BUS & VEHICLE FUNDING

San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District (SJVAPCD) Public Benefit Program New Alternative Fuel Vehicle Purchase Grant

Deadline: Continuous until funding exhausted

Amount: \$20,000 per vehicle (max); \$100,000 per agency (max)

Eligibility: School districts in the five-county area of the SJVAPCD in central California

This component provides funding for the purchase of new alternative fueled vehicles (Electric, Plug-In Hybrid, CNG, LNG, LPG, etc.) Applications for this component are currently being accepted on a first-come, first-serve basis.

San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District: Statewide School Bus Retrofit Program

Deadline: Continuous until funding is exhausted

Amount: Up to \$20,000 per school bus

Match: Any costs not covered by the grant award

Eligibility: Any California public school district that directly provides transportation services, Joint Power Authority (JPA) that owns school buses, or private transportation agency that provides student transportation services under contract to public school districts are eligible to participate in this program. Private school districts are not eligible.

The San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District has announced that there is some limited funding available for the Statewide School Bus Retrofit Program. The purpose of this program is to provide assistance to California school districts with compliance of ARB's in-use Truck and Bus Regulation. This program will provide incentive funds to retrofit 1991 and newer engine model year and vehicle model year school buses with an ARB verified Level-3 diesel emissions control strategy (retrofit).

The Sanitation Districts of Los Angeles County: Free Buses for Schools Program

Deadline: Continuous while funding is available

Amount: Varies. LACSD will reimburse schools for bus transportation costs.

Match: None

Eligibility: Teachers/classrooms for grades 5-12 at a public or private school in the Sanitation District's service in LA County.

The Sanitation Districts of Los Angeles County are offering you a free field trip to our facilities (while funds last). If you qualify, we will reimburse you for your bus transportation costs to visit either a wastewater treatment plant, materials recovery facility or one of our other sites. This is a unique opportunity for you and your students. You will get to see, learn, and really experience what happens to your sewage or trash. It is fun, interesting, and educational! Please note that funds for buses are limited and may run out. A school is eligible for one free bus during the school year.

Video Insight School Security Grant Program

Deadline: Continuous

Amount: Award consists of donated video surveillance equipment (see details below)

For the past 2 years Video Insight has given over \$1,200,000 in Video Surveillance Security Systems with the School Security Grant Program. Due to the success of the grant program, Video Insight will give another \$1 Million worth of video surveillance systems to 50 school campuses in need for 2017. Video Insight developed the School Security Grant to help schools that lack funds implement a video surveillance solution and to give back to these communities in need. For each month throughout the year, a selection of qualifying

school or college applicants will be chosen to receive the software and equipment necessary to implement a video surveillance solution. Each Video Insight School Security Grant recipient will receive the following equipment: 48 Video Insight Video Management Software (VMS) licenses; 16 IP video surveillance cameras; and 1 video encoder.

COUNSELING & MENTAL HEALTH FUNDING

CDE Learning Communities for School Success Program (LCSSP)

Due: 3/14/18

Amount: Approved LEAs will receive \$50 per 2017/18 enrolled student for each year of the three-year grant. Minimum three-year grants for LEAs with 100 or less enrollment will be \$15,000. Maximum LEA grants will be \$2,000,000.

Match: Yes

Eligibility: All LEAs, which includes school districts, county offices of education, and charter schools, are eligible to apply. However, LEAs with high chronic absenteeism, dropout, and out-of-school suspension rates will be given priority. LEAs can check if they are a priority LEA at the LCSSP program page at

Description: The Learning Communities for School Success Program (LCSSP) provides funds to local education agencies (LEAs) to support programs aimed at improving student outcomes by reducing truancy and supporting students who are at risk of dropping out of school or are victims of crime. The LCSSP is the result of Proposition 47, which reduced the penalties for certain non-serious, non-violent offenses and allocates 25% of the resulting statewide savings for LEA grants. California voters passed Proposition 47, the [Safe Neighborhoods and Schools Act](#) (SNSA), in November 2014. Subsequent legislation in 2016 established the Learning Communities for School Success Program (LCSSP). The LCSSP was established for the purpose of implementing the K-12 education portion of the SNSA. Through this program, the Department will administer grants and coordinate assistance to local educational agencies (LEAs) to support their efforts in identifying and implementing evidence-based, nonpunitive programs and practices aligned with the goals for pupils contained in each of their local control and accountability plans (LCAP), pursuant to Education Code (EC) Section 47606.5, 52060, or 52066, as applicable. The goals of the LCSSP are to support evidence-based, non-punitive programs and practices to keep the state's most vulnerable pupils in school. These programs and practices must complement and enhance the actions and services identified to meet the LEA's goals per the LEA's LCAP.

