THE SECOND LESSON

Hebrews 11:8-16

A Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews

By faith Abraham, when called to go to a place he would later receive as his inheritance, obeyed and went, even though he did not know where he was going. By faith he made his home in the promised land like a stranger in a foreign country; he lived in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he was looking forward to the city with foundations, whose architect and builder is God. And by faith even Sarah, who was past childbearing age, was enabled to bear children because she considered him faithful who had made the promise. And so from this one man, and he as good as dead, came descendants as numerous as the stars in the sky and as countless as the sand on the seashore. All these people were still living by faith when they died. They did not receive the things promised; they only saw them and welcomed them from a distance, admitting that

they were foreigners and strangers on earth. People who say such things show that they are looking for a country of their own. If they had been thinking of the country they had left, they would have had opportunity to return. Instead, they were longing for a better country—a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God, for he has prepared a city for them.

This Sunday, interspersed throughout the service are some of the hymns that were particularly beloved as our nation was founded. During the Offertory, you will hear an American hymn that was so beloved during the Revolution that it was a major contender to be our national anthem. Amazing Grace, first published in 1779, quickly became a part of the newly growing American identity. "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing" was written by Isaac Watts, one of the most famous hymn writers of the time. Considering the lack of access to any recorded music, these great hymns were the most frequently heard music across the country as parish, congregation, and family devotional music would have been performed most often.
