Siblings in Christ,

First, thank you for giving me the privilege to serve Savannah Presbytery as part of your leadership team. It is a responsibility that I take seriously and prayerfully consider when choosing which continuing educational opportunities I should participate in and how to share these experiences broadly with all of you to equip our congregations. The decision of our presbytery in 2023 to spend a year "learning and discerning" the Matthew 25 Invitation led me to enroll in the Matthew 25 Summit held in Atlanta, GA January 16-18th of this year.

I took with me the questions I've been asked by our members; "What is Matthew 25?" "What do we have to do to become Matthew 25?" and "If we're already doing the work, why do we need to join or a have a label?" I considered these questions in every worship service, plenary, workshop, and conversation I experienced at the summit to find answers to share. Here is what I learned;

The Matthew 25 Invitation is:

- The fruition of the work of the *2020 Vision Team* charged by the 222nd General Assembly (2016) with developing a guiding statement for our denomination.
- The call to all of us to actively engage in the world around us, so our faith comes alive and the world wakes up to new possibilities. -Rev. Dr. Diane Moffett
- A message woven throughout the Old Testament scriptures and is the work of the Gospel- Rev. Dr. Liz Theoharis
- An opportunity to be a healing presence in the world. -Rev. Dr. Diane Moffett
- A "test of the heart"- for it requires us to ask, "Are our hearts large enough to enact God's love and God's justice?" Rev. Dr William Yoo
- The name for what we are called to do. Rev. Hodari Williams
- An invitation to whole new processes. Rev. Dr. William Yoo
- The vision of the wholeness of God's creation. Rev. Dr. Diane Moffett

Why should your congregation engage in the Matthew 25 Invitation?

- We are followers of Jesus- charged to teach, proclaim the good news, and heal.
- We can make a bigger impact on harmful systems when we are united.
- People will know us by our love.
- Scripture speaks to justice and healing and Jesus embodied these.
- We know in our hearts that God has called us to this work.
- We can leave a legacy of loving our neighbors as ourselves in our communities.
- We can transform lives and advance the common good.

What do we have to do to become a Matthew 25 group, congregation, or presbytery?
