

California Department of Education: Inclusive Early Education Expansion Program

RFA: Late Summer to Early Winter 2018

Deadline: TBD

Amount: TBD (\$167,242,000 for entire program)

Match: Grant recipients must provide a \$1 local match for every \$3 state grant dollars received

Eligibility: School districts, child care and preschool providers

One-time grant - The initiative is intended to increase the availability of mainstream child care and preschool opportunities for children with disabilities from birth through age 5. Grant recipients must provide a \$1 local match for every \$3 state grant dollars received. Additionally, recipients must serve children in high-need communities. The grant proposal is one of many proposals included in the Governor's budget intended to address poor outcomes for students with disabilities. The one-time grant, open to school districts and other child care and preschool providers, could be used for a variety of purposes, including training, facility renovations, and equipment. Grant recipients would be required to demonstrate how the funding helped increase access to subsidized care for children with disabilities.

- Funds may be used for building local and regional capacity to support increased access for children with exceptional needs and severe disabilities to inclusive early care and education programs.
- Funds can be used for outreach coordinators, placement navigators, coordination and provision of resources, equipment, professional learning, assessment or evaluation tools and licensing, training for parents and families, and specialists including behavioral and mental health.
- Priority shall be given to applicants that demonstrate need for expanded access to inclusive early care and education particularly within low-income and high-need communities.
- Grantees must provide program data and participate in specified evaluations.

California Department of Education: Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program

Deadline: TBD

Amount: TBD (\$100 million for entire program)

Match: Unless a district meets the financial hardship criteria, a local match of 50% of the cost of the project is required for new construction projects and 40% for a retrofit project.

Eligibility: School Districts

- \$100 million in one-time General Fund grants to school districts to construct new school facilities or retrofit existing facilities for full-day kindergarten classrooms.
- The program will be administered by the State Allocation Board.
- Priority shall be given to school districts that either: (1) meet the requirements for financial hardship, or (2) are located in an underserved community with a high population of pupils who are eligible for free or reduced price meals.
- Use of funds includes: The costs of design, engineering, testing, inspections, plan checking, construction management, site acquisition and development, evaluation and response action costs relating to hazardous substances at a new or existing school site, demolition, construction, landscaping, necessary utility costs, utility connections, equipment including telecommunication equipment to increase school security, furnishings, the upgrading of electrical systems, and the wiring or cabling of classrooms in order to accommodate educational technology.

California Department of Education: Federal Emergency Grants for Schools Impacted by Wildfires

Under the K-12 Restart program, the Department is authorized to award funds to State educational agencies (SEAs) with students and schools impacted by the 2017 California wildfires. These SEAs, in turn, will provide assistance or services to local educational agencies (LEAs), including charter schools and private schools, to help defray expenses related to restarting school operations and restoring the normal learning environment for students and families affected by the hurricanes and wildfires.

California Department of Education: 2018-19 Agricultural Career Technical Education Incentive Grant

Deadline: TBD

Amount: The funding amount approved for each Agricultural Career Technical Education Incentive Grant will be based on the application submitted and the availability of funding. The first payment (75 percent) will be released approximately October 15, 2018. The second payment, final 25 percent plus/minus any adjustments and any specialized grant allocations, will be released approximately April 15, 2019. Failure to meet any Quality Criteria could result in the loss of 10 percent of the approved grant. In addition, failure to submit the Program Enrollment Report, Final Expenditure Report, or Future Farmers of America (FFA) Membership Roster by October 15, 2018 will result in a loss of 10 percent of the approved grant.

TRANSPORTATION, BUS & VEHICLE FUNDING

South Coast Air Quality Management District (AQMD): Electric Lawn and Garden Equipment

Deadline: Not stated

Amount: Discounted equipment. One equivalent operable gasoline- or diesel-powered piece of lawn and garden equipment must be scraped to qualify for incentive funding towards battery electric replacement equipment.

Eligibility: Local governments, school districts, nonprofit organizations

AQMD recently announced \$2.5 million in incentive funds to help commercial gardeners and landscapers, local governments, school districts, colleges and non-profit organizations buy new zero-emission, battery-electric commercial-grade lawn and garden equipment and scrap and replace their old, polluting gasoline- or diesel-powered equipment. Participants may receive up to 60 percent off the purchase price for new equipment. This program is not available to individual residents who are not gardeners or landscapers. Participants will receive significant discounts applied at point of purchase on approved equipment. For example, a leaf blower with a backpack battery and a charger that retails for \$1,400 can be purchased for only \$560 plus tax, a 60 percent discount. Priority will be given to participants that are located in environmental justice or disadvantaged communities in the South Coast Basin. **PROGRAM**

GOALS: Improve air quality by exchanging older, polluting gasoline- or diesel-powered commercial lawn and garden equipment for new zero emission, battery electric commercial grade equipment for operation within South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) four county region. Special focus will be given to environmental justice (EJ)or disadvantaged communities.

San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District: Electric School Bus Incentive Program

Deadline: Continuous

Amount: Up to \$400,000

Match: Not specified

Eligibility: Must be in SJVAPCD eligible counties. The applicant must be the school bus owner that is a public school district, Joint Power Authorities (JPA), or private company that is contracted with a public school to transport public school children to and from school.

