IFSA-Butler Tips for International Travelers



New to flying? Anxious about your flight?

Will your semester or year abroad be your first experience with air travel? If you haven't flown before, it's been a long time since your last flight, or you've never flown internationally, it's not unusual to be confused or anxious.

Luggage and Packing

If you don't already have luggage, be sure to check your airline's rules regarding luggage before buying or borrowing suitcases.

Most airlines allow a carry-on bag in addition to a "personal item" (like a purse or a laptop bag) for each passenger. More often than not, checked bags (bags that you leave in the care of the airline and that ride in the belly of the plane) incur additional cost. The dimensions and weight limits vary for each class of

Don't overpack, and be sure to keep important items with you. In addition to important documentation, emergency medication, and other obvious items, pack a change of clothing and travel toiletries in your carry-on. If your checked baggage is lost or delayed, you will be thankful you did.




If you have an assigned seat on your boarding pass, you'll sit there. Before the plane leaves the runway,



the flight attendants will do some safety checks and demonstrations. Fasten your seatbelt and follow all of the instructions of the crew. Get comfy. Long international flights often have seat-back entertainment. You

may be offered a meal or snacks.

You can adjust the lighting and airflow around your seat using the buttons above near the seatbelt light.









Your first stop after you leave the plane will be Customs & Immigration. Review the tips in your Travel Essentials Newsletter for any special instructions regarding immigration procedures in your host country. Fill out your customs declarations as soon as you get them (probably on

the plane) and have them ready, along with your passport and any supporting documents. Answer questions honestly and don't make jokes during the customs and immigration process. Follow signs for Baggage Claim to collect your checked luggage, and then you're done! If you are on a group flight, you'll find our resident staff near the large IFSA sign and they'll get you where you need to be for orientation. If you are an independent traveler, exit to the taxi line, subway or bus terminal
