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AFTER SCHOOL FUNDING

Deadline: Continuous

Amount: Varies

BUS & VEHICLE FUNDING

California Air Resources Board (CARB)/North Coast Unified Air Quality Management District: Rural School Bus Pilot Project Statewide Grant

Deadline: Application period runs from March 1 – March 30, 2017

Amount: Zero-emission school bus - \$400,000; Electric school bus infrastructure - \$5,000; Hybrid/Internal combustion engine school bus and incremental renewable fuel costs - \$165,000

Match: Varies. Any costs not covered by the grant award.

Eligibility: Any Public School District, Public Charter School, County Offices of Education, Joint Power Authorities (JPA) in the state of California as well as Divisions of State Special Schools of the California Department of Education

Through a partnership with Senator Mike McGuire and the California Air Resources Board (CARB) the North Coast Unified Air Quality Management District has been asked to administer the Rural School Bus Pilot Project for the State of California. The main goal of this grant program is accelerating the turnover of California school bus fleets to lower carbon transportation choices, especially in rural school districts who have less access to other funding sources. Applicants will select from one of the following project types:

- Fleet expansion for zero-emission school buses
 - Bus replacement for conventional fuel buses with a hybrid or internal combustion engine.
- The projects will require the use of renewable fuel types

Applications for all-electric projects will be allowed to apply for up to three buses, while projects using renewable fuel will be allowed one bus per School District. Applicants will need to identify and provide information about their replacement or "old bus" as part of the initial application.

San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District (SJVAPCD) Public Benefit Program New Alternative Fuel Vehicle Purchase Grant

Deadline: Continuous until funding exhausted

Amount: \$20,000 per vehicle (max); \$100,000 per agency (max)

Eligibility: School districts in the five-county area of the SJVAPCD in central California

This component provides funding for the purchase of new alternative fueled vehicles (Electric, Plug-In Hybrid, CNG, LNG, LPG, etc.) Applications for this component are currently being accepted on a first-come, first-serve basis.

SCAQMD Funding for Particulate Matter Traps on School Diesel Backup Generators

Deadline: Continuous until funds are exhausted

Amount: \$12,500 for retrofitting generators up to 125 kw; \$20,000 for retrofitting generators greater than 125 kw

Match: None

Eligibility: public school districts *in the SCAQMD service area.*

Funding opportunity for retrofitting diesel backup generators with PM traps located at or near schools, in an amount not to exceed \$250,000. This program, which supplements an earlier

program, provides incentives to reduce children's exposure to toxic diesel particulate matter from diesel generators.

SCAQMD: Funding for Replacement of Onboard Fuel Tanks of CNG School Buses that are Older than Fourteen Years

Deadline: Continuous until funds are exhausted

Amount: \$20,000 per CNG Bus

Match: Any costs not covered by the allocation

Eligibility: School Districts *in the SCAQMD service area.*

Funding opportunity for the replacement of onboard CNG fuel tanks that have reached their expiration dates. Only public school districts and joint powers authority are eligible for this funding. Under the California Air Resources Board (CARB) program guidelines, only CNG buses between 14 and 16 years are eligible for such tank replacements. A maximum of \$20,000 is available per CNG bus to replace onboard CNG fuel tanks. Funds are available from AQMD's AB 923 funds (Fund 80) and eligible applications will be funded on first-come, first-served basis.

The Sanitation Districts of Los Angeles County: Free Buses for Schools Program

Deadline: Continuous while funding is available

Amount: Varies. LACSD will reimburse schools for bus transportation costs.

Match: None

Eligibility: Teachers/classrooms for grades 5-12 at a public or private school in the Sanitation District's service in LA County.

The Sanitation Districts of Los Angeles County are offering you a free field trip to our facilities (while funds last). If you qualify, we will reimburse you for your bus transportation costs to visit either a wastewater treatment plant, materials recovery facility or one of our other sites. This is a unique opportunity for you and your students. You will get to see, learn, and really experience what happens to your sewage or trash. It is fun, interesting, and educational! Please note that funds for buses are limited and may run out. A school is eligible for one free bus during the school year.

