


Northern Research Workshop Series



Understanding the Role of Indigenous People and Community in Northern Research

Working with Indigenous and northern communities is a pre-requisite for academic research in the North. Much of the North is home to Indigenous communities with a substantial investment in research practices. Today, engagement of Indigenous communities for academic research is required by Indigenous governments, university ethics protocols, and major research agencies including SSHRC, CIHR, and NSERC. This workshop will discuss the importance of involving Indigenous people and northern communities in all aspect of the research process. Consisting of a panel of experienced Indigenous and non-Indigenous scholars, students that have experience working with Indigenous communities, this sessions is beneficial for researchers of all experience levels. It will touch on ethical research approaches, Indigenous knowledge, the importance of incorporating community perspectives, and relationship building practices, all of which is essential to working productively with Indigenous and northern communities.
