- Anti-racism: As a continuation of prior anti-racism studies and advocacy, at CUUC I studied the Beloved Conversations/Within curriculum (in fall 2021), took part in the Jubilee3 anti-racism training (in January 2023), and am an active participant in the Racial Justice team.
- Music: Since the spring of 2021 I have sung tenor in the choir.