US Department of Education: Project School Emergency Response to Violence (SERV) Program

Deadline: Continuous

Amount: Immediate Services grant: Up to \$50,000 for a period of six months; Extended Services grants: Up to \$250,000 for 18 months

Match: None required

Eligibility: Local education agencies (LEAs) and institutions of higher education (IHEs)

This program funds short-term and long-term education-related services for local educational agencies (LEAs) and institutions of higher education (IHEs) to help them recover from a violent or traumatic event in which the learning environment has been disrupted. LEAs and IHEs may apply for two types of assistance under Project SERV: Immediate Services grants and

Extended Services grants. Immediate Services grants are intended to provide short-term support shortly after a traumatic event. Immediate Services grants are intended to provide a limited amount of funds to meet acute needs and restore the learning environment. Extended Services grants are intended to address the long-term recovery efforts that may be needed following a traumatic event. Extended Services applications are considered unsolicited grant applications and undergo a rigorous internal review by the Office of Safe and Healthy Students and the Office of the General Counsel. After review by staff members, the application is peer reviewed by an outside panel before being considered for funding.

Necessary Small SELPAs ECP for Mental Health Services Apportionment Funds

Due Date: November 30, 2018

Expected Notification Date: February 20, 2018

Amount: \$3,000,000 total funds. Costs of placements and services for single students in excess of the applicable threshold amount will be eligible for reimbursement. The threshold amount for the 2017–18 fiscal year for necessary small SELPAs is the lesser of \$76,964.93, or one percent of the SELPA's subtotal apportionment (sum of the base, COLA, and growth). Single placement costs applied towards the threshold for reimbursements from the extraordinary cost pool for nonpublic schools and licensed children's institutions will also be applied to this threshold.

Match: No

Eligibility: Local Educational agencies with necessary small SELPAs as defined in EC Section 56212

As part of the [Special Education AB 602](#) formula, this program reimburses necessary small Special Education Local Plan Areas (SELPAs) as defined in California Education Code (EC) Section 56212, for extraordinary cost pool associated with educationally related mental health services, including out-of-home residential services. Costs of placements and services for single students in excess of the annual threshold amount will be reimbursed, subject to available funds.

Transitional Living Program and Maternity Group Homes

Deadline: March 11, 2018

Estimated Award Date: May 1, 2018

Amount: \$100,000-\$241,660

Match: Yes

Eligibility: Networks of public and nonprofit private entities (including institutions of higher learning)

The purpose of FYSB's TLP and MGH grant programs are to implement, enhance, and/or support effective strategies for successful transition to sustainable living for runaway and homeless youth ages 16 to under 22 and/or pregnant and parenting youth ages 16 to under 22 and their dependent child(ren). Both projects must provide safe, stable, and appropriate shelter for 18 months and, under extenuating circumstances, can be extended to 21 months and provide comprehensive services that supports the transition of homeless youth to self-sufficiency and stable, independent living.

Basic Center Program (BCP)

Deadline: March 11, 2018

Estimated Award Date: Sep 29, 2018

Amount: \$50,000-\$200,000

Match: Yes

Eligibility: Public and nonprofit entities and combinations of such entities are eligible to apply

THE BCP works to establish or strengthen community-based programs that meet the immediate needs of runaway and homeless youth up to age 18 years of age and their families. BCPs provide youth with emergency shelter, food, clothing, counseling and referrals for health care. Basic centers can provide temporary shelter for up to 21 days for youth and seeks to reunite young people with their families, whenever possible, or to locate appropriate alternative placements. THE PRIMARY purpose of the BCP is to provide counseling services to youth who have left home without permission of their parents or guardians have been forced to leave home, or other homeless youth who might end up in contact with law enforcement or in the child welfare, mental health, or juvenile justice systems. THE AWARD process for FY2018 BCP allows for annual awards over a three-year project period as funds are available.

