## MINNESOTA AND ARKANSAS AGENCY LEADERS ADVOCATE FOR FALL FLIGHTS AFTER INSPIRING TOURS OF CANADIAN WATERFOWL HABITATS

Leaders from Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and Arkansas Game and Fish Commission (AGFC) recently returned from eye-opening tours of key waterfowl habitats in Manitoba and Saskatchewan. These visits provided valuable insights that will help both agencies make informed decisions about their investments in Canada.

## ARKANSAS RECOMMENDS COMMISSIONERS AND STAFF PARTICIPATION

Arkansas leads the nation with an \$800,000 investment in Fall Flights - \$100,000 beyond their initial goal. To maintain support for these efforts, Arkansas Game and Fish Commission (AGFC) periodically visits Canada to learn more about how their investments are protecting priority waterfowl habitats.
