**Interfaith Center on Corporate Responsibility** members ask corporations to adopt human rights policies that formally recognize human trafficking, slavery, unsafe working conditions, and to train their personnel and their suppliers to safeguard against these risks throughout their supply chains.

**Sweatshops** exist because the human links of the supply chain are hidden from us when we shop. If working conditions at producer factories were visible to consumers at the point of purchase, it would be harder to convince shoppers that cheaper goods are worth the price of worker abuse.

When we buy **Fair Trade** products, we can contribute to reducing poverty and the harmful effects of human activities. Fair Trade provides an equitable price for products, which contributes to a stable source of income for workers, who can then support their families. Bananas, coffee, tea and chocolate are among the most common fair trade items, but, according to Fairtrade America, there are hundreds more. As the industry grows, it becomes easier than ever to find fair trade clothes, beauty products and home goods, especially online.
