1. Partners in the Search for Truth: Conversations between Science & Religion

Science and religion, especially in this country, have had an inconsistent and uneasy relationship with each other for some time. While some see no conflict between the two at all, others — both believers and non-believers alike — see a zero-sum match to the death. Even among those who desire to embrace both, it is often unclear how the two might best relate to one another. Join us as we explore the frontiers of science and religion and consider ways of framing their relationship that may lead to more fruitful paths of mutual enrichment and dialogue.

2. The Enchanted Imagination: The Christian Vision of J.R.R. Tolkien

"In a hole in the ground, there lived a hobbit." And so begins one of the most beloved stories written in the 20th century, The Hobbit, by the English author J.R.R. Tolkien. This story, together with The Lord of the Rings trilogy and other works filling out his legendarium, establish Tolkien as one of the greatest, most celebrated storytellers of all time. But what many don't fully appreciate is the degree to which these works of enchanted imagination are rooted in a profound Christian vision of life, hope, and human destiny. Join us as we adventure together!

3. The Sermon on the Mount: A Vision of Radical Discipleship and Alternative Community

The Sermon on the Mount in Matthew 5-7 is perhaps the best example of Jesus' core teachings in the gospels, and yet occupies almost no place in the historic creeds or practical Christian life today. It is often deemed high-minded and idealistic, but impractical. In this class series, we will recover this neglected text's radical vision for discipleship and consider its powerful present-day relevance for building alternative, counter-cultural communities of faithful resistance.