FACILITIES FUNDING

California Department of Education (CDE): FY 2017-18 California Renovation and Repair Loan Program

Deadline: June 29, 2018

Amount: Varies. \$26,600,000 has been allocated to the entire program

Match: None

Eligibility: Institutions of higher education, local educational agencies, nonprofit organizations, other organizations or agencies

The California Renovation and Repair Loan (CRRL) Program provides loans for the renovation and repair of existing facilities in order to ensure eligible California Department of Education (CDE) contractors meet applicable health and safety standards for federal and state licensing compliance. The CRRL Program funds are interest-free loans and may be reimbursed with contract funds. The Early Education and Support Division (EESD) will accept applications continuously; however, the EESD will award loans based on the availability of funding. This is a loan program with zero interest and may be reimbursed with contract funds. Loan amounts will vary, however, the loan interest is zero. In addition, the loan can be paid with reimbursement amounts from the qualifying contract(s). Loan repayment dates and performance periods will vary by loan. Applications or other data may be submitted at any time during the fiscal year. The CRRL Program funds are available to contractors who contract with CDE to operate the California State Preschool Program (CSPP), the General Child Care and Development Program (CCTR), the Migrant Child Care and Development Program (CMIG), and/or the California Handicapped Child Care and Development Program (CHAN). Within the Child Care Facilities Revolving Fund (CCFRF), \$10 million is available to Local Education Agencies (LEAs) with CSPP contracts only. An additional \$16.6 is available for LEAs and non-LEAs.

California Energy Commission (CEC): Interest Rate 0% Loan Financing for Energy Efficiency & Energy Generation Projects

Deadline: Continuous. Applications are funded on a first-come, first-served basis until funding is exhausted

Amount: Maximum loan amount of \$3 million per applicant

Financing Terms: Loans must be repaid from energy cost savings or other legally available funds within a maximum term of 20 years.

Eligibility: School districts, Charter schools, County offices of education, State special schools

The CEC is offering loans financing for energy efficiency and energy generation projects for local educational agencies. Projects with proven energy and demand cost savings are eligible. An energy audit report or feasibility study is required to demonstrate energy cost savings for the installed projects. Loan funds can only be used to fund project activity after the loan award has been approved and fully executed. Funding cannot be used for retroactive funding of installed projects. Examples of Qualified Projects include:

- Lighting systems
- Heating, ventilation and air conditioning equipment
- Energy management systems and equipment controls

California Office of Public School Construction (OPSC): Facility Hardship Program

Deadline: Continuous

Amount: Estimated \$13.7 Million left in program

Eligibility: To be eligible for a facility hardship grant the district must demonstrate that one of two conditions exists: facilities must be repaired/replaced due to an imminent health and safety threat, or existing facilities have been lost to fire, flood, earthquake or other disaster.

The Facility Hardship program assists districts with funding when it has been determined that the district has a critical need for pupil housing because the condition of the facilities, or the lack of facilities, presents an imminent threat to the health and safety of the pupils. There are two types of Facility Hardship projects based on the Current Replacement Cost, as defined in School Facility Program Regulation Section 1859.2:

1. Replacement: Cost to mitigate the health and safety threat is greater than 50 percent of the cost of replacement.
2. Rehabilitation: Cost to mitigate the health and safety threat is less than 50 percent of the cost of replacement.

