## From Pastor Matt

“Do you know the name of anyone living in poverty?” This was a question that one of my professors in Divinity School asked his class one day. This particular professor had served as the pastor of various sized churches throughout his career and had served three terms as a Bishop in the United Methodist Church. He remains one of the most formative people in my life of faith. My teacher wanted to make sure that when his seminary students went to serve in a local church, we did not forget the poor.

He continued his questioning: “Do you know the story of anyone experiencing homelessness or living on the margins of society? Are you on a first name basis with anyone who is incarcerated or transitioning back into society post-incarceration? How often do you invite a mother or father who is struggling to provide for her or his family to share her or his life story with you over a meal?” With his questioning, my pastoral teacher was planting seeds of what Old Testament scholar Walter Brueggemann calls “the Prophetic Imagination”, or reimagining the world through the lens of God’s compassion, mercy, and justice. A prophetic imagination leads to seeing people who are different than we are as God does. A prophetic imagination leads us to listen to the voices and stories of people different from the usual voices to which we listen. **A prophetic imagination leads to radical, transformative relationship.**

Over the past year, the Outreach Committee, our Being Boaz group (a missionally-minded team that responds to local outreach needs), and other outreach-focused church leaders have been asking deeper questions about how we, as a church, **are in relationship with** the impoverished, the marginalized, the easily overlooked people in the Raleigh community.

As a church, we will continue to support individuals and families through the Pastor’s Discretionary Fund (aiding families with utility bills, rent, food, etc.) and the Inasmuch Fund (a fund that addresses unexpected outreach needs that arise throughout the year). We will continue collecting food and basic living supplies for various local pantries. We will continue working with refugee families, women’s shelters, and agencies supporting those experiencing food or housing insecurities, and the list goes on.

During this past year, what has become clear to various Outreach leaders is that God is leading our church to find ways to **deepen our relationship with the impoverished and marginalized** through our Outreach ministries. In other words, God’s Spirit is prompting us to know those we serve by name, to listen to their stories, and thus to be transformed. Our Christian faith and Wesleyan heritage teach us that Jesus is present in these holy moments of outreach and service among the marginalized; and Jesus’s presence always transforms.

As we look to the fall, the Outreach Committee, Being Boaz, and other congregation leaders will be creating opportunities for engaging the needs in our community through outreach and service. Please join us in praying for the ways that we, as a church, might deepen our relationship with those we serve.

## ANNUAL CONFERENCE 2022

As members of Hayes Barton Methodist Church, we participate in life and ministry through our prayers, presence, gifts, service and witness, knowing we can make a greater impact when we join forces to serve and do good together. Similarly, our church is more effective because of our connection with other churches in eastern and central North Carolina that form the North Carolina Conference of the UMC. Representatives of HBUMC recently experienced the power of this “connectionalism” at the Annual Conference in Greenville, North Carolina, which took place on June 15-18, 2022. This was the first time the Annual Conference has taken place in person since 2019. Participants who met on Zoom the prior two years – about 1600 in total, half clergy and half lay members – cherished the opportunity to rekindle friendships, pray, learn and conduct business together.

HBUMC was well-represented. All of your pastors and lay delegate Eric Stevens participated. Rev. Laura Fine Ledford, as Chair of the Board of Ordained Ministry, presented those who had been approved as ordained pastors and commissioned as part of the ordination process, while explaining how the Board works to support aspiring pastors during their ordination journeys. And Rev. Molly White gave an update on the work of the Board of Church and Society to support congregations in finding new ways to take action to make their communities more just, merciful and loving.

For three busy days the group, under Bishop Leonard Fairley’s leadership, worshiped, celebrated the past year’s accomplishments, took care of Conference business and more. Here are a few highlights of what the Conference has done recently:

- ⊕ The Conference’s Disaster Ministries helped thousands of eastern North Carolina families get back on their feet after the hurricanes of recent years. More recently they have focused their efforts helping tornado victims in western North Carolina and Kentucky and hurricane victims in Louisiana.
- ⊕ The Conference dispersed \$2.7 million in COVID-related grants to 635 churches.
- ⊕ The Conference’s Center for Leadership Excellence provided 50 online training opportunities for church leaders that were attended by more than 3800 participants.
- ⊕ The Conference provides training opportunities to assist churches in their efforts to be more welcoming to people of all races, cultures and backgrounds and encourages cross-racial and cross-cultural appointments.
- ⊕ The Conference provides support for invaluable organizations such as the Methodist Home for Children and the North Carolina Camp and Retreat Ministries, which operates Camp Don Lee, Camp Chestnut Ridge, and Camp Rockfish.
- ⊕ The Conference worked with the Duke Endowment to provide grants for several rural Conference churches to host summer literacy programs that help students who otherwise would have fallen behind due in school during the pandemic.

The work of the Conference is made possible through apportionments paid by member churches and accomplished in large part through bodies such as the Board of Trustees, the Council on Finance & Administration, Nominations, and the Board of Missions, with assistance from the Bishop’s office and Conference staff. These groups present recommendations to the Annual Conference, which holds votes to, among other things, approve the Conference budget and staff positions and salaries, provide health insurance and pensions for pastors, approve nominees for boards and committees, and respond to challenges such as establishing terms through which churches that no longer want to be a part of the UMC can “disaffiliate” and developing a new relationship agreement for churches that sponsor Boy Scout troops to enter with the Boy Scouts of America that better protects our youth from harm and our churches from liability risk. Ultimately, our church’s pastors were reappointed for another year and all important business was completed. The Conference is well-positioned to serve HBUMC and all of its member churches well into the future.


