From Pastor Molly

“Go and do likewise.”

In the familiar final sentence in The Parable of the Good Samaritan from Luke’s Gospel (10:25-37), Jesus tells the expert in the law to be like the generous man from the parable: *“Go and do likewise.”* Be like the good Samaritan man who helped his neighbor. This is a favorite story in our Christian tradition. It’s relatable. It’s about being kind, helpful, and good. It’s about doing the unpopular thing. It’s about being a good neighbor. It’s about being an imitator of God.

We often think about generosity in terms of offering charitable gifts and services to people in our community. Yet, generosity is about far more than money and help. Being generous means ***cultivating a generous spirit***. God’s gift of being made in God’s own image includes the capacity for generosity. So, the gift of our capacity for cultivating a generous spirit begins with God. Jesus models generous living in the Gospels by his teaching and by his willingness to sacrifice out of love and mercy. The Holy Spirit leads us toward generosity if we are willing to trust God and to be led.

Part of the work of generosity is surveying our own hearts. Do we appreciate God’s generosity *for* us? Do we celebrate God’s generosity to the world – from the first act of Creation to the continuing nurture of everyday living? Does this heart-and-head discernment of the generous nature of God inspire us to imitate God? Or, put another way, does God’s generous nature and generous action in the world inspire us to go and do likewise?

As a community of neighbors at Hayes Barton UMC, we will spend August considering what it means to be generous. Each Sunday in August, we will look to

Scripture in our sermons and our Sunday School lessons as we begin to understand and to cultivate a community where a spirit of generosity governs our interactions. During the Sunday School hour, the adults will gather in Holroyd Hall, the youth in the JOY Class Assembly Room, and the children in the Children’s Fellowship Hall. All age groups will participate in our discussions about generosity – and we hope that the conversation continues in the car ride home from church or at the family dinner table. For the adults gathered during the Sunday School hour, the first and fourth weeks in August will focus on a particular Scripture passage, the second week will feature a panel discussion entitled “Generosity in All Seasons,” and the third week will include small group sessions on living generously.

Join us in August while we consider what it means to live in a truly generous way. As you prepare your hearts to hear the message of generosity from the scripture and from one another, pray these words from Evelyn Underhill:

Lord! Give me courage and love to open the door and constrain You to enter; whatever the disguise You come in, even before I fully recognize my guest.

Come in! Enter my small life!

Lay your sacred hands on all the common things and small interests of that life and bless and change them. Transfigure my small resources, make them sacred. And in them give me Your very Self. Amen.

Have you ever thought, I want to show up as an anti-racist person in my community, but I'm not sure how? This study is for you!

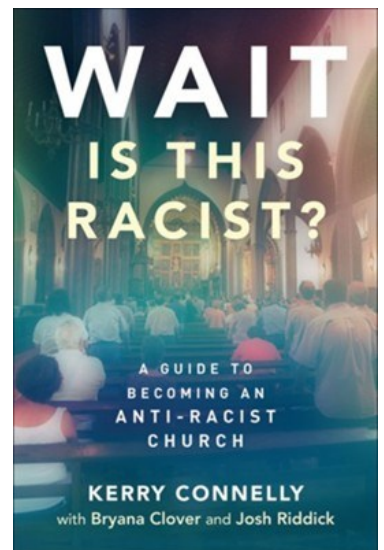

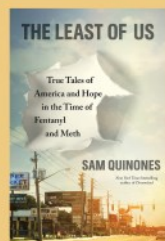

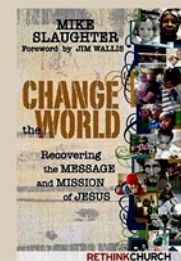

Register Now for Virtual Racial Equity Institute Training

In 2019, HBUMC hosted training that was provided by the Racial Equity Institute (REI) and attended by about 30 HB members. REI provides training and consulting programs across the country



“designed to help individuals, organizations, and communities grow their understanding and analysis of structural racism and its cultural and historic roots.” REI, in collaboration with ROAR, is currently providing Phase I training sessions in a virtual format. Phase I training, which is two full days, offers an in-depth curriculum focusing on “a historical, cultural, structural and institutional analysis of racism” and provides an opportunity for open discussion in a racially diverse group.
