Welcome to St. Francis-in-the-Fields!

Whether you're a guest or a member, rich or poor, young or old; whatever your political alignment, racial background, gender, ethnicity, or country of origin; no matter if you're a cradle Episcopalian, from another faith expression, or claim no faith at all – we're glad you've joined us for worship today. Worship: Our liturgy follows the *Book of Common Prayer* (BCP), found in the book rack, with some material from *Enriching our Worship* (EOW). Our hymns come from the blue and green hymnals in the pews, along with other resources. All text for the service is printed in the bulletin. You are invited to prepare your soul for worship by kneeling silently in your pew before the service begins.

Children: We welcome all young children in our worship services, and ask you not to worry if your child is active or makes noise. "Busy Bags" for kids are available from the Ushers. Our "Children's Room" in the office hallway is available if at any time your infant or child needs a change of scenery.

Accessibility: At different times during worship, the congregation may stand or kneel according to custom. Those who suffer physical discomfort are invited remain seated, or stand or kneel as they are able. During Communion, please notify an Usher if you are unable to come forward and we will bring Communion to you. Gluten-free communion wafers are available.

Facilities: Two public restrooms are located in the office hallway.

THE GREAT SILENCE

After the bell rings once, please observe a time of silence. When the bell rings three times, please stand as able for the opening and procession.

The service begins in the Narthex of the church. All who are able are encouraged to partake in the procession, lining up behind the Altar Party, Choir, and Clergy. As you process into the church, you may take your seat.

THE OPENING ACCLAMATION

Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord.

Peace in heaven and glory in the highest.

Let us pray.

A ssist us mercifully with your help, O Lord God of our salvation, that we may enter with joy upon the contemplation of those mighty acts, whereby you have given us life and immortality; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

THE GOSPEL READING: Mark 11:1-11

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately.'" They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting,

"Hosanna!

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!

Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David!

Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.

The Celebrant then says the following blessing

Celebrant The Lord be with you.

People And also with you.

Celebrant Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People It is right to give our thanks and praise.

It is right to praise you, Almighty God, for the acts of love by which you have redeemed us through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. On this day he entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph, and was proclaimed as King of kings by those who spread their garments and branches of palm along his way. Let these branches be for us signs of his victory, and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns in glory with you and the Holy Spirit, now and forever. Amen.

Celebrant Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

People Hosanna in the highest.

Deacon Let us go forth in peace.

People In the name of Christ. Amen.

The procession now begins. The following Psalm is spoken together during the procession.

PSALM 118:1-2, 19-29 (together)

Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; * his mercy endures for ever.

Let Israel now proclaim, *
"His mercy endures for ever."

Open for me the gates of righteousness; * I will enter them; I will offer thanks to the Lord.

"This is the gate of the Lord; * he who is righteous may enter."

I will give thanks to you, for you answered me * and have become my salvation.

The same stone which the builders rejected * has become the chief cornerstone.

This is the Lord's doing, * and it is marvelous in our eyes.

On this day the Lord has acted; * we will rejoice and be glad in it.

Hosannah, Lord, hosannah! * Lord, send us now success.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord; * we bless you from the house of the Lord.

God is the Lord; he has shined upon us; * form a procession with branches up to the horns of the altar.

"You are my God, and I will thank you; * you are my God, and I will exalt you."

Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; * his mercy endures for ever.

The procession stops at the door of the church for the following prayer.

A lmighty God, whose most dear Son went not up to joy but first he suffered pain, and entered not into glory before he was crucified: Mercifully grant that we, walking in the way of the cross, may find it none other than the way of life and peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The procession now enters the church, all singing heartily.

CHORAL POSTLUDE: Herzliebster Jesu

Johannes Brahms

Music in Ministry

For our final hymn and postlude we will be singing and hearing the classic hymn *Herliebster Jesu*. The original text was written by Johann Heermann. Heermann was a Lutheran pastor during a terribly difficult time period in Germany. The Thirty Years War was catastrophic in terms of destruction and death. Heermann had to flee from his church multiple times! Often he would need to leave behind all of his earthly possessions. Despite composing most of his hymn texts during the 30 years war, Heermann was eternally hopeful and strong of faith. The basis of this text is likely from Jean de Fecamp, who was usually misattributed as St. Augustine himself.

The postlude is a chorale setting of this hymn by my favorite composer, Johannes Brahms. Brahms had a personal story of loss throughout his biography often leaving him in a state of melancholy. Of course this sadness is expressed in his music which contains some of the most beautiful expressions of sadness. His Eleven Chorale Preludes were one of the last pieces he composed in his life. They were inspired by the death of Brahms' close personal friend (and unrequited love) Clara Schumann. As we transition into Holy Week, use this piece to reflect on the sacrifice and loss that is the journey towards Good Friday. It only makes the celebration of Easter even more exuberant.

The Rt. Rev. Barbara C. Harris

The Rt. Rev. Barbara C. Harris, was the first woman to be ordained a bishop in the Episcopal Church of the United States — indeed, in its parent body, the worldwide Anglican Communion. She was born in Philadelphia in 1930.

Ms. Harris served as suffragan, or assistant, bishop of the Massachusetts diocese from 1989 until her retirement in 2002. Her election in 1988 <u>caused turmoil</u> both in the Episcopal Church and in the Anglican Communion, an international family of 46 autonomous churches that includes the Church of England. She even faced death threats. For her consecration as bishop, on Feb. 11, 1989, at the Hynes Convention Center in Boston, the Boston police offered her a bulletproof vest to wear. Ms. Harris declined.

In a church whose parishioners have included about a quarter of American presidents and business titans like J.P. Morgan and Henry Ford, Ms. Harris pressed for the integration of historically segregated parishes — she was an early member of the Union of Black Episcopalians, founded in 1968 — and called for greater numbers of women in the clergy.

This story is shared in today's bulletin as a way of honoring Women's History Month.
