

## From Pastor Laura



**I am not sure where I heard this**, maybe in a seminary class or just in conversation with a wise person, but I once heard the suggestion that we ought to spend more time reading scripture outside of our sanctuaries and homes. Specifically, we should be reading scripture out in the world. Scripture, this person said, takes on new life, new muscle, when it's read in other places.



For instance, Micah 6:8 (*what does the Lord require of you but to do justice and to love kindness and to walk humbly with your God?*) causes us to pause and reflect more deeply when we read it on the steps of a courthouse, or in front of the legislative building.

Psalm 121, *I lift up my eyes to the hills, from where will my help come?* reverberates more in my soul when I read it standing at the base of a mountain than sitting in my living room.

*Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil* (Psalm 23) takes on greater power when read at a death-bed than simply hearing it from a pulpit.

**Scripture takes on new life when we engage with it outside of our usual locations.**

**The same is true for worship.**



For several years I served a new church plant, which was a congregation that, for many years, had no permanent, physical building. This offered us the opportunity to be creative and to experience the very much living story of God out in the world. Weekly worship took place in a gym at an elementary school, with bleachers instead of pews. Christmas Eve worship took place in a barn, on a working farm with loud and fragrant cows. Stations of the Cross on Good Friday were processed and read at the airport park, with planes landing, and children running around us. These stories of God, and our experiences of God, took on new life in these new places.



**When we gather on May 7th for Worship in the Park**, we do so to worship together as one church family, but also to see what God sounds like when God speaks in a new place. We look forward to worshiping with you on the 7th, and to experiencing the living story of God out in the world.

## Listening Sessions: Let us know how Hayes Barton can help our local community

The Hayes Barton UMC Outreach Committee and Biblical Justice Action Team is attempting to canvas as many members of the church as possible on the question: **“If you could change something about your local community, what would it be?”** At three different listening sessions (in person; one will include a Zoom option), we'll hope to identify what is on the hearts of our congregation and find the areas in which all of God's people can come alive in God's kingdom. Listening sessions will be held on Wednesday, May 10 (10am), Thursday, May 11 (7pm) and Tuesday, May 16 (7pm) to gather this information from our members, in addition to some during Sunday School hour and within already convening small groups.

The information compiled may have value in the design of our church theme for the coming year. Previously, our outreach activities have been decided solely by the Outreach Committee and those who have presented us with opportunities. We want the most amount of people vested in our activities, so our hope is to use this information to see the issues about which our church is most passionate.

These individual convictions would also be shared with One Wake, an agency consisting of multiple interfaith congregations that has been committed to finding solutions to the affordable housing crisis over the past two years. Our information from Hayes Barton will help them as they determine the new issues

for which they would like to advocate for the citizens of Wake County.

At all listening sessions the convictions and opinions within our congregation will be received and considered openly. Our facilitators will host each session and are trained in receiving and documenting differing views in the pursuit of full assessment of our congregation. Some examples of what might break your heart or areas in which you might want to see change are affordable housing for all, youth mental health access, or food insecurity to name a few. We invite you to quietly contemplate this question and come with your own genuine concerns and passions.


## Vacation Bible School Volunteers Needed
