted with a public school to transport public school children to and from school.

The Electric School Bus Incentive Program provides monetary incentives for the replacement of existing diesel yellow school buses that transport public school children to and from school with all electric school buses. Eligible applicants are public school districts, Joint Power Authorities (JPA), and privately owned yellow school buses that are contracted with a public school to transport public school children. Applicants must obtain an executed contract from the SJVAPCD prior to the order or purchase of new all electric school bus.

San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District: New Alternative Fuel Vehicle Purchase

Amount: \$20,000 per vehicle, up to \$100,000 per agency

Eligibility: Public agency such as cities, counties, special districts, public educational institutions


