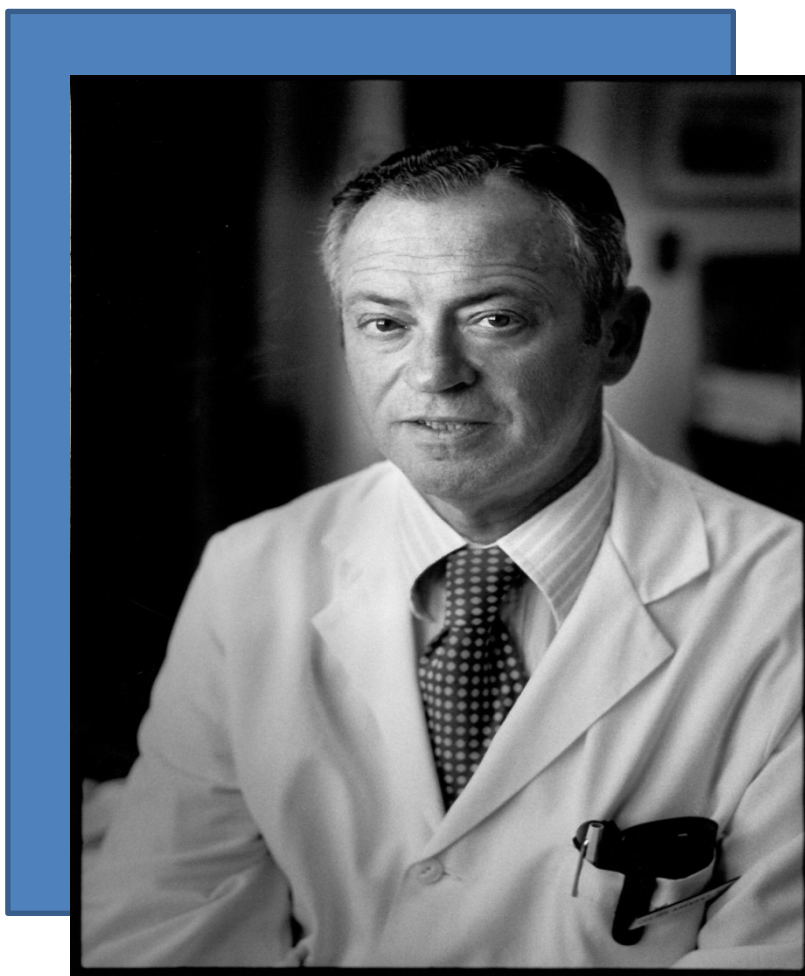


Krevans Awards

2021



The Krevans Award recognizes "excellence in patient care, as exemplified by clinical competence, professional conduct, concern for patients and interaction with all level of staff, including peers." Recipients are selected by the chiefs of the various medical departments at the Priscilla Chan and Mark Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital and Trauma Center.

The award was established in 1979 by the Gladstone Institutes, a privately funded, UCSF-affiliated research institute formerly on the ZSFG campus. The award is named for former UCSF Chancellor Julius R. Krevans.

Asylum Network and is currently a member of the Gold Humanism Honor Society.

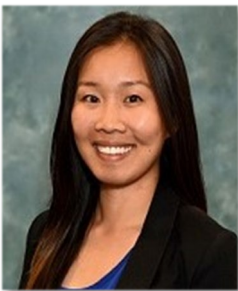


Erron Wilcox Titus, MD, PhD

Laboratory Medicine

Erron Titus was an outstanding first-year resident on the ZSFG Laboratory Medicine Service. Erron demonstrated superior medical knowledge, enthusiasm for learning, and caring attention to the needs of practitioners and patients at ZSFG. His ZSFG rotations in Hematology/Blood Bank and Microbiology

covered a broad range of diagnostic oversight as he showed clinical and academic prowess on these services by engaging in a number of QI and research projects. This included a project to improve evidence-based ordering of infectious diseases testing and another project exploring alternative sample preparations for the CSF Cryptococcal antigen test. Erron is Canadian by birth, but he grew up mostly in Massachusetts. He attended Harvard University, obtaining a degree in comparative literature before later turning to science. He graduated from the UCSF Medical Scientist Training Program, where his research focused on structural biology. Specifically, he worked on understanding the structure and function of a calcium-buffering protein, calsequestrin, which plays an important role in cardiac and skeletal muscle. In his last year of medical school, he continued his basic science work within UCSF's QB3 Coronavirus Research Group, focusing on the structural biology of host/viral protein complexes.



