Many have answered this question in different ways, people of whom are far more educated than I in both politics and in law. Due to Martin Luther King Day always falling days before the March for Life, King is often on my heart while on this annual pilgrimage. believe this is not enough. Until we make it absolutely unthinkable for a mother to end the life of her unborn baby, we as a Church will have not done enough. Until we care for every need of a mother with an unexpected pregnancy we will have not done enough. Some will say to care for

every need is impossible. My sisters and brothers, nothing is impossible with God. He is on our side. He will give us the grace to provide for our sisters in need. We, though, must ask Him for the grace to open our eyes, open our hearts to our sisters in need. Because this is not just a political issue, this is a Christian issue. If we see our sister in need, but choose to ignore her, claiming I do not know her or I am too busy, we are in fact, looking upon the face of Christ and saying, I do not know you, I am too busy for you.

Today, I want to propose one solution, one simple step to take. Become a saint. Our nation needs conversion.
