"And also with you."

For some people, it's their favorite part of worship, and for others, it's the most dreaded moment of the morning. Exchanging the *Peace of Christ* is one of the oldest traditions in the Christian church, which dates all the way back to the 1st century. Yet, for many people today, the significance of this ritual has been lost.

In the ancient church, exchanging the peace of Christ was not simply an opportunity to stretch your legs or ask your neighbor about his cookout last Friday. Instead, this was the time for worshipers to seek forgiveness and reconciliation with their neighbor. Matthew 5:23-24 says, "So when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift."

If there was conflict within the church, *The Peace* provided an

opportunity for healing to occur. This act of worship comes before the celebration of Holy Communion during the service so that worshipers can approach the altar in unity.

It's important to remember that the peace we share in worship is not *our attempt at peace*, but instead is the *peace of Christ* that has already been given to us. According to the Apostle Paul, the peace of Christ passes all understanding (Phil. 4:7) as it reconciles all things with God (Col. 1:20). When we share this Peace with our neighbor, we recognize our own need for God's grace.

So while it might seem like a time for small talk and laughs, the Peace in worship points towards a much more important truth. God has brought divine peace to our lives and it is our joy to offer that same peace to others.

"Robert Seligson and I were part of a group, mostly from North Carolina, that spent a week in February traveling around Rwanda to meet young adults who have participated in ZOE Empowers' three-year program. ZOE, which is supported by HBUMC, works with orphans and teaches them skills so they can be successful entrepreneurs. ZOE graduates are doing all sorts of things to support themselves and their siblings, including making clothes, cutting hair, baking goods, operating corner food stores, and riding motorcycle taxis. Bob took a lot of photos, which made him popular with the Rwandan children, who enjoyed seeing their photos on his digital camera."

The Finance Committee meets six times a year and members generally serve a term of three years.

The Committee is responsible for formulating an annual operating budget at the beginning of each year. With the able support of our Executive Director and Controller, the committee takes into account the results of the past year, anticipated expenses for the coming year, pledges committed for the new year along with a conservative estimate of non pledged contributions. The proposed budget is presented to the Church Council in March for adoption and throughout the year, the Finance Committee monitors contributions received and expenses incurred to ensure they align with the budget.

The Committee also reviews an independent audit of the church finances, meets with the auditors to address any questions which may arise and approves the final annual audit.


The Finance Committee manages the Rainy Day Fund supplementing it with cash surpluses when they occur and approving withdrawals from this fund when necessary to cover unexpected expenses.

Our church is blessed to have a number of endowments created by faithful members over the years. The Finance Committee is entrusted to make prudent use of the earnings from these endowments consistent with the expressed intent of their donors. The committee meets annually with the Permanent Endowment Committee to stay abreast of the performance of our endowments.

The Finance Committee works closely with several other groups within the church, including the Board of Trustees and the Stewardship Committee. The Board of Trustees has responsibility for managing all church property. From time to time, the Trustees will identify a need and ask the Finance Committee to identify a source of funds to support the need. The Stewardship Committee is charged with developing and implementing the annual stewardship campaign which is so vital to our ability to carry out the mission of the church. The chair of the Stewardship Committee serves on the Finance Committee, and the chair of Finance also serves on the Stewardship Committee.


UMW College Scholarship - Apply by April 30
