## UPCOMING FUNDING – ALL CATEGORIES

### **California Volkswagen (VW) Mitigation Trust**

Deadline: Funding exhausted January December 2019. May reopen at a later date.

Amount: Up to \$3,250,000

Match: Match funding from the applicant is encouraged and required for school bus purchases (at least 5 percent) and all non-government owned purchases (at least 25 percent)

Eligibility: Owners of transit buses, school buses and shuttle buses. Administered by San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District, but available statewide.

The Zero-Emission Transit, School and Shuttle Bus Project provides funding for new zero-emission replacement buses for owners of transit, school, and shuttle buses. This project mitigates excess NOx emissions, reduces pollution in disadvantaged and low-income communities, supports advanced technology vehicle and equipment deployments and accelerates the zero-emission transformation of the heavy-duty fleet.

### **U.S. Department of Health and Human Services: Basic Center Program**

The Runaway and Homeless Youth Program's Basic Center Program (BCP) provides temporary shelter and counseling services to youth who have left home without permission of their parents or guardians, have been forced to leave home, or other homeless youth who might otherwise end up in the law enforcement or in the child welfare, mental health, or juvenile justice systems. BCPs work to establish or strengthen community-based programs that meet the immediate needs of runaway and homeless youth and their families. BCPs provide youth under 18 years of age with emergency shelter, food, clothing, counseling and referrals for health care. BCPs can provide up to 21 days of shelter for youth and seeks to reunite young people with their families, whenever possible, or to locate appropriate alternative placements. Additional services may include: street-based services; home-based services for families.

### **U.S. Department of Health and Human Services: Street Outreach Program**

The Runaway and Homeless Youth (RHY) Program's Street Outreach Program (SOP) provides street-based services to runaway, homeless, and street youth who have been subjected to or are at risk of being subjected to sexual abuse, prostitution, sexual exploitation, and severe forms of human trafficking in persons. These services, targeted in areas where street youth congregate, are designed to assist such youth in making healthy choices and providing them access to shelter as well as basic needs, including food, hygiene packages and information on a range of available services.

## TRANSPORTATION, BUS & VEHICLE FUNDING

### **U.S. Department of Transportation: FY 2020 Helping Obtain Prosperity for Everyone Program**

Deadline: May 4, 2020

Amount: Up to \$850,000

Match: Yes

Eligibility: Nonprofits, cities, counties, tribal governments and private, public and state-controlled IHEs

The HOPE Program supports projects that will improve transit services or facilities in areas of persistent poverty through planning, engineering, or development of technical, or financing plans for projects. Applicants are encouraged to work with non-profits or other entities of their choosing to develop an eligible project (see Eligible Projects below).

The HOPE Program is intended to help areas of persistent poverty:

- Reduce fatality rates on rural transportation infrastructure
- Increase access to jobs and healthcare through enhanced transit options and improved facilities

### **South Coast Air Quality Management District (AQMD): Electric Lawn and Garden Equipment**

Deadline: Not stated

Amount: Discounted equipment. One equivalent operable gasoline- or diesel-powered piece of lawn and garden equipment must be scrapped to qualify for incentive funding towards battery electric replacement equipment.

**Eligibility:** Local governments, school districts, nonprofit organizations

AQMD recently announced \$2.5 million in incentive funds to help commercial gardeners and landscapers, local governments, school districts, colleges and non-profit organizations buy new zero-emission, battery-electric commercial-grade lawn and garden equipment and scrap and replace their old, polluting gasoline- or diesel-powered equipment. Participants may receive up to 60 percent off the purchase price for new equipment. This program is not available to individual residents who are not gardeners or landscapers.

Participants will receive significant discounts applied at point of purchase on approved equipment. For example, a leaf blower with a backpack battery and a charger that retails for \$1,400 can be purchased for only \$560 plus tax, a 60 percent discount. Priority will be given to participants that are located in environmental justice or disadvantaged communities in the South Coast Basin. **PROGRAM**

**GOALS:** Improve air quality by exchanging older, polluting gasoline- or diesel-powered commercial lawn and garden equipment for new zero emission, battery electric commercial grade equipment for operation within South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) four county region. Special focus will be given to environmental justice (EJ) or disadvantaged communities.

