Ages 5-7

- I. Sensory Play Kits: Kits with items like kinetic sand, slime, play dough, and squishy balls can provide enjoyable tactile experiences.
- 2. Fidget Toys: Things like spinners, stretchy strings, or pop-it toys are engaging and soothing for many young children.
- 3. Building Blocks: Blocks like Mega Bloks or Duplo (larger than Lego) can help develop fine motor skills and encourage creativity.

Ages 8-10

- I. Lego Sets: These sets help with motor skills and allow creativity. Sets that match their specific interests (like animals, vehicles, or buildings) are particularly popular.
- 2. Board Games: Games with clear, visual instructions (like *Candy Land, Sorry!*, or *Connect Four*) are good for social interaction and developing turn-taking skills.
- 3. Art Supplies: Markers, crayons, and modeling clay allow for creative expression and sensory exploration. Some kids enjoy textured or scented markers for added sensory stimulation.

Ages II-I3

- I. STEM Kits: Science kits for making slime, growing crystals, or building simple robots are great for engaging curiosity and hands-on learning.
- 2. Drawing Tablets: A drawing tablet like a Wacom or even simpler LCD tablets for doodling can appeal to kids interested in art and technology.
- 3. Interactive Books or Graphic Novels: Books with vivid illustrations or graphic novels can be more engaging than text-heavy books. Topics that match their interests, like science, fantasy, or history, are ideal.

Ages 14-15

- I. 3D Puzzles or Model Kits: 3D puzzles or model-building kits (such as cars, planes, or famous landmarks) are excellent for focus and fine motor skills.
- 2. Music Instruments or Digital Keyboards: Digital keyboards, ukuleles, or other beginner-friendly instruments provide an outlet for creativity and sensory engagement.
- 3. Specialty Art Supplies: Professional-grade colored pencils, acrylic paints, or a watercolor set with brush pens can provide an outlet for self-expression.
