#### California Department of Education: Inclusive Early Education Expansion Program

Match: Grant recipients must provide a \$1 local match for every \$3 state grant dollars received Eligibility: School districts, child care and preschool providers

One-time grant - The initiative is intended to increase the availability of mainstream child care and preschool opportunities for children with disabilities from birth through age 5. Grant recipients must provide a \$1 local match for every \$3 state grant dollars received. Additionally, recipients must serve children in high-need communities. The grant proposal is one of many proposals included in the Governor's budget intended to address poor outcomes for students with disabilities. The one-time grant, open to school districts and other child care and preschool providers, could be used for a variety of purposes, including training, facility renovations, and equipment. Grant recipients would be required to demonstrate how the funding helped increase access to subsidized care for children with disabilities.

Under the K-12 Restart program, the Department is authorized to award funds to State educational agencies (SEAs) with students and schools impacted by the 2017 California wildfires. These SEAs, in turn, will provide assistance or services to local educational agencies (LEAs), including charter schools and private schools, to help defray expenses related to restarting school operations and restoring the normal learning environment for students and families affected by the hurricanes and wildfires.

## California Department of Education: 2018-19 Agricultural Career Technical Education Incentive Grant Deadline: TBD

Amount: The funding amount approved for each Agricultural Career Technical Education Incentive Grant will be based on the application submitted and the availability of funding. The first payment (75 percent) will be released approximately October 15, 2018. The second payment, final 25 percent plus/minus any adjustments and any specialized grant allocations, will be released approximately April 15, 2019. Failure to meet any Quality Criteria could result in the loss of 10 percent of the approved grant. In addition, failure to submit the Program Enrollment Report, Final Expenditure Report, or Future Farmers of America (FFA) Membership Roster by October 15, 2018 will result in a loss of 10 percent of the approved grant. #### San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District: Statewide School Bus Retrofit Program

Eligibility: It is not necessary to have tax-exempt status to apply for a PDF grant. However, all funds provided by the Peace Development Fund must be used only to support activities that further the exempt purposes and activities of PDF, and grant recipients must submit reports to PDF as required by the grant contract. https://www.peacedevelopmentfund.org/grants-and-programs/community-organizing-grants-program/ The Peace Development Fund believes that the change in values needed to establish a more just and peaceful world can come about only if it is strongly rooted in local communities that recognize the importance of building movements to create systemic social change. The Fund's Community Organizing Grants provide support to community-based organizations in the United States, Haiti, and Mexico that are working for social justice. The funding priorities include organizing to shift power, working to build a movement, dismantling oppression, and creating new structures. Priority is given to new or emerging organizations; efforts that have difficulty securing funds from other sources; community organizations working on climate change issues at the local policy level; groups that have a genesis in Occupy, MeToo, or Movement for Black Lives; collaborative peace initiatives led by women; or issues that are not yet recognized by progressive funders.

#### Memory CalRecycle: Tire-Derived Aggregate Grant Program (FY 2018-19)

Deadline: January 31, 2019 Amount: Up to \$350,000 Match: Not stated

Eligibility: Cities, Counties, special districts, JPA, nonprofit, public school districts, California UC and state colleges and community colleges

The Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) administers a program to provide opportunities to divert waste tires from landfill disposal, prevent illegal tire dumping, and promote markets for recycled-content tire products. The Tire-Derived Aggregate (TDA) Grant Program (Program) provides assistance to civil engineers in solving a variety of engineering challenges. TDA, which is produced from shredded tires, is lightweight, free-draining, and a less expensive alternative to conventional lightweight aggregates.

Projects fall into one of four categories:

**Category 1:** Lightweight fill (slope stabilization, embankment fill, landslide repair, and retaining walls). **Category 2:** Vibration mitigation (under rail lines).

Category 3: Low impact development/storm water management.

**Category 4:** Landfill application (aggregate replacement projects such as leachate and gas collection systems, drainage layers, leachate injection). Projects that are currently underway or that have been completed at the same location within the same facility within three years of application are not eligible. Landfill application projects do not include use of shredded waste tires as alternative daily cover or alternative intermediate cover. Additionally, these landfill application project(s) are not eligible for consideration as a Very Large Project (see below for definition) and are limited to a maximum of \$350,000 even if the project exceeds 4,000 tons.

The intent of this Request for Applications (RFA) is to expand General Child Care and Development (CCTR) for full-day, full-year funds for General Child Care and Development services statewide. To expand CCTR services, this RFA funding opportunity is available to both Local Education Agencies and non-Local Education Agencies. These funds are intended to provide direct services for California children up to age 13. Awards will be made by county allocation, and within each county by Local Planning Council priority area, with highest scores being funded first. Infant Toddler care has been determined to be a priority for this funding due to low availability and high need.

These programs are created through partnerships between schools and local community resources to provide literacy, academic enrichment and safe, constructive alternatives for students in

kindergarten through ninth grade. Funding is designed to: (1) maintain existing before and after school program funding; and (2) provide eligibility to all elementary and middle schools that submit quality applications throughout California. The application is for new grantees as well as existing grant recipients who wish to increase funding.

Extended Services applications are considered unsolicited grant applications and undergo a rigorous internal review by the Office of Safe and Healthy Students and the Office of the General Counsel. After review by staff members, the application is peer reviewed by an outside panel before being considered for funding.