CAREER TECHNICAL EDUCATION FUNDING

Kessler Foundation: Signature Employment Grants

Deadline: Online grant concepts are due March 17, 2017; invited proposals must be submitted by July 10, 2017

Amount: \$100,000 to \$250,000

Match: None

Eligibility: Nonprofit organizations, public or private schools, and public institutions, such as universities and government agencies based in the United States or any of its territories are eligible to apply.

The Kessler Foundation's Signature Employment Grants provide support for non-traditional solutions that increase employment outcomes for individuals with disabilities. Grants ranging from \$100,000 to \$250,000 per year for up to two years are awarded nationally to fund pilot initiatives, demonstration projects, or social ventures that lead to the generation of new ideas to solve the high unemployment and underemployment of individuals with disabilities. Preference is given to interventions that overcome specific employment barriers related to long-term dependence on public assistance or advance competitive employment in a cost-effective manner. Although proposals can be submitted from any state, this year the Foundation has prioritized serving Americans with disabilities that live in rural states and other areas with more limited service delivery. California Department of Education (CDE): California Health Science Capacity Building Project Grant

Deadline: March 1, 2017

Amount: \$30,000–\$60,000

Match: None.

Eligibility: Local educational agencies.

Grant funds may be used to either establish a new Health Science Pathway Program or to enhance an existing Health Science Pathway Program. Successful grantees will be expected to develop a standards-based curriculum, to develop a coherent sequence of courses, and to provide health science content and context inclusive of grades seven through twelve. Grant funds must not be used to maintain existing programs. Districts must complete an application and submit all required documents as described in the Request for Application. Applicants will be awarded up to \$30,000 to \$60,000 in urban, suburban, and rural communities in California. Final award determinations will be based on application quality, geographic location, type of grant requested, and on additional funding received by the school for the requested pathway program. Programs without significant additional funding will receive priority.

CAMPUS SAFETY FUNDING

Firehouse Subs Public Safety Foundation Grants

Deadline: Quarterly (December 1, 2016; March 2, 2017; June 2, 2017; September 7, 2017; December 1, 2017)

Amount: \$15,000 - \$25,000

Match: None

Eligibility: Public Safety Organizations, including fire departments, police departments, military entities, schools, registered non-profits, etc. in communities served by a Firehouse Subs restaurant.

Firehouse Subs Public Safety Foundation was founded in 2005 in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina. The foundation will fund projects in the following areas: Life-saving equipment, prevention education, scholarships and continued education, disaster relief and military support.

Video Insight Security Grant

Deadline: Continuous

Amount: Varies; \$250,000 allocated

Video Insight has developed the School Security Grant to help schools that lack funds implement a video surveillance solution and to give back to these communities in need. Beginning in January 2014 - and for each month throughout the year - a school or college will be chosen to receive the software and equipment necessary to implement a video surveillance solution. Each Video Insight School Security Grant recipient will receive the following equipment: 48 Video Insight Video Management Software (VMS) licenses; 16 IP video surveillance cameras; 1 video encoder; 10 years of the Video Insight Software Upgrade Program (SUP). Applications are completed online.

COUNSELING & MENTAL HEALTH FUNDING

US Department of Education: Project School Emergency Response to Violence (SERV) Program

Deadline: Continuous

Amount: Immediate Services grant: Up to \$50,000 for a period of six months; Extended Services grants: Up to \$250,000 for 18 months

Match: None required

Eligibility: Local education agencies (LEAs) and institutions of higher education (IHEs)

This program funds short-term and long-term education-related services for local educational agencies (LEAs) and institutions of higher education (IHEs) to help them recover from a violent or traumatic event in which the learning environment has been disrupted. LEAs and IHEs may apply for two types of assistance under Project SERV: Immediate Services grants and Extended Services grants. Immediate Services grants are intended to provide short-term support shortly after a traumatic event. Immediate Services grants are intended to provide a limited amount of funds to meet acute needs and restore the learning environment. Extended Services grants are intended to address the long-term recovery efforts that may be needed following a traumatic event. Extended Services applications are considered unsolicited grant applications and undergo a rigorous internal review by the Office of Safe and Healthy Students and the Office of the General Counsel. After review by staff members, the application is peer reviewed by an outside panel before being considered for funding.

