# Moderator's Report

Greetings from your Church Council!

At its November meeting, the Council approved a proposal from Latz & Co. to work with Rev. Edgerton, the Council, and other leaders to develop and implement a plan for consideration of a capital campaign. This work follows on the Latz team's campaign readiness analysis and discussions that occurred over the Summer and Fall. Development of a plan will begin in earnest in January 2022 and will include discussions with various groups and members of the Church to identify goals and priorities. In anticipation of this planning, the Council devoted the lion's share of its meeting to begin to identify objectives or activities that could be pursued to increase the Church's impact in the wider community and to strengthen its finances. We did this by envisioning the headlines and contents of a *Wednesday Journal* edition three years in the future, providing details of what our Church has been doing, what it has accomplished, and what difference it has made. (One such headline that emerged was "First United Thrives: How This Community Church Made a Difference.") Our visioning discussions continue next month.

Other items of business included updating of descriptions of the Communications and Stewardship Teams, a description of what is now the Technology Task Force, and adoption of an IT Acceptable Use Policy and IT Standards. We also approved tuition rates for the First United Nursery School's 2022-2023 school year, for which registration opens in December for Church members and returning families.

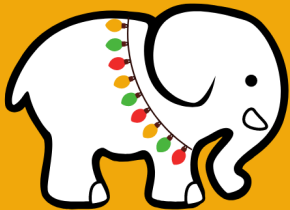

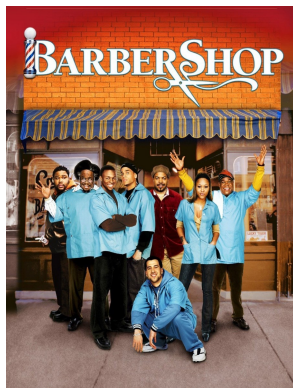

## PEACE CORNER: THE FALL PEACE VIGIL

*"The people prayed for peace, had peace on their minds, took the time to pray for peace!  
I'm so glad they prayed, I'm so glad they prayed, I'm so glad they prayed for peace!"*

The November Peace Vigil was a time for creating community, creating a context of a "Peace Village" of listening and caring. In small groups of four we shared how we've been shaped by violence through:

- murders of our children by gun violence and how the reality remains present in our daily life;
- murder in generations past, still impacting family life today;
- gun violence harming a family member and disrupting the direction of the victim's life, disrupting education, career and family formation;
- suicide and the harm done to so many;
- using trauma to create the opportunity to strengthen family and community relationships.

In our sharing, listening and caring, for the lives lost, the impact on our lives and relationships, we are comforted by one another, by God's spirit with us, and renewed for working for peace.

As an act of healing, participants received a snake plant, Sansevieria Moonshine, to care for and receive its healing properties, providing a sense of calm.

We closed, singing, *"Deep in my heart, I do believe, we shall live in peace some day!"*

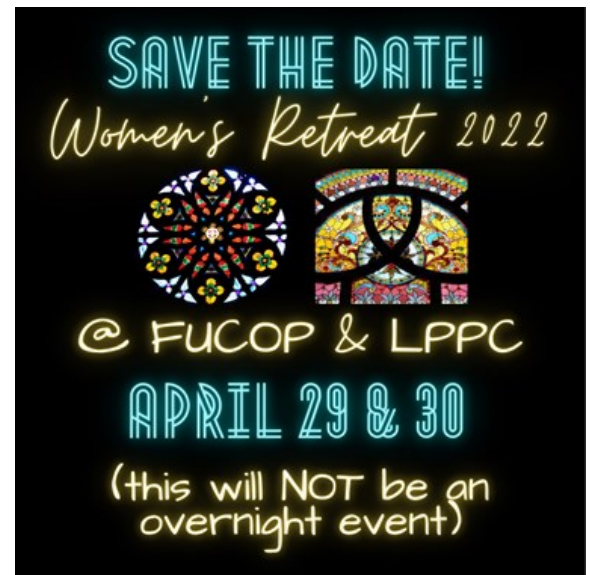
- Peace, justice, equity, and reparations
