After many long months, it continues to be so sweet and wonderful to get together. Over the summer and into the fall, there will be more and more opportunities for us to get together as a church. It will be good to see you again.



From the Council Moderator

Greetings from your Church Council! Here are highlights of our May meeting:

Devotion: Tim Dull shared a thought-provoking reading called “Care for Creation” from [A Liturgy for Ordinary Radicals](#). The reading urges us to “hav[e] the creativity to embody our theology imaginatively -- flushing toilets with dirty sink water, riding a bike to work as an act of prophetic dissent, or helping an institution become carbon neutral. At its core, creation care is about loving our global neighbor, because the poor suffer the most from the degradation of the earth and the struggle for clean water. . . . Christianity is not just about going up to heaven when we die; it’s about bringing God’s kingdom down, all the way to the dirt in our gardens.” Amen.

Stewardship Report: We received a report on the activities of the Stewardship Team and an update on current pledging in the Growing Our Generosity 2021 pledge campaign. Did you know that the Team and 19 “Porch Droppers” made personal deliveries of Stewardship care packages to 292 households? Thanks to the Team and Droppers for this extraordinary effort! Now, please get in your pledges!

Bernstein Margin Loan: We have begun discussions to develop a plan to pay down the loan obtained in 2019 to replace the building roof. The Finance Team has been working diligently to evaluate options. Further evaluation will occur over the coming months as the Capital Campaign Planning Task Force continues its study and development of a strategic vision for a potential capital campaign.

Refreshed Purpose and Covenant: We reviewed the plan for engaging with the congregation on the refreshed Purpose Statement and Covenant, which were announced in the May Messenger Bell. Council members along with the pastoral staff will participate in two discussion sessions following worship, and Council also will solicit feedback from members who are unable to participate in those sessions.

Planning for Indoor Worship: John Edgerton provided an update on the planning underway for returning to indoor worship. This planning also includes preparations for live-streaming of our services. We walked through a mock-up of a bulletin with John explaining the liturgical elements in light of current public health

guidelines. Several indoor and live-streamed worship services are being planned and will be announced for this summer.

Governance Policies and Procedures: As contemplated by this year’s Ministry Outline, the Council adopted a set of governance policies and procedures. This is the first chapter in what is underway for a comprehensive set of policies and procedures covering all aspects of the church’s operations.

Overture to the General Assembly: We approved a motion brought by the Faith in Action Team and developed by Pauline Coffman to approve the initiation by the Chicago Presbytery of an overture to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA). The overture, called “Confronting our Complicity in Colonialism, White Supremacy, and Racism.” [Click here](#) to read the full overture. Is There a Place in Heaven for the Digital Me?

Probably not, sorry. But, good that you asked because so much of who we are is now retained in digital form. Our photos, correspondence, music, health records and financial information are likely stashed somewhere in some digital “cloud.” Experts call this information our “digital assets.” One can’t help but wonder: Who owns or has access to my digital assets? What happens to my digital assets if I become disabled? What happens when I die?

You can bet, and certainly hope, that when you die all your emails, photos, music, health records and financial records won’t just disappear into the “cloud.” You will still have an on-line presence after you are gone, even though it’s pretty certain you will no longer be able to “tweet” your friends. In short, your digital assets will survive you just like your house and your car. But, you have physical possession of those assets. You have a title to your car and a deed to your house. Your executor will know how to transfer such physical assets to the next owner you chose. But what about those pesky digital assets? (Continued on page 4)

The answers are in that 20-page “User Agreement” you probably didn’t read before you clicked the “I agree” button. Each service provider, *i.e.* Facebook, Google, Yahoo, iTunes (...the list goes on and on) has its own policy of what happens to your content on its site if you die or are disabled. And, you consented to that policy when you clicked that “I agree” button.

Unfortunately, preparing for your digital afterlife is not simple because the technology, your digital content, the user agreements and the law keep changing and evolving. But here are a few steps you can take:

- (1) Consider whether to share user names and passwords with a family member or trusted friend and make sure to keep them current as you make changes;
- (2) Update your will and financial power of attorney to grant your executor and your agent access to your digital assets;
- (3) Research each service provider to determine and choose whether your account should be memorialized (allowing friends and family to post after your death), deleted, or frozen; and
- (4) Provide a way for your executor or agent to securely gain access to your user names and passwords. (Again, keep the necessary information current).

Digital assets are just one way you may leave a legacy; the important thing is planning so that you leave the legacy you want.

June Peace Corner

Thus says the LORD: Act with justice and righteousness and deliver from the hand of the oppressor anyone who has been robbed.

—Jeremiah 22:3

First United Church’s Council passed an overture titled [“Confronting our Complicity in Colonialism, White Supremacy, and Racism”](#) this month; now it goes to Chicago Presbytery. If they approve it, the overture will go to General Assembly in June 2022.

Anyone watching the tragedy unfolding in Israel/Palestine right now has to see the power differences between the two groups. Israel has created a “Jewish state” that has separate laws for Jews that provide them with full democracy. Any non-Jew is governed by

separate laws. This was codified into law in 2018 and is called the “Nation-State” law.

So it is about “who has the power.” Liberation theology names the “oppressor” and the “oppressed.”

The current violence was triggered when Israeli soldiers cut the power line from Al Aqsa Mosque on the Dome of the Rock (Palestinian term for the Temple Mount) during a speech President Rivlin was giving nearby.

But that was only the trigger. It was followed by a reaction as Israeli troops tried to prevent Muslims from entering the mosque for prayer. In the final days of the month-long observance of Ramadan. What had been building was a seething resentment among Palestinians for the so-called “Kushner peace deal,” the moving of the U.S. embassy to Jerusalem in opposition to international law, giving the Golan Heights to Israel (they grabbed it from Syria), but, most of all, the threatened evictions of Palestinian families from their homes in Sheikh Jarrah, a zone of East Jerusalem on the north-east side.

The Sheikh Jarrah takeover has been building since 2009 when ultra-orthodox settlers began moving into Palestinian homes, refusing to leave. The Palestinians have stayed, sharing their homes. But now, Israel has threatened to evict the Palestinians, first by May 5, then May 10, and now postponed 30 days by Israeli court. So, the tension has not abated. The government has allowed the settlers to stay and now threatens eviction of the Palestinian families. Why? To reduce the population of Palestinians inside the so-called “Security Wall” and force Palestinians to leave.

Going back to a ceasefire is not enough. A truly democratic state ensures equal rights for all and provides security to all, freedom of movement with the right of return to all its citizens, not just Jews. Israel has created “colonies/settlements” in the West Bank on land belonging to the Palestinians to the point that it is virtually impossible to reverse. This is colonialism. It is time we recognized that religion is being used to justify the colonial takeover of all of the land of Israel/Palestine. The U.S. government gives Israel almost \$4 billion a year for military aid. We have leverage. It is time to use it. We are complicit in the deaths of innocent children and families until we do.

Dani has been active here at First United since she was




