Beloved of First United,

First United Church is a part of two denominations—the United Church of Christ and the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A). Being part of the wider church in this way is an indispensable part of our ministry. The most straightforward way that our denominational identities appear is through our clergy. Our clergy are ordained in one of our denominations, a years-long and intensive process. There are educational requirements, ethical oversight, psychological support and assessment, and rigorous theological evaluation. This careful and deliberative process ensures that there are professional standards for clergy in our denominations, as well as oversight processes in case of ethical breach.

This is just the beginning of it, however. We have access to wonderful worship resources such as our hymnals that are informed by robust theology. During Lent, a number of people noted that our hymnals are a rich resource filled with songs from many varied traditions. The process of writing a hymnal is—quite literally—a decades-long process. No single church is capable of such an endeavor and so we rely on our denominational partners for such efforts.

Our mission efforts are also bolstered by national and international programs that are run by the denominations. Finding and supporting properly vetted efforts on the national and international level is quite difficult, particularly because creating relationships across such great distances is burdensome. Our denominational partners have longstanding relationships in the national and international mission spheres. When we support our denominations financially, we are contributing to those efforts. All of these structures are critical to our ministry here at the church. They operate largely behind the scenes, but without them our ministries would be greatly reduced.

From the Council Moderator

Greetings on behalf of your Council, with a brief recap of our June meetings.

Devotion

We heard a devotion from Sallie Smylie on the hymn “Be Thou My Vision” -- its history and its meaning for us today as we continue to discern a collective vision of our church in the future.

Prayers

We lifted up John Borrero’s aunt and Vicky Curtiss and other family and friends of Kent Organ in prayer.

Vision Update

Derek McPhatter of Latz & Co. gave an update on activities to curate recommendations from groups that have provided input on the vision framework pillars to date as well as the timeline and processes under consideration for obtaining additional congregation engagement. Work on case development for a potential capital campaign will continue through the summer.

Election of New Treasurer

The Council elected Dave Marshall as the church’s new Treasurer and extended our thanks to Dave for serving in this capacity as he also continues to serve as a member of the Council.

Financial Matters:

Susan Macaulay, chair of the Finance Team, reported that May financials showed an overall deficit of just over \$72,000 for the first 11 months of the fiscal year, consisting of a shortfall of more than \$105,000 in expected receipts and under-spending on the expense side of approximately \$33,000. In part, the deficit is due to a shortfall in pledged income, but other unrestricted receipts also have been less than anticipated. A final push to try to make up some of the shortfall is underway.

Safe Church Policies and Procedures

The Council adopted Safe Church Policies and Procedures, which comprise Chapter V of a comprehensive set of policies and procedures updated and adopted during the past two years. (Other chapters are Governance, Finance, Personnel, and IT Use and Standards.) Chapter V addresses screening, training, reporting, and other requirements and guidance for em-

ployees and volunteers who interact with children and youth in church programming. Thanks to Lydia Mulkey, Alicia Reese, Katharine Thurman, Cathy Cerniglia, and Marteki Reed for their work updating and enhancing the church’s policies in this area.

Organist Search

Sallie reported on actions of the organist search team (Bill Chin, Marilee Castaneda, Betty Gehring, Martha Sorensen, and Sallie Smylie) to search for a new organist in light of Michael Surratt’s announced retirement effective August 29. A job description has been prepared and posted on the job boards of the American Guild of Organists and several other associations for musicians, contacts have been made with organists and organ professors at nearby universities, and the church’s website and Facebook page show the posting and application requirements. We’re learning that the organist market is tight – so please help get the word out!

Lenten Theme Experience

Marteki Reed reported on the post-worship debriefing with congregational members facilitated by John Edgerton and Marteki, and she noted that plans are underway for additional feedback sessions this summer.

Alicia Reese Ordination

Materials are being prepared for the Council to consider, at its July meeting, terms of call to Alicia and her ordination. If approved by the Council, the terms of call will be presented to the congregation at a meeting to be scheduled in August.

Outgoing Council Members

We extended thanks and appreciation to John Borrero, Megan Lewis, Dan Pietrini, and Jamie Shamhart for their dedicated service on the Council.

Finally, I want to express my deep appreciation to all Council members, the pastoral staff, the administrative staff, and teams for their dedication and support during my term as moderator. We all were called on to manage the church through unexpected twists and turns as well as to bring our best thought to lead in the development of a vision of the church’s future. Thanks be to God for all who share their time, talents, and devotion with this church!

Recap: Lenten Debrief

Sunday, June 5th, after the celebration of our new confirmands, some of us headed over to the chapel to have a guided conversation about Lent this year. One of our pastors and a member of our church council encouraged us to discuss what we had learned about ourselves, our community, and our society when we adopted a new Lenten practice this year, Fasting from Whiteness.

First, we broke up into small groups, and talked about what it had taught us about our individual selves. We regrouped and shared these insights with the entire group of 28. The leaders looked for common themes and encouraged more discussion. We talked and regrouped three times, and discovered common themes of Fear, surprise, gratitude, pride, and anticipation. We recognized the courage of our pastors, the generosity of our neighbors, and wondered how we will continue to address racial inequality going forward.

It was a revealing and reassuring time spent in conversation about our Church. If this topic interests you or if you're wondering how this Lenten practice came about, there will be more opportunities for a Lenten debrief over the summer.
