From Pastor Molly

Grace and Peace to you, Friends in Christ,

Three years ago, I took a wonderful three-week trip to England with a group of Methodists to learn about John and Charles Wesley and the early Methodist movement. Although I was part of a group, I didn't know anyone on the trip. I arrived in England a bit early and stayed a bit late on my own. I was by myself for several days. I learned as much about myself in the time I had alone as I learned about the Wesley brothers. The time alone stretched me beyond my comfort zone. On Sunday evening I'm headed off to England again, and I'll be on my own this time, too. I'm staying at the Wesley House at Cambridge University for a spiritual retreat (followed by some tourist time with the family in southern England). Alone for a week, I plan to soak up history, to be with my thoughts where there are nightly Evensong services and plentiful tea, to pray, and to rest my soul.

On the 2019 trip, Rev. Steve Manskar was one of our Wesley guides. In a book on covenant discipleship, Steve wrote this: *"One does not become a disciple by accident."* He is absolutely right. Becoming a disciple takes intentional effort – and, more often than not, becoming a disciple requires us to get outside of our comfort zone. Traveling alone helps me get outside of my comfort zone and allows me the time that I need to let my mind rest, wander, and wonder. I'm forced to face unknown situations and fears. I can embrace my curiosity, go down lovely rabbit holes, and rest well at night, having walked miles and miles exploring and pondering.

You don't need to travel abroad to get outside of your comfort zone. Taking on the challenge of stretching yourself toward purposeful and intentional discipleship is something that you can do here at your church home. As we've come back together as the Hayes Barton UMC community this fall, I have been so heartened by the number of people who have gotten outside of their comfort zones! Let me share some of the ways that people are being intentional – not accidental – disciples at Hayes Barton UMC in

our adult Spiritual Formation ministry this year.

- Some of our church lay leaders have joined together to form new covenant groups meeting weekly to get out of their comfort zones by sharing their faith journeys and by working on spiritual goals.
- We have large groups of adults on Wednesday nights challenging themselves by sharing the joys and heartaches of parenthood with one another, by working through middle-age together and searching for deeper meaning, by examining the retirement years and legacy issues, and by sharing the weight of grief and bearing one another's burdens.
- Our Sunday School classes are back together – including three new classes for young Adults, adults with young children, and for the adult JOY Class volunteers. Others are stretching their discipleship by volunteering with the Starnes Class on Sunday mornings.
- On Wednesday mornings and Sunday evenings we're wrestling with the Bible, asking questions about God, and looking at modern biblical scholarship that challenges old ideas.

And this is only the adult Spiritual Formation ministry! We have people challenging themselves and their discipleship by engaging in mission and justice ministries, by joining the choir, by agreeing to serve on administrative teams, by volunteering with Youth and Children's ministries, and by serving on the hospitality teams on Sunday mornings for worship. Friends, I invite you to be a disciple – on purpose! Explore a new way to worship, grow, or serve at Hayes Barton UMC that stretches you just beyond your comfort zone. I look forward to the hearing about the ways that the love of God and neighbor is growing in your life.


Reverend Peter Storey

On Wednesday night, November 9, HBUMC welcomes Reverend Peter Storey, in conversation with church member John Drescher, contributing editor of The Assembly. Storey is a South African Methodist minister who is a former president of the Methodist Church of Southern Africa (MCSA), and of the South African Council of Churches (SACC), and Ruth W. and A. Morris Williams Distinguished Professor Emeritus of the Practice of Christian Ministry at Duke University Divinity School.

His 40-year ministry in South Africa was defined by sustained opposition to the infamous apartheid government and its oppressive racist policies, first in Cape Town during the forced removals of people of color and as chaplain to Nelson Mandela and other political prisoners on Robben Island. Later, as a Methodist and Ecumenical leader, he played a significant national role in the Church's anti-apartheid struggle. He and then Bishop Desmond Tutu were witnesses-in-chief for the SACC when the apartheid regime put the organization on trial.

38 More Parkview Manor Secret Pals Needed






Please Create Your KidCheck Account Now