California Office of Public School Construction (OPSC): Seismic Mitigation Program

Deadline: Continuous

Amount: Estimated \$94.5 Million left in program

Eligibility: Districts with qualifying Category 2 buildings under the School Facility Program (SFP) Regulation Section 1859.2

The Seismic Mitigation Program (SMP) is a subset of the Facility Hardship program that provides for the seismic repair, reconstruction, or replacement of the “most vulnerable” school facilities. SMP projects must meet the following requirements:

- The building is of an eligible Category 2 building type
- The building was originally designed for occupancy by students and staff
- DSA concurs that the building has the potential to collapse either due to ground shaking or due to faulting, liquefaction, or landslides
- Construction contract is signed after May 20, 2006

State Water Resources Control Board: Drinking Water for Schools Grant Program

Deadline: Applications accepted continuously via the FFAST Application System

Amount: \$25,000 - \$100,000 for single schools; \$25,000 - \$1,000,000 for LEAs

Match: None

Eligibility: Local Educational Agencies (LEAs) serving kindergarten or any of grades 1-12

The Drinking Water For Schools Grant Program provides \$9.5 million in funding to improve access to, and the quality of, drinking water in public schools pursuant to Senate Bill 828. To be eligible for funding, applicants must provide documentation of impaired drinking water quality, impaired access to drinking water, or a combination of both. Eligible projects include but are not limited to:

- Installation or replacement of water bottle filling stations or drinking water fountains with or without treatment devices capable of removing contaminants present in the school's water supply;
- Installation of point-of-entry (POE), or point-of-use (POU) treatment devices for water bottle filling stations, drinking fountains, and other fixtures that provide water for human consumption, including up to three years of: replacement filters, operation and maintenance (O&M), and monitoring of POE or POU devices;
- Installation, replacement, or repairs of drinking water fixtures and associated plumbing appurtenances that are necessary to address lead contamination identified by a school's public water system pursuant to the Lead Sampling of Drinking Water in California Schools program and that requires a corrective action; and

- Provision of interim alternative water supplies for applicants in the process of implementing a permanent solution, including purchases of temporary transfer water, hauled water, and bottled water.
- Costs directly related to planning, design, and construction that achieves an acceptable result are eligible for reimbursement.

USDA Rural Development: Community Facilities Grants & Loans

Deadline: Continuous

Community Facilities Programs provides grants to assist in the development of essential community facilities in rural areas and towns of up to 20,000 in population. Grants are authorized on a graduated scale.

Applicants located in small communities with low populations and low incomes will receive a higher percentage of grants. Grants are available to public entities such as municipalities, counties, parishes, boroughs, and special-purpose districts, as well as non-profit corporations and tribal governments.

FOOD & NUTRITION FUNDING

2017-18 California-grown Fresh School Meals Grant

Deadline: March 1, 2018

Expected Notification Date: April 23, 2018

Amount: \$50,000 to \$125,000 per school; \$1.5 Million total available

Match: No

Eligibility: Public school districts, county offices of education, and directly funded charter schools that participate in the NSLP

The purpose of the California-grown Fresh School Meals Grants is to encourage schools participating in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) or School Breakfast Program (SBP) to purchase California-grown food, and to expand the number of freshly prepared school meals that use California-grown ingredients. SFAs must prepare school meals in accordance with the federal NSLP or SBP. Awardees may use grant funds to purchase California-grown foods, purchase equipment necessary to provide school meals to students, provide nutrition education to students, and provide professional development for relevant food service employees regarding the implementation of fresh and healthy school meals.

California Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program

Deadline: March 15, 2018

Expected Notification Date: June 15, 2018

Amount: The amount of the individual school grant will depend on the total enrollment of the schools participating in the program. \$12,000,000 total available funds.

Match: No

Eligibility: Elementary schools that participate in the NSLP and have 50% or more of its students eligible for free or reduced-price meals.

The FFVP is a reimbursement grant program that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) administers at the federal level. At the state level, the CDE Nutrition Services Division (NSD) administers the FFVP and selects schools to receive a year-long grant (July–June) to implement the program. The purpose of this federal assistance program is to provide an additional free fresh fruit or vegetable snack to students during the school day as a supplement to (and not part of) the School Breakfast Program and the National School Lunch Program, and to teach students about good nutrition. The FFVP also encourages grantees to develop partnerships at the state and local level for support in implementing and operating the program.

CDE 2018-19 School Breakfast Program and Summer Food Service Program Start-up and Expansion Grant

Due: March 1, 2018 5:00PM

Amount: The CDE will award competitive grants of up to \$15,000 per site. Each SFA may apply for no more than ten (10) sites. Recipients will receive 90 percent of the funding at the time of award with the remaining 10 percent awarded upon approval of all invoices. Maximum of 10 sites per applicant.

