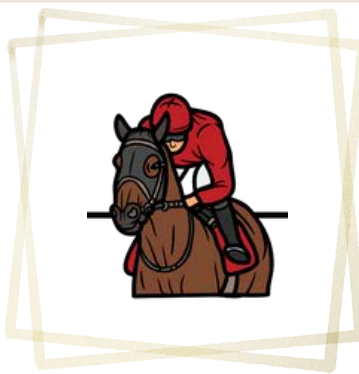

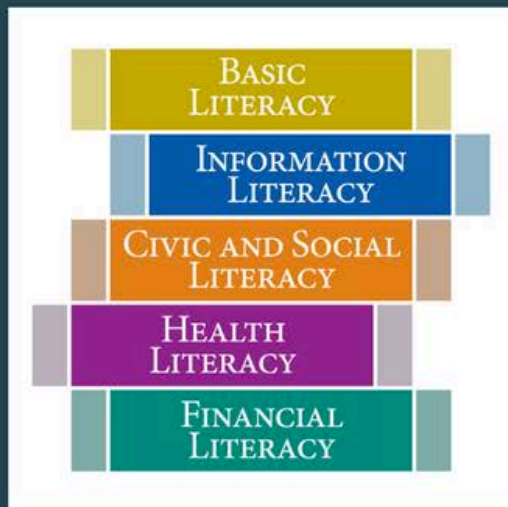

WHAT IS



AND WHY DOES IT MATTER?

PA Forward is an initiative aimed at showcasing the importance of libraries and their position in their communities as “community centers of information, technology, and learning that will fuel educational and economic opportunity for all of our citizens” (PA Forward website).



Libraries are more than just books, we are learning institutions that “create learning opportunities that lead to personal discovery, growth, and enjoyment” (FCLS website).

The five literacies identified by PA Forward fuel the types of knowledge essential to success and by following the Star Program, libraries can further show that they are an integral part of our societies that add untold value to their communities.

HEALTH

Perhaps the most obvious of the five, health literacy revolves around one's ability to meet their physical, emotional, spiritual, and mental health needs. At FCLS libraries, we offer an array of programs and resources focused on health literacy including books, online resources, in-person programs, and community partnerships.

BASIC

Basic Literacy is the foundation of learning and includes reading, writing, math, job research and the application process, and the overall life skills needed for prosperity. At FCLS, we thrive on basic literacy programs ranging from storytimes for little ones to computer classes for all ages.

INFORMATION

Information Literacy centers around cognitive thinking and the ability to recognize fact vs. fiction. Understanding and communicating in different ways is another essential part of furthering oneself in life. Our ever-expanding library collection includes more than just books - we have tools, baking equipment, games, tents, kites, appliances, and more to further this literacy.

FINANCIAL

The most stressful of all literacies: financial. Understanding how to earn, save, spend, and donate money responsibly is what financial literacy is all about. FCLS has a partnership with F&M Bank centered around helping our patrons become more fluent in financial literacy, as well as materials and programs.

CIVIC/SOCIAL

Civic and Social Literacy focuses on engagement in discourse while remaining respectful of other viewpoints and opinions. Our monthly book clubs, encouragement of staff to volunteer their time in their community, and materials available at our libraries all help to promote this literacy in our libraries.