### **San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District: Electric School Bus Incentive Program**

Deadline: Continuous

Amount: Up to \$400,000

Match: Not specified

**Eligibility:** Must be in SJVAPCD eligible counties. The applicant must be the school bus owner that is a public school district, Joint Power Authorities (JPA), or private company that is contracted with a public school to transport public school children to and from school.

### **San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District: Statewide School Bus Retrofit Program**

Match: Any costs not covered by the grant award

Eligibility: Any California public school district that directly provides transportation services, Joint Power Authority (JPA) that owns school buses, or private transportation agency that provides student transportation services under contract to public school districts are eligible to participate in this program. Private school districts are not eligible.

The purpose of this program is to provide assistance to California school districts with compliance of ARB's in-use Truck and Bus Regulation. This program will provide incentive funds to retrofit 1991 and newer engine model year and vehicle model year school buses with an ARB verified Level-3 diesel emissions control strategy (retrofit).

### **The Sanitation Districts of Los Angeles County: Free Buses for Schools Program**

Amount: Varies. LACSD will reimburse schools for bus transportation costs.

**Deadline: Pre-proposal due April 15, 2020; Invited full proposals due June 24, 2020**

Amount: Approximately \$3.1 million will be available to support projects in 2020. Based on prior year decisions, we anticipate that between four and eight projects will be awarded funds.

Match: All grant awards require a minimum 1:1 match of cash or contributed goods and services

Eligibility: Nonprofits, state and local government agencies, Indian tribes and educational institutions

The Rural Utilities Service (RUS), an agency of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), announces the availability of up to \$10 million in competitive grants to assist communities with extremely high energy costs. The grant funds may be used to acquire, construct, or improve energy generation,

transmission, or distribution facilities serving communities where the average annual residential expenditure for home energy exceeds 275% of the national average. Eligible projects also include on-grid and off-grid renewable energy projects and the implementation of energy efficiency and energy conservation projects for eligible communities. Projects cannot be for the primary benefit of a single household or business. Grant funds may not be used for the preparation of the grant application, operating costs, or for the purchase of any equipment, structures, or real estate not directly associated with the provision of community energy services.

The Whole Foods Market Community Giving Program supports local nonprofit and educational organizations that are important to each community in the U.S. and Canada where stores are located.

Several times each year, Whole Foods Market stores hold community giving days (otherwise known as "5% Days") where five percent of that day's net sales are donated to a local nonprofit or educational organization. The groups that benefit from these 5% Days are as varied as the communities themselves.

Each year Whole Foods Market gives a minimum of five percent of its net profits to nonprofit and educational organizations in the locations where the company has stores.

Examples of the types of organizations supported include:

- education, including school support organizations, after-school organizations, etc.;
- community and culture, including arts organizations, museums, parks, etc.;
- human interest, including elder care, children and youth, homeless assistance, etc.; and,
- environmental issues, including organic food and farming, natural wildlife protection, green living, etc.

Amount: Uniforms and Equipment

**Eligibility: School must have planned/established school sports program between 3p-5:30p for 6<sup>th</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup> grade students and over 60% of students eligible for free/reduced lunch program**

The Justin J. Watt Foundation is dedicated to providing after-school opportunities for middle school-aged children throughout the U.S. to become involved in athletics so that they may learn the character traits of accountability, teamwork, leadership, work ethic, and perseverance while in a safe and supervised environment with their peers. Funding for uniforms and/or equipment is provided to approved schools that have an after-school athletic program for 6th to 8th graders and where over 60% of students are eligible for the Free/Reduced Lunch program. Schools must provide a secure place to store uniforms and equipment, as well as staff, transportation, and space for the after-school program. Requests for winter sports (basketball, wrestling, and volleyball) may be submitted in August, September, and October of each year.

The Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) task force program supports a national network of 61 multiagency, multijurisdictional task forces engaged in investigations, forensic examinations, and prosecutions related to technology-facilitated child sexual exploitation. Additionally, the task forces provide forensic and investigative technical assistance to law enforcement and prosecutorial officials, and provide community education information to parents, educators, prosecutors, law enforcement, and others concerned with child exploitation. 