Marcela Zhou Huang, MD

Medicine

Marcela Zhou Huang was born in Mexico to parents who emigrated from China. Marcela grew up undocumented in Calexico, California, a border town with limited access to healthcare. She identifies as a Mexican-born Chinese American who speaks fluent

Spanish, Cantonese, and English and understands the diverse cultures these languages originate from. As a result, Marcela pursued

her education at UC San Diego, the David Geffen School of Medicine at UCLA, and the Harvard T. H. Chan School of Public Health with a special interest in advancing immigrant health. Marcela was a leader in creating and advocating for the passage of SB1139 for the State of California, a bill preventing discrimination based on immigration status in student admissions and loan forgiveness programs. Marcela was recruited into the SFPC residency to further her education in medicine and social justice. Since at UCSF, Marcela has excelled in the inpatient and outpatient setting with many outstanding evaluations highlighting her ability to care for medically and socially complex patients. She is always kind and astutely aware of the health care disparities faced by her patients at the Richard Fine People's Clinic and San Francisco General Hospital. Amidst the challenges of providing healthcare in a pandemic, Marcela has only strengthened her devotion to advocate for her patients



Jason Chung, MD, PhD

Neurological Surgery

Jason Chung earned both his MD and PhD at UCSF, completing his thesis work in the lab of Loren Frank, where he developed implantable electrophysiologic recording hardware and machine-learning algorithms to better understand how the brain computes

As a little girl, Jennifer started caring for women by helping at her mother's OB/GYN clinic and quickly found the profound joy in medicine. At the University of Chicago,

Jennifer discovered a deep drive to rectify social injustices and used multimedia art to provide a platform for community advocacy both in Chicago and Peru. In medical school at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine, she developed programs to address the opioid crisis and worked with Spanish-speaking undocumented women struggling to balance their need for social services, such as food stamps and their desire to avoid confrontation with Immigration and Customs Enforcement.

Now as an OB/GYN intern, Dr. Qin's prior experiences have led her to be an exceptionally skilled and empathetic physician. She unwaveringly dedicates herself to all patients, especially those who are marginalized and experience a multitude of barriers to the care they deserve. Dr. Qin routinely volunteers to see the last patient in clinic, has successfully battled with insurance plans that have denied needed services, and truly engages in justice-informed care coordination for all of her patients. Jorge D. Mena, MD

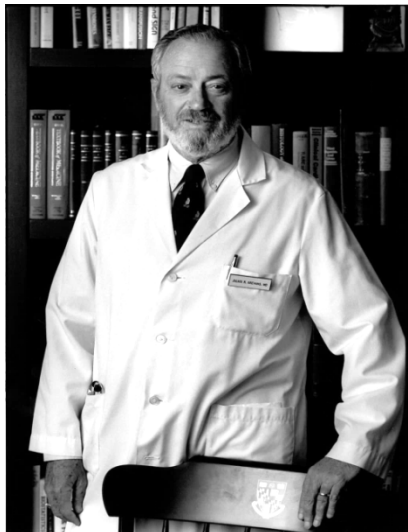
Urology

Julius R. Krevans, MD



Julius R. Krevans, MD was the fifth chancellor of UCSF. During his tenure, UCSF experienced many achievements. In 1989, UCSF applauded its first Nobel Prize winners, J. Michael Bishop and Harold Varmus. UCSF also played a critical role in spawning the biotechnology industry during these years.

Under Dr. Krevans' leadership, UCSF attracted many women and minority students to careers in health sciences. Before his appointment as chancellor, Dr. Krevans served as Dean of the School of Medicine at UCSF from 1971-1982. He was also active on the boards and committees of numerous national foundations, government agencies, and organizations including the National Academy of Science's Institute of Medicine and the American Board of Internal Medicine. He served as the chair of the Association of American Medical Colleges from 1980-81, helping to develop public policy for this organization. He was also a director of the Clinical Scholar program, a director of both the James Picker and Bank America-Giannini Foundation, and a member of the Association of American Physicians.
