Welcome to St. Francis-in-the-Fields!

Whether you're a guest or a member, we're glad you're here for worship today. Please help us get to know you by completing the Guest Card in the rack at each end of the pew and placing the detachable part in the offering plate. There is a welcome table in the narthex (foyer) where you can receive more information about our parish, along with a small gift. Our Clergy and Greeters look forward to meeting you after the service.

Liturgy & Music: Our liturgy follows the *Book of Common Prayer* (BCP), with some material from *Enriching our Worship* (EOW). Our hymns come from the blue and green hymnals in the pews, along with other sources. To reduce waste, we have recently introduced a reusable, **Seasonal Bulletin** with our ongoing liturgy for the season, and a **Weekly Insert** containing musical references, readings, prayer intentions, and other resources as needed.

Worship & Communion: You are invited to prepare your soul for worship by kneeling silently in your pew before the service begins. Our service begins with a single ring of the bell, followed by a brief time of contemplative silence. When the bell rings three times, the congregation stands for the opening procession. For those whose custom is to cross themselves at certain times during the liturgy, appropriate places are marked with (+). Our table is the table of the Lord. Everyone present is invited to take communion. Gluten-free wafers are available upon request.

Children: We welcome all children in our worship services, and ask you not to worry if your child is active or makes noise. "Busy Bags" and books for kids are available from the Ushers. Our "Children's Room" in the office hallway is available if at any time your infant or child needs a change of scenery or a new diaper. With the approval of their parents, young children are welcomed and encouraged to take communion. Our Church School typically meets on the 2nd and 4th Sundays, September to May. For more information please speak with a member, or visit our website.

Accessibility: At different times during worship, the congregation may stand or kneel according to custom. Those who suffer physical discomfort are invited remain seated, or stand or kneel as they are able. During Communion, please notify an Usher if you are unable to come forward and we will bring Communion to you. Gluten-free communion wafers are available.

Restrooms: Two public restrooms are located in the office hallway.

THE SERMON

A period of silence follows the Sermon, after which all stand and say together:

THE NICENE CREED

We believe in one God,
the Father, the Almighty,
maker of heaven and earth,
of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,
the only Son of God,
eternally begotten of the Father,
God from God, Light from Light,
true God from true God, begotten, not made,
of one Being with the Father.
Through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation
he came down from heaven:
by the power of the Holy Spirit
he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary,
and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried.
On the third day he rose again
 in accordance with the Scriptures;
he ascended into heaven
 and is seated at the right hand of the Father.
He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead,
 and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,
 who proceeds from the Father and the Son.
With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified.
He has spoken through the Prophets.
We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.
We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.
We look for the resurrection (+) of the dead,
 and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Collect of the Day

O God, you have prepared for those who love you such good things as surpass our understanding: Pour into our hearts such love towards you, that we, loving you in all things and above all things, may obtain your promises, which exceed all that we can desire; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

First Lesson

Acts 16:9-15

During the night Paul had a vision: there stood a man of Macedonia pleading with him and saying, "Come over to Macedonia and help us." When he had seen the vision, we immediately tried to cross over to Macedonia, being convinced that God had called us to proclaim the good news to them.

We set sail from Troas and took a straight course to Samothrace, the following day to Neapolis, and from there to Philippi, which is a leading city of the district of Macedonia and a Roman colony. We remained in this city for some days. On the sabbath day we went outside the gate by the river, where we supposed there was a place of prayer; and we sat down and spoke to the women who had gathered there. A certain woman named Lydia, a worshiper of God, was listening to us; she was from the city of Thyatira and a dealer in purple cloth. The Lord opened her heart to listen eagerly to what was said by Paul. When she and her household were baptized, she urged us, saying, "If you have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come and stay at my home." And she prevailed upon us.

Second Lesson

Revelation 21:10, 22-22:5

In the spirit the angel carried me away to a great, high mountain and showed me the holy city Jerusalem coming down out of heaven from God.

I saw no temple in the city, for its temple is the Lord God the Almighty and the Lamb. And the city has no need of sun or moon to shine on it, for the glory of God is its light, and its lamp is the Lamb. The nations will walk by its light, and the kings of the earth will bring their glory into it. Its gates will never be shut by day- and there will be no night there. People will bring into it the glory and the honor of the nations. But nothing unclean will enter it, nor anyone who practices abomination or falsehood, but only those who are written in the Lamb's book of life.

Then the angel showed me the river of the water of life, bright as crystal, flowing from the throne of God and of the Lamb through the middle of the street of the city. On either side of the river is the tree of life with its twelve kinds of fruit, producing its fruit each month; and the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations. Nothing accursed will be found there any more. But the throne of God and of the Lamb will be in it, and his servants will worship him; they will see his face, and his name will be on their foreheads. And there will be no more night; they need no light of lamp or sun, for the Lord God will be their light, and they will reign forever and ever.

Gospel Lesson

John 5:1-9

After this there was a festival of the Jews, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. Now in Jerusalem by the Sheep Gate there is a pool, called in Hebrew Beth-zatha, which has five porticoes. In these lay many invalids—blind, lame, and paralyzed. One man was there who

had been ill for thirty-eight years. When Jesus saw him lying there and knew that he had been there a long time, he said to him, "Do you want to be made well?" The sick man answered him, "Sir, I have no one to put me into the pool when the water is stirred up; and while I am making my way, someone else steps down ahead of me." Jesus said to him, "Stand up, take your mat and walk." At once the man was made well, and he took up his mat and began to walk. Now that day was a sabbath.

Music in Ministry

This Sunday, we will be continuing from where Jean Titelouze left off and hear a piece by one of his followers, Francois Couperin. Couperin wrote two big pieces for the organ: His mass for the parishes and the mass for the convents. From the latter, this piece was written to be played during the climax of the French mass, the Elevation. This is where the priest raises the host to be blessed. Elevations are special pieces in the organ repertoire as it features some of the most interesting color choices on the organs these composers would have used. In this example, the melody notes mix in a stop called the "Tierce". The Tierce is actually an entirely different note than the principal note, but our ears combine them to sound like a shimmery combination of notes.