FACILITIES FUNDING

CalRecycle: 2017-18 Tire-Derived Product Grant Program

Primary Deadline: April 12, 2017

Secondary Deadline: May 11, 2017 (for Resolution & EPPP documents only)

Amount: \$150,000 per grant award. \$1 Million has been allocated for the entire program for 2017-18.

Match: Any project costs not covered by the grant award, including construction and installation.

Eligibility: Public entities including: California cities, counties, public school districts, public colleges and universities, special districts, park or recreational districts, and state agencies.

CalRecycle administers a program to provide opportunities for the diversion of tires from landfill disposal, prevent illegal tire dumping, and promote markets for recycled-content products. The Tire-Derived Product (TDP) Grant Program is a reimbursement grant designed to use TDPs for re-purposing projects such as pathways, landscaping, mats, playground surfacing, curb stops, and ramps. Only one application per qualifying entity will be accepted and only for projects within California. A minimum of 2,500 California-generated waste tires must be used per application. Multiple products/projects may be combined to achieve this minimum. Project(s) must not have previously received CalRecycle grant funds.

CA Department of Education (CDE): FY 2015-16 California Renovation and Repair Loan Program

Deadline: Continuous. Applications may be submitted anytime during the fiscal year.

Amount: Varies. \$10 Million allocated to entire program.

Match: None

Eligibility: institutions of higher education, local educational agencies

The California Renovation and Repair Loan (CRRL) Program provides loans for the renovation and repair of existing facilities in order to ensure eligible California Department of Education (CDE) contractors meet applicable health and safety standards for federal and state licensing compliance. The CRRL Program funds are interest-free loans and may be reimbursed with contract funds. The Early Education and Support Division (EESD) will accept applications continuously; however, the EESD will award loans based on the availability of funding. Required Eligibility Criteria: The CRRL Program funds are available to contractors who contract with CDE to operate the California State Preschool Program (CSPP), the General Child Care and Development Program (CCTR), the Migrant Child Care and Development Program (CMIG), and/or the California Handicapped Child Care and Development Program (CHAN). Within the Child Care Facilities Revolving Fund (CCFRF), \$10 million is available to Local Education Agencies (LEAs) with CSPP contracts only. An additional \$12.4 is available for LEAs and non-LEAs.

California Energy Commission (CEC): Interest Rate 0% Loan Financing for Energy Efficiency & Energy Generation Projects

Deadline: Applications are funded on a first-come, first-served basis until funding is exhausted

Amount: Maximum loan amount of \$3 million per applicant

Financing Terms: Loans must be repaid from energy cost savings or other legally available funds within a maximum term of 20 years.

Eligibility: School districts, Charter schools, County offices of education, State special schools <http://www.energy.ca.gov/efficiency/financing/>

The CEC is offering loans financing for energy efficiency and energy generation projects for local educational agencies. Projects with proven energy and demand cost savings are eligible. An energy audit report or feasibility study is required to demonstrate energy cost savings for the installed projects. Loan funds can only be used to fund project activity after the loan award has been approved and fully executed. Funding cannot be used for retroactive funding of installed projects. Examples of Qualified Projects include:

- Lighting systems
- Heating, ventilation and air conditioning equipment
- Energy management systems and equipment controls
- Pumps and motors
- Building envelope and insulation
- Energy generation including renewable energy and combined heat and power projects
- Load shifting projects, such as thermal energy storage

CA Office of Public School Construction (OPSC): Facility Hardship Program

Deadline: Continuous

Amount: Estimated \$13.7 Million left in program

Eligibility: To be eligible for a facility hardship grant the district must demonstrate that one of two conditions exists: facilities must be repaired/replaced due to an imminent health and safety threat, or existing facilities have been lost to fire, flood, earthquake or other disaster.