Match: None

Eligibility: School Food Authorities (SFAs) including school districts, county offices of education, or direct-funded charter schools with at least 20% of enrolled students eligible for free or reduced-price (F/RP) Meals.

Description: This is not an allocation fund, this is for two (2) types of competitive grants. Funding is for nonrecurring expenses incurred in initiating or expanding a (1) School Breakfast Program (SBP), serving students in kindergarten through grade twelve or (2) Summer Food Service Program (SFSP), serving children and youth eighteen years of age and under during school breaks. School districts, direct-funded charter schools, and County Offices of Education may apply for one or both types of grants; however, only one type of grant may be awarded per school site. The CDE will allow equipment purchases as long SFAs dedicate its use exclusively to food service and it serves to assist in the start-up or expansion of an SBP or SFSP. Conversely, any equipment that will be used by another program and not operated exclusively by food service, and will not assist in the start-up or expansion of an SBP or SFSP, is not an allowable expense. Allowable costs are nonrecurring expenses used when starting up or expanding an SBP or SFSP and include:

- Food service equipment purchases for program start-up or expansion; for example, an SFA may use awarded funds to upgrade its stove if the current stove is too small to adequately heat food or meals to serve its students.
- Supplies or equipment needed to offer fresh fruits and vegetables or meet the requirements of the U.S. Department of Agriculture school meal pattern; for example, fruit bars, smoothie machines, blenders, fruit baskets, additional food storage, fruit and vegetable washers, etc.
- Food service training costs related to new SBP activities; for example, vendor charges for POS software or vending machine training.
- Outreach costs, for example; banners, paper, envelopes, and postage for flyers, or newspaper or television ads announcing the SBP or SFSP.
- Incidental equipment installation costs in accordance with California *Education Code*, Section 38091.
- Computer POS systems used exclusively for food service; for example, a computer and software for each POS, printer(s), and site license. However, the renewal of a POS license is not an allowable expense.
- Grab-and-go equipment costs used to create remote feeding sites or areas on campus; for example, carts or kiosks, as well as one-time wiring to accommodate a POS system.
- Vending machine costs that provide breakfast items for middle and high school levels only. Allowable vending machines must be equipped to dispense reimbursable meals, conduct POS meal counts, prevent students from obtaining more than one reimbursable breakfast and/or lunch per day, and be solely used in the child nutrition programs. Please note that while vending machines equipped to dispense reimbursable meals may be allowable purchases for middle and high school grades, the CDE does not consider their use an innovative strategy.
- Costs for vehicles that transport food or meals to and from sites and are used solely for food services; for example, vehicle modifications that are needed for temperature control, storage, etc., are allowable expenses.
- Barbeque grill costs that are incurred for use at outdoor SFSP sites.

California Department of Education (CDE): Summer Food Service Program Apportionment Funding

Deadline: June 1, 2018

Amount: Varies. Sponsors receive reimbursement based on the number and types of meals served multiplied by the operational and administrative rate.

Match: None

Eligibility: public and private schools; Institutions of higher education; Indian tribal governments; units of local, municipal, or county governments; and other public or private nonprofit agencies

The Summer Food Service Program apportionment funding provides reimbursement for meals served to children who are on school vacation in areas where 50 percent of the children qualify for free or reduced-price school meals. Camp sites may receive reimbursement for serving meals to children who are income

eligible. Sponsors receive reimbursement based on the number and types of meals served multiplied by the operational and administrative rate. There is \$24,500,000 in federal funds available for the SFSP. Summer sites must be established to serve all children in the community while on school vacation and not enrolled for day care. Meals must be served to all children at the same time. Sponsoring agencies serving snacks after school, must serve meals during summer vacation. Application results are provided within 30 days.

California Department of Education (CDE): Child and Adult Care Food

Program Apportionment Funding

Deadline: Continuous. Applications or other data may be submitted at any time during the fiscal year.

Amount: Varies. Agencies are reimbursed for the number and types of meals served according to the participant's household eligibility for free, reduced-price, or base rate meals.

