*“Solitude is not yet prayer; it is a way into prayer.
Solitude is a door.*

*When you open the door of solitude,
you may find another door behind it.*

That is the door of silence.

Silence, too, is an environment for prayer.

-Doors into Prayer, Emilie Griffin, “Solitude and Silence”

I have a confession to make, though it won't be particularly shocking to those of y'all who know me well at this point. I loathe alone time. When I took the Meyers-Briggs at the start of my undergrad psychology degree, I scored 98.9% extroverted. I am hard-wired as a people person, so cultivating a habit of solitude has never come easily or naturally to me.

More than anything else though, I can't stand absolute, still quiet. Growing up in a household with three teenage boys, you don't get a lot of practice with silence.

Because of that, forming a discipline of solitude and silence for prayer has been a long journey for me. It took me quite a long time to find a way to step into silence with God in such a way that I could hold my attention on God and not on the thousands of other distractions that came flying my way.

My current practice of prayerful solitude and silence actually came about as a complete accident. As part of a class assignment at Duke, we were instructed to prepare a sermon in any place that wasn't either our church, Duke Divinity, or our homes. I did the assignment while I walked through Duke Forest alone, with my phone's voice recorder running. I found that the combination of silence, solitude, nature and movement freed my brain up to talk to God in a way that felt honest and authentic for me.

Solitude and silence are a rare commodity that is absolutely vital for our prayer lives, as Pastor David reminded us a few weeks ago.

Finding solitude and silence requires us to lean into prayerful experimentation. Prayer is, at its core, the cultivation of attention towards God and relationship with God and there's no one size fits all model for that.

My challenge to you this coming week is to experiment with different types of silence and solitude this week, and try praying into each one. Make a list of seven places in your life where you are regularly alone and in a quiet environment, and each day choose one of those places to step into prayer. How does praying over your early morning coffee feel different than praying through your commute? Do you hear God better on an evening walk or in the calm before sleep?

Try something new in your prayer life this week. Something uncomfortable, something different. It may change your whole prayer life.

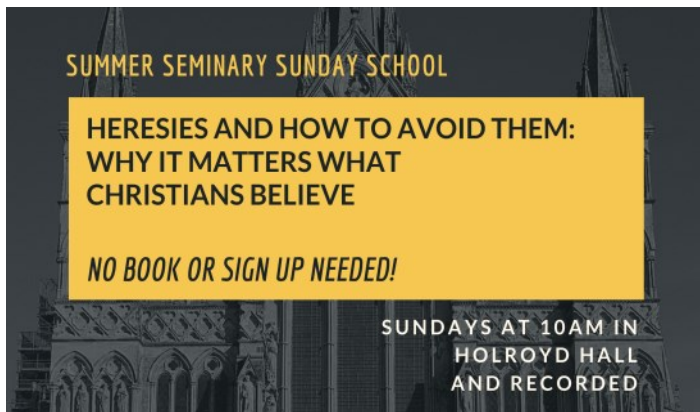

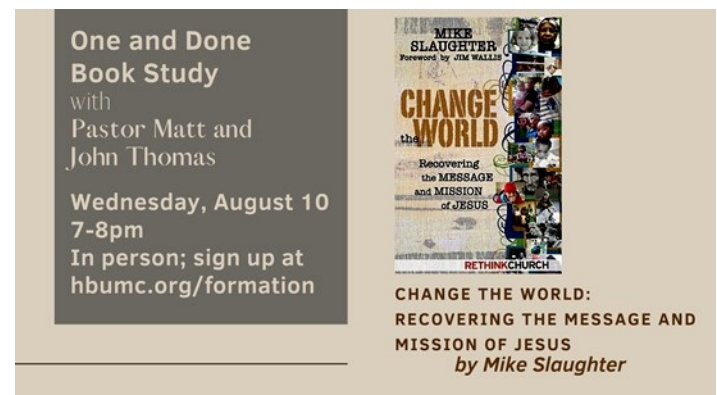

Register Now for Virtual Racial Equity Institute Training

In 2019, HBUMC hosted training that was provided by the Racial Equity Institute (REI) and attended by about 30 HB members. REI provides training and consulting programs across the country “designed to help individuals, organizations, and communities grow their understanding and analysis of structural racism and its cultural and historic roots.” REI, in collaboration with ROAR, is currently providing Phase I training sessions in a virtual format. **Phase I training**, which is two full days, offers an in-depth curriculum focusing on “a historical, cultural, structural and institutional analysis of racism” and provides an opportunity for open discussion in a racially diverse group. Registration for the Phase I virtual training program is available at www.oaralliance.org/schedule

Upcoming Phase 1 workshop dates are August 25-26, September 21-22, October 11-12, November 14-15, and December 1-2. There is a fee to participate in the training, but scholarships are available upon request, as indicated on the registration site. 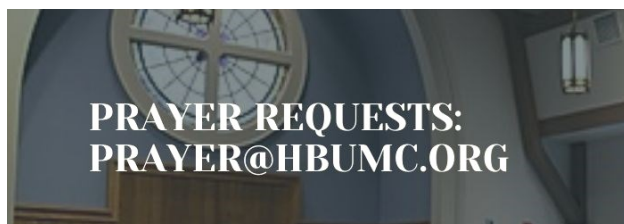