San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District: Statewide School Bus Retrofit Program

Amount: Up to \$20,000 per school bus

Match: Any costs not covered by the grant award

Eligibility: Any California public school district that directly provides transportation services, Joint Power Authority (JPA) that owns school buses, or private transportation agency that provides student transportation

services under contract to public school districts are eligible to participate in this program. Private school districts are not eligible.

The purpose of this program is to provide assistance to California school districts with compliance of ARB's in-use Truck and Bus Regulation. This program will provide incentive funds to retrofit 1991 and newer engine model year and vehicle model year school buses with an ARB verified Level-3 diesel emissions control strategy (retrofit).

The Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) administers a program to provide opportunities for the diversion of tires from landfill disposal, prevent illegal tire dumping, and promote markets for recycled-content products. The Tire-Derived Product Grant (TDP) Program is a reimbursement grant designed to use TDPs for repurposing projects such as pathways, landscaping, mats, playground surfacing, curb stops, and ramps.

The Whole Foods Market Community Giving Program supports local nonprofit and educational organizations that are important to each community in the U.S. and Canada where stores are located.

Several times each year, Whole Foods Market stores hold community giving days (otherwise known as "5% Days") where five percent of that day's net sales are donated to a local nonprofit or educational organization.

The groups that benefit from these 5% Days are as varied as the communities themselves.

Each year Whole Foods Market gives a minimum of five percent of its net profits to nonprofit and educational organizations in the locations where the company has stores.

Examples of the types of organizations supported include:

- education, including school support organizations, after-school organizations, etc.;
- community and culture, including arts organizations, museums, parks, etc.;

Match: Funding will be provided at 65% of the cost of the eligible replacement truck

SAKI, administered by BJA, is a competitive grant program that provides funding to support multidisciplinary community response teams to inventory, track, and test previously unsubmitted SAKs (as defined below); collect and test lawfully owed DNA from offenders/arrestees; produce necessary protocols and policies to improve collaboration among laboratories, police, prosecutors, and victim service providers; provide resources to address the sexual assault investigations and prosecutions that result from evidence and CODIS hits produced by tested SAKs; and optimize victim notification protocols and services. The causes of unsubmitted SAKs in the custody of law enforcement agencies can be attributed to a wide range of factors, including poor evidence tracking, inefficient chain of custody protocols, outdated and ineffective investigation practices, misunderstanding of crime laboratory case acceptance policies, and lack of understanding among law enforcement entities about the value of testing kits in various types of cases

The Office on Violence Against Women Training and Technical Assistance Initiative provides support to strengthen and build the capacity of civil and criminal justice system professionals and victim service providers across the nation to respond effectively to sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking, and to foster partnerships among organizations that have not traditionally worked together to address these crimes.

Department of Justice (National Institute of Justice – NIJ): Research and Development in Forensic Science for Criminal Justice Purposes FY 2019

Deadline: April 11, 2019

Amount: Total funding for this solicitation and the number of awards made will depend on the availability of funds, the quality of the applications, and other pertinent factors. In FY 2018, NIJ provided approximately \$24 million to fund research and development projects related to forensic science, including DNA. NIJ funding for an individual research or development project rarely exceeds \$500,000 annually, although total funding for some projects requiring multiple years to complete has exceeded \$1 million in previous years. In FY 2018, the average forensic science research and development award was approximately \$230,000 per year

Match: An award made by NIJ under this solicitation may account for up to 100 percent of the total cost of the project. The application should indicate whether it is feasible for the applicant to contribute cash, facilities, or services as non-federal support for the project. The application should identify generally any

such contributions that the applicant expects to make and the proposed budget should indicate in detail which items, if any, will be supported with non-federal contributions.

Eligibility: States, units of local government, federally recognized Indian tribal governments performing law enforcement functions, nonprofit and for-profit organizations, institutions of higher education.

NIJ seeks proposals for basic or applied research and development projects. An NIJ forensic science research and development grant supports a discrete, specified, circumscribed project that will:

1. Increase the body of knowledge to guide and inform forensic science policy and practice, or
2. Lead to the production of useful material(s), device(s), system(s), or method(s) that have the potential for forensic application.

The intent of this program is to direct the findings of basic scientific research; foster research and development in broader scientific fields applicable to forensic science; and support ongoing forensic science research toward the development of highly-discriminating, accurate, reliable, cost-effective, and rapid methods for the identification, analysis, and interpretation of physical evidence for criminal justice purposes.

This solicitation seeks providers to support both Adult Drug Court (ADC) and Veterans Treatment Court (VTC) Program grantees. ADC TTA providers for all categories in this solicitation are expected to participate in an ADC TTA collaborative to work together to assist states, veterans, tribes, and local justice system officials and treatment professionals to implement evidence-based drug court practices.

The objectives of the ADC TTA Initiative are to assist newly established and operational adult drug treatment court programs to:

- Build and maximize capacity.
- Ensure drug court participants are identified and assessed for risk and need.
- Ensure drug court participants receive targeted research-based services.