The Facility Hardship program assists districts with funding when it has been determined that the district has a critical need for pupil housing because the condition of the facilities, or the lack of facilities, presents an imminent threat to the health and safety of the pupils. There are two types of Facility Hardship projects based on the Current Replacement Cost, as defined in School Facility Program Regulation Section 1859.2:

1. Replacement: Cost to mitigate the health and safety threat is greater than 50 percent of the cost of replacement.
2. Rehabilitation: Cost to mitigate the health and safety threat is less than 50 percent of the cost of replacement.

CA Office of Public School Construction (OPSC): Seismic Mitigation Program

Deadline: Continuous

Amount: Estimated \$94.5 Million left in program

Eligibility: Districts with qualifying Category 2 buildings under the School Facility Program (SFP) Regulation Section 1859.2

The Seismic Mitigation Program (SMP) is a subset of the Facility Hardship program that provides for the seismic repair, reconstruction, or replacement of the “most vulnerable” school facilities. SMP projects must meet the following requirements:

- The building is of an eligible Category 2 building type
- The building was originally designed for occupancy by students and staff

- DSA concurs that the building has the potential to collapse either due to ground shaking or due to faulting, liquefaction, or landslides
- Construction contract is signed after May 20, 2006

USDA Rural Development: Community Facilities Grants & Loans

Deadline: Continuous

Community Facilities Programs provides grants to assist in the development of essential community facilities in rural areas and towns of up to 20,000 in population. Grants are authorized on a graduated scale. Applicants located in small communities with low populations and low incomes will receive a higher percentage of grants. Grants are available to public entities such as municipalities, counties, parishes, boroughs, and special-purpose districts, as well as non-profit corporations and tribal governments.

FOOD & NUTRITION FUNDING

California Department of Education: Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program

Deadline: March 15, 2017

Amount: The amount of the individual school grant will depend on the total enrollment of the schools participating in the program. Typically the grant awards \$50 to \$75 per student.

Match: None

Eligibility: Public school districts, county offices of education, direct-funded charter schools, private schools, and residential child care institutions who are School Food Authorities are eligible to apply on behalf of elementary school sites that participate in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP). below.

The California Department of Education (CDE), through the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program (FFVP), will grant funds to eligible elementary school sites to provide students with a variety of free fresh fruit and vegetable snacks throughout the school day as a supplement to (and not part of) the school breakfast and school lunch programs, and to teach students about good nutrition. The FFVP encourages schools to partner with other entities in the community to support their efforts.

- *Required Eligibility Criteria:* Applicants must submit a grant application package by the due date. An eligible school site MUST: (1) be an elementary school (see Background link below for definition), (2) participate in the NSLP, (3) have 50 percent or more of its students eligible for free or reduced-price (F/RP) meals, (4) provide fresh fruits and vegetables during the school day, (5) agree to make free fresh fruits and vegetables available to all enrolled children, (6) widely publicize within the school the availability of fresh fruits and vegetables, and (7) have documented support of the food service manager, principal, and district superintendent.
- *Additional Eligibility Criteria:* Per federal law, schools are chosen based on their percentage of F/RP students, with the highest priority given to schools with the highest percentages of low-income students to the maximum extent practicable. However, the CDE may select a school with a lower percentage of free/reduced-price enrollment over a school with a higher percentage to either manage the per-student allocation requirements of \$50 to \$75, or if there are significant concerns about a school's ability to properly implement and operate the FFVP.

California Department of Education (CDE): 2016-2017 Child and Adult Care Food Program (Apportionment)

Deadline: Applications or other data may be submitted at any time during the fiscal year (October 1, 2016 to September 30, 2017)

Amount: Allocation. Agencies are reimbursed for the number and types of meals served according to the participant's household eligibility for free, reduced-price, or base rate meals. In addition to \$532,642,400 in federal funds, \$2,075,000 in state funds are available for child care agencies.

Match: None

Eligible Applicants: Institutions of higher education, local educational agencies, nonprofit organizations, other organizations or agencies

Required Eligibility Criteria: Public, private nonprofit, and private for-profit agencies; agencies licensed or approved to provide nonresidential day care to children or chronically impaired adults. Public or private nonprofit emergency shelters may also be eligible for subsidy. Each program component serves a different population or age group. At-risk afterschool programs must be located in a low income area.

The Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) is a state and federally funded program that provides funding to licensed child care centers, adult day care centers, and organizations that sponsor day care homes to ensure participants receive nutritionally adequate meals and snacks while in care. Funding is also available for meals and snacks at emergency shelters and afterschool programs.

California Department of Education (CDE): 2016-2017 School Nutrition Programs (Apportionment)

Deadline: Applications or other data may be submitted at any time during the fiscal year (October 1, 2016 to September 30, 2017)

Amount: Allocation. Agencies are reimbursed for the number and types of meals or pints of milk served, per the student's household eligibility for free, reduced-price, or paid meals or milk. There is \$2,093,630,000 in federal funds and \$156,705,000 in state funds available.

Match: None

Eligible Applicants: Local educational agencies

Required Eligibility Criteria: Public and private nonprofit schools (including public charter schools) are eligible to participate. Also eligible are public and private, nonprofit licensed residential child care institutions (e.g., group homes, juvenile halls, orphanages). Residential child care institutions and all for-profit schools and agencies are not eligible for the Seamless Summer Feeding Option or the State Meal Program. No for-profit schools or agencies are eligible for federal or California state School Nutrition Programs funding.

Funding supports five school meal and milk programs to assist schools, districts, and other nonprofit agencies in providing nutritious meals and milk to children at reasonable prices or free to qualified applicants. The five programs are the National School Lunch Program (NSLP), School Breakfast Program (SBP), Seamless Summer Feeding Option (SSFO), Special Milk Program (SMP), and State Meal Program (STMP).

California Department of Education (CDE): 2016-2017 Summer Food Service Program (Apportionment)

Deadline: Applications or other data may be submitted at any time during the fiscal year (October 1, 2016 to September 30, 2017)

Amount: Allocation. Sponsors receive reimbursement based on the number and types of meals served multiplied by the operational and administrative rate. There is \$33,000,000 in federal funds available for the SFSP.

Match: None

Eligible Applicants: Institutions of higher education, local educational agencies, nonprofit organizations, other organizations or agencies.

Required Eligibility Criteria: Summer sites must be established to serve all children in the community while on school vacation and not enrolled for day care. Meals must be served to all

children at the same time. Sponsoring agencies serving snacks after school, must serve meals during summer vacation. Application results are provided within 30 days.

Funding provides reimbursement for meals served to children who are on school vacation in areas where 50 percent of the children qualify for free or reduced-price school meals. Camp sites may receive reimbursement for serving meals to children who are income eligible. Non-school agencies may be reimbursed for snacks in afterschool settings. Entities eligible to be a Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) sponsor include public and private schools; Indian tribal governments; units of local, municipal, or county governments; and other public or private nonprofit agencies.

Pinnacle Food Service: 2016 School Breakfast Building Grant Program

Deadlines: Quarterly (January – March 2016; April – June 2016; July – September 2016; October – December 2016)

Amount: Up to \$1,000

Match: None

Eligibility: K-12 public and private schools or districts that participate in the USDA School Breakfast Program; eligible schools/districts must have a reimbursable breakfast ADP of less than 40% for the school or building applying for the grant to increase your breakfast program participation.

Pinnacle Food Service has developed the Breakfast Building Grant Program to help K-12 public and private schools or districts achieve their breakfast participation goals. These \$2,500 grants help schools increase kids' access to fresh fruits and veggies and nutrition education. Skoop is donating 3% of every purchase to the Chef Ann Foundation to fund Project Produce grants to get more vegetables and fruits in front of school age children. Eligibility: nonprofits, NGOs, public schools, or government entities serving a charitable purpose

The Fruit Tree Planting Foundation (FTPF) is an award-winning international nonprofit charity dedicated to planting fruitful trees and plants to alleviate world hunger, combat global warming, strengthen communities, and improve the surrounding air, soil, and water. FTPF orchard donations are available for recipients who pledge to care for the trees and utilize them for a charitable purpose. If selected for an orchard donation, FTPF will provide high-quality fruit trees and shrubs, organic soil amendments, equipment, planting volunteers, and on-site orchard design work, horticultural workshops, and aftercare training—with the goal of improving the surrounding environment and providing a source of healthy nutrition for the community.
