HOPE ON THE HUDSON is a series of short films focused on good news from our Hudson Valley. Three films follow up Jon Bowermaster's previous series, 'The Hudson, A River at Risk' with a distinct pivot to optimism. 'City on the Water' explores New York City's 520-miles of coastline and the efforts across the city to make the waterways healthier more accessible. 'Restoring the Clearwater' explores the nearly year-long restoration and the return of the ship to the Hudson River to continue to fulfill Pete Seeger's mission to educate and roam America's First River. 'Seeds of Hope' documents a unique effort during the 2017 harvest to save several varieties of Native American seeds that have nearly gone extinct shows perspective into a multi-year effort to preserve both a rich agricultural heritage and Native American Culture.