Match: None

Eligibility: Institutions of higher education, local educational agencies, nonprofit organizations, other organizations or agencies

The Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) is a state and federally funded program that provides funding to licensed child care centers, adult day care centers, and organizations that sponsor day care homes to ensure participants receive nutritionally adequate meals and snacks while in care. Funding is also available for meals and snacks at emergency shelters and after school programs. Each program component must serve a different population or age group. At-risk after school programs must be located in a low-income area. Applicants eligible for subsidy include public, private nonprofit, and private for-profit agencies; agencies licensed or approved to provide nonresidential day care to children or chronically impaired adults. Public or private nonprofit emergency shelters may also be eligible for subsidy. Agencies are reimbursed for the number and types of meals served according to the participant's household eligibility for free, reduced-price, or base rate meals. In addition to \$521,551,000 in federal funds, \$2,051,000 in state funds are available for child care agencies. Current rates are available on the Rates page at

California Department of Education (CDE): School Nutrition Programs Apportionment Funding

Deadline: Continuous. Applications or other data may be submitted at any time during the fiscal year.

Amount: Varies. Agencies are reimbursed for the number and types of meals or pints of milk served, according to the student's household eligibility for free, reduced-price, or paid meals or milk.

Match: None



This grant program provides financial support for projects that design, demonstrate, and/or disseminate environmental education practices, methods, or techniques, as described in this notice, that will serve to increase environmental literacy and encourage behavior that will benefit the environment in the local community(ies) in which they are located. Selections and awards will be made in Region 9. (Note that separate solicitations will be issued from each of the 10 EPA Regional Offices, and selections and awards will be made in each respective Region.)

(1) Goal

The goal of this solicitation is to fund locally-focused EE projects that design, demonstrate, and/or disseminate environmental education practices, methods, or techniques, as described in this notice. EPA will provide financial support for projects that promote environmental and conservation stewardship and help develop informed, knowledgeable and responsible citizens in the community(ies) in which the project is located.

EPA further clarifies that environmental and conservation information and outreach may be important elements of EE projects, but these activities by themselves are not EE. By itself, environmental or conservation information only addresses awareness and knowledge, usually about a particular environmental or conservation issue. Outreach involves information dissemination and requests or

suggestions for action on a particular issue (often without the critical thinking, problem solving and decision making steps in between). EE teaches individuals how to weigh various sides of an issue through critical thinking, problem solving and decision making skills on environmental and conservation topics. EE is a continuum that covers the range of steps and activities from awareness to action with an ultimate goal of environmental and conservation stewardship.



EE increases public awareness and knowledge about environmental and conservation issues and provides the participants in its programs the skills necessary to make informed decisions and to take responsible actions. EE is based on objective and scientifically-sound information and does not advocate a particular viewpoint or a particular course of action. EE involves lifelong learning; its audiences are of all age groups, from very young children through senior citizens. EE can include both outdoor and in-classroom education, in both formal and non-formal settings.

EPA's Educational Priorities:

Proposals must address at least one of these Educational Priorities to be considered eligible.

- 1. Agricultural Education:** Educating students of any age group and/or training their educators or community leaders on how to teach, in formal and non-formal settings, about environmental issues affecting agriculture in urban, suburban and rural communities -- in such areas as integrated pest management, nutrient management, integrated vegetation management, and air, soil and water quality issues-- and how to find creative solutions to such issues.
- 2. Community Projects:** Increasing public understanding of the benefits of and participation in environmental and conservation stewardship through community collaboration on water and soil quality issues, food waste management, increase of locally sourced food in farm to table systems, management of ecosystem health and/or local fire or flood prevention and fire, flood or hurricane preparedness as related to human health and environmental protection. Projects can take place in rural, suburban and urban settings, in a local formal or non-formal educational context, and use outdoor, place-based, experiential, service learning and/or community-focused stewardship activities as the primary teaching tool(s).
- 3. Career Development:** Educating students of any age group and/or training their educators or community leaders on how to teach, in formal and non-formal settings, about environmental and conservation issues, solutions and stewardship for the purpose of encouraging interest in careers in environmental fields, including conservation, natural resources, chemical safety, and water and air quality management fields.
