

ALL SAINTS

PRECIOUS IN THE SIGHT OF THE LORD IS THE DEATH OF HIS FAITHFUL ONES. PSALM 116:15

Who passed the faith on to you? In 2 Timothy 1:5 the Apostle Paul says to Timothy, “I am reminded of your sincere faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now...lives in you.” Faith is handed down, in this case, from mother to daughter to son.

All Saints Day, November 1, is a “major feast day” historically in the life of the church (often celebrated the first Sunday in November). It is a day of remembrance for the saints, with the New Testament meaning of all Christian people of every time and place. We celebrate the communion of saints as we remember the dead, both of the Church universal and of our local congregations. So we solemnly read the names of those who have died and light a candle for them. We will do that this Sunday, November 6 for our saints who have died this year: Patricia Coffey (May 29), Harriet Hawbaker (June 23), and Winifred Johnson (September 13).

Still, All Saints isn’t only about those who have died. While we recognize those Christians who have gone before us, it also gives us the opportunity to ask how we should live as saints now (remember the New Testament understanding of “saints” includes all Christian people of every time and place). Therefore, how do we intend to pass on the faith to future generations of Christians?

All Saints is actually in the middle of a three day period of celebration and remembrance called Allhallowtide. The first day is All Hallows’ Evening. That’s where we get Halloween (though the modern secular holiday is much different!). The word “hallow” as a verb means to set apart as holy. But it is also a noun, referring to a holy person, or a saint. Like Christmas Eve, Christians traditionally celebrated All Saints with a vigil the evening before.

All Saints Day is then followed by a lesser known day, All Souls Day on November 2. Whereas All Saints traditionally was a day to celebrate the well-known heroes of the faith, All Souls was a day to remember specifically our own loved ones who have faithfully lived and died. Today, most Protestants (Western Christian Churches separate from the Roman Catholic Church) have merged All Souls into one All Saints celebration.

DO THE MATH

The book of Exodus tells the story about building the Tabernacle, the sanctuary for God's presence to dwell. The people whose hearts were stirred and whose spirits were willing brought their offerings for the Tabernacle and all its service. The people kept bringing their offerings every morning until the workers told Moses the people had given more than enough to complete the work the Lord had commanded. So Moses told the people they had given enough. In fact, they needed to stop giving because there was too much. The people had to be restrained from giving more! (Exodus 25, 35, 36)

This story exemplifies generous giving to God's kingdom. Unfortunately, it also calls into questions how we use our money today.

Charitable giving has remained stuck in our country at 2% for fifty years. That accurately reflects the average giving in The United Methodist Church, too. This is significantly different from scripture teaching us to give to God first, to give generously and cheerfully, and to give 10% of our income.

A meeting at the kitchen table

When I was a new pastor serving my first, full-time appointment, my wife, Joy, and I had only been married a few years. Like many young couples, we were struggling financially. I remember well when we decided to have a money meeting at the kitchen table. We did the math. We looked at the numbers to know exactly how much income we were receiving and how much we were called to give for God's kingdom. It was there that we made the decision to commit our money to God. We literally got on our knees at the kitchen table and asked God to help us handle the money entrusted to us in a faithful way. We committed to tithing, giving 10% of our income to the church. Our financial situation didn't completely change overnight, but it did begin to change for the better.

That was more than twenty-five years ago, but because of that kitchen table meeting we have lived with no debt except the mortgage on our home. While the budget adjusts each year, we give 10-15% of my income to the church. And we're increasing our giving for this next year. Is it difficult to give away such a big percentage of income? It's not about whether it's tough or easy. It's simply about intentionally choosing how to use our money.

So the first thing we intentionally choose each month is to give in response to God's abundant grace in our lives. We give, as Jesus and the church have taught us, because it supports the church's mission. And we give so that we are not defined by our money, so that we are not captive to our wealth. Clearly, God's way is different than the world's.

How have you decided to give to God's kingdom? Have you done the math? Have a meeting at the kitchen table and do the math. Are you giving 2% or closer to 10%? If our congregation is going to thrive and be fruitful, then we need the resources to accomplish our mission. Let's grow together and fund God's work through our church until we too have to be restrained from giving more.


