From the Council Moderator

Greetings on behalf of your Council, with a brief recap of our April meeting.

Devotion: Marteki Reed offered the evening's devotion. Traditionally, the second Sunday of Easter focuses on the disciple Thomas, who is known as "Doubting Thomas." For all that we call him doubting today, Thomas was also the only disciple with enough courage to venture out into a scary world with threatening figures when the other disciples were paralyzed into inaction by fear, uncertainty, and doubt (FUD). Marteki encouraged us to be more like Thomas, to be more willing to venture out, to not give in to paralyzing FUD, and to continue to use our power as disciples of Christ to do good in the world.

Lenten Theme: Rev. Edgerton provided an overview and timeline of the media and public reactions to the Lenten Theme "Fasting from Whiteness" as well as outreach efforts by the Church to explain the theme's message and intent. Rev. Edgerton explained that the decision to hold the Palm Sunday service only on-line, while unfortunate, was deemed the safest course of action in light of threats that had not yet been fully investigated by the Oak Park Police Department. The pastoral staff, Council members, and other leaders will gather in the coming weeks to reflect on the experience and discern implications and lessons for the Church's anti-racism activity.

Vision for the Future: Council members received additional feedback from teams on the preliminary vision framework developed around four pillars of Church life: the church experience, the community of care, the Church's engagement and impact in the wider community, and financial sustainability and organizational support. Representatives of Latz & Company reported on their planning for facilitated team discussions in May that are designed to solicit further feedback and action items for each of the four pillars.

Finance Report: Susan Macaulay, Chair of the Finance Team, reported that as of the end of the Church's third fiscal quarter, revenues continue to lag behind projected receipts by approximately \$92,000, half of which represents a shortfall in pledge receipts, and the other half representing anticipated building use and other payments. Susan noted that as we enter the fourth quarter, it is expected that pledge receipts will improve

with reminders that the period for 2022 pledge payments ends June 30, not December.

Annual Stewardship Campaign: Marcia Ashton, Chair of the Stewardship Team, gave an interim report on the results of the Overflowing Blessings Stewardship Campaign. As of mid-April, the church has received pledges totaling \$522k from 126 households. The team will be following up with the approximate 56 households who previously pledged but have not yet made a pledge this year, and is developing a strategy porting to encourage further pledging. The campaign's end date is May 31.
