"I am a passionate, intense observer of the world, and am endlessly fascinated watching colors reflect on objects in shadow and light. Seeing the objects before me change shape through this play of color and light compels me to record them. Landscapes are a constant source of inspiration and color is what most allows me to freely interpret these scenes. My aim is to create patterns of color and a harmonious balance of shapes that in turn evoke a sense of calm and reflection. I am drawn to watercolor because of its spontaneity and surprise, and the luminosity and depth achieved by its layered application. Painting in oils affords a different versatility. Whereas watercolor responds best when it is not in control and free to flow, oil is obedient to my every brush stroke. Adapting to the differences between the two mediums is a recent and

She enjoys creating in Watercolors, Acrylics, Pastel Painting, Quilling and Gelli Plate Printing.



Cold Wax Art

Since the age of 16, Elaine spent her summers painting in Provincetown where she first experienced the awe and wonder of the vibrant art scene. She studied fine art at Central Connecticut State University, where she received her Bachelors Degree and taught art in the public school system for 10 years. During her summers, she would return to Provincetown to paint and in 1981 she took up residency in the "studio-barn" at the Provincetown Fine Arts Work Center.

At a crossroad of intellectual curiosity and restlessness, Elaine embarked on what she describes as a "*left brain, right brain*" shift, studied architecture at the Boston Architectural Center (BAC) and then went on to pursue a law degree and Masters in business administration, where she practiced law in the public sector.

Now after some 30 years, Elaine has returned to Cape Cod to paint again, this time full time, uninterrupted. She primarily paints in oil, using cold wax medium, blurring the lines, creating layers and textures. Her work is semi-abstract, atmospheric and ethereal. She finds inspiration living on Cape Cod, where the light and color are ever changing. When she paints she describes the experience as entering into an emotional and intellectual state of "zen". She conducts classes and workshops, encouraging and supporting others to pursue their artistic development and pursuits. She is represented by the Blue Heron Gallery, Wellfleet, MA, and is a member of the Provincetown Art Association Museum (PAAM), the Cultural Center of Cape Cod, Yarmouth, MA and is a Juried Artist at the Cape Cod Art Center, Barnstable, MA.

At our April YAG General Meeting, Elaine's instruction was quite innovative! Elaine explained that the "*Cold Wax*" process extends the paint. It's a process of layers of paint. She explains that cold wax is a medium which is basically bees wax and solvent. She uses tools to work painting and never uses a brush. She said, "*Tools enable you to get a soft texture you cannot get with a brush.*" Some of the tools she uses are: putty knives, a squeegee and various metal & plastic scrapers (some soft and some hard). These tools enable her to vary the texture.

Surfaces: Elaine does not use a canvas (too bouncy). To prime surfaces, she applies *gesso* to oil paper for painting on both sides. At our meeting she worked on a mixed media collage (see photo left below).

Selecting a project: She uses a graphic/picture (photo, etc.) for inspiration only. Elaine stresses that suggestion very strongly. She teaches us not to attempt to copy...only use an inspiring piece as a beginning point only use it as a guide.

“Do not attempt to copy accurately”, she teaches. “Be spontaneous as you begin and be as loose as possible as you paint. Your presence in the painting is critical. It’s your finger print. The transcendency of the art is YOU! Be and feel unrestricted... even if you paint a COW the color of pink!”
