## Fourth Sunday Offering— Chicago Religious Leadership Network on Latin America (CRLN)

Since the historic 2016 peace accord in Colombia, over 400 human rights defenders have been killed—the highest number of any country in Latin America, according to the United Nations Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR). The Chicago Religious Leadership Network on Latin America (CRLN) has worked for more than 25 years to create timely action alerts so advocates can raise their voices to protect human rights defenders.

The contribution from First United of Oak Park will support a project beginning this fall to work with our faith partners in Colombia to create advocacy resources for use by congregations to learn, pray and act to support Colombia's peacemakers. Resources will include video interviews with human rights defenders, fact sheets, backgrounders, liturgical resources (prayers, litanies, songs), and advocacy training. These tools will help congregations be faithful and effective advocates for peacemakers in Colombia.

## From the Council Moderator

After worship, on July 18, we held the Church's Annual Meeting on Zoom. The congregation approved the priorities of a Ministry Outline for FY 2022, which can be found [here](#). The congregation also received an update on financial matters from Susan Macaulay, the new Chair of the Finance Team, and Justin Lewis, our new Treasurer. We recognized and extended thanks to Elders, Deacons, and team chairs whose terms ended, with special recognition of Carl Nauert's faithful two-year service as the Council Clerk. And we extended our gratitude to all members of the Church staff who engaged in and supported our ministries in a year of unprecedented challenges.

We were unable to hold a vote at the Annual Meeting on the amendments to the Constitution to update our Purpose and Covenant, which the congregation had heard about for many weeks. A quorum of 100 members is required for foundational amendments to the Constitution such as these. Unfortunately, between the worship service, attended by more than 100 members, and the Annual Meeting that followed, we lost our quorum. The Constitutional amendments will be taken up at the next meeting of the congregation when the budget for FY 2022 will be presented for approval.

At its meeting on July 20, the Council had the pleasure of receiving three new members to our Church: David Kuipers, and Todd and Chris Temperly. Welcome to our community of faith! Sue Saliny shared her reflections on the shelter provided by our faith and our Church community as we continue to face health struggles and uncertainties arising from COVID-19 and the variants.

The meeting proceeded with the election of officers for FY 2022. I will continue to serve as Moderator and Marteki Reed will continue as Vice-Moderator, and we welcome Tim Dull as our new Clerk.

The Council heard an update from Susan Macaulay on the budget preparation process for FY 2022 and suggestions for how to bring the Church's budget back into balance over the next several years. The Capital Campaign Planning Task Force reported that the Latz team is expected to present its preliminary findings to the task force on a renewed strategic vision for the church based on conversations with involved members.

Lastly, Council heard from Lydia Mulkey on programming plans for the reopening of Church School and approved the proposed health and safety measures for Church School and Sunday morning nursery operations.

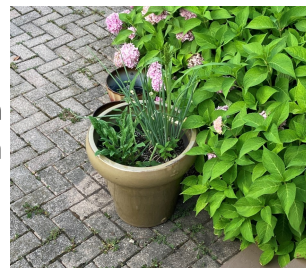
## Growing Our Generosity Stewardship Update

The future is promising for First United Church as we move into our 2021-22 church year. Our Stewardship campaign blossomed with the theme of "Growing Our Generosity." As of July 22, we have received pledge increases from 60 households that totaled \$98,678, and new pledges from 27 households that totaled \$41,816 for an outstanding total of \$140,494 new pledge income for the upcoming fiscal year.

With a small group of pledges needing clarification, the Stewardship Team has strong expectations that the congregation will meet or exceed the goal of \$595,000. At this time, Stewardship Team members are happily writing personal thank you notes to the 131 households that have generously supported this year's Stewardship effort.

While we are grateful for the generous response from members who have identified their pledge intention, we are reaching out to members who have not confirmed their decision concerning financial support for the upcoming church year.
